



Tarleton State Univ. Is In NCAA Playoffs Sat.

Tarleton State's 34-24 win over Texas A&M Commerce, at Commerce's Memorial Stadium, gave the Texans a share of their first ever Lone Star Conference football championship. The win moves Tarleton to 9-2 over-all, 8-1 in the Lone Star Conference and 5-1 in Lone Star South Conference division games. The Texans share the over-all league title and South Division crown with Texas A&M-Kingsville.

Tarleton will travel to Chadron, Nebraska, for a first round NCAA Division II playoff game, against 10-0 Chadron State. Chadron is the topranked team in the West Division. Tarleton heads into the game ranked fourth in the West Division and riding a six-game win streak. The Texans have averaged 48 points per game during that span. Scholarship Available For Agriculture Students

Students pursuing careers in agriculture are encouraged to apply for a scholarship from the Careers in Agriculture scholarship program, jointly sponsored by Agriliance, Land O'Lakes Farmland Feed and Croplan Genetics. High school seniors from throughout the country who will enroll in a two-or four-year aghronomy or livestock curriculum in the fall of 2002 are eligible to apply. Fifty \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded.

Greenbug Infestation Is Reported in Panhandle

WEEK OF NOVEMBER 5, 2001 Greenbug infestations in excess of 200 per foot of row have been reported from a few wheat fields in the Texas Panhandle. The dry, open fall has been favorable for their buildup. In 3 to 6 inch wheat, 100-300 greenbugs per foot of row is considered the economic threshold

A few Russian wheat aphids have been observed in area wheat. These aphids cause white and purple longitudinal streaks on leaves. Most often they do not build up to noticeable levels until late winter and early spring, so it is very unusual to be finding infestations this early.




