Panhandle Groundwater To Begin Measurements

Beginning the first of December and lasting through mid-March, the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District will begin conducting its annual winter water level measurement program throughout the District. Winter water level measurements help not only the District with vital data and information for our records, but it also helps out the general public, farmers and ranchers.

Winter water level measurements are gathered by using an E-line or a steel tape down the casing of the well. An E-line consists of a long measuring tape with a battery-powered circuit running through it. The end of the E-line that is first placed in the hole purposely has a short in it. When this short is submersed into water, a buzzer will sound on the reel, telling the operator that it has found the water level. The steel tape is used in much the same way. The tape is first covered with a blue or yellow chalk for four to five feet. This end is then inserted into the casing. In order to put the right amount of tape into the well, the operator must know the previous year's water depth. The tape is then pulled back out of the well. The operator then finds the area where the chalk has been washed off the steel tape. From this reading, the operator can then calculate the water level.

Now that you are a bit more familiar with the procedure, here are some benefits that come from the gathering of this data. The PGCD will be able to make saturated thickness maps that are useful in locating the amount of water under the ground in a particular place. Many farmers and ranchers use these maps to locate the best places to drill irrigation wells or windmills. Other maps prepared from this data are water level and

The water level maps tell us where the present water level is located. The depletion maps tell us how many feet the water table has risen or fallen in the last year. The depletion maps we use to determine the amount of depletion are the same maps used for those landowners eligible for depletion allowance on their income tax returns.

As you can see, this is not a new program. The PGCD has been measuring water levels on many different wells throughout the District. On some wells, as much as 40 years worth of data has been collected. Our main goal is to be able to provide useful and accurate information to

TxDOT Offers Driving Tips For Winter Weather

Rain during very cold temperatures can often develop into sleet or snow, which can create roadway hazards for motorists. To minimize the potential hazards The Texas Department of Transportation offers the following tips for safe winter driv-

I Make sure vehicle is maintained for winter weather conditions by checking fuel and antifreeze levels. Check tires, lights and battery. Use no-freeze fluid in the windshield washer reservoir to help keep vehicle windows clear in cold temperatures.

I Listen to weather broadcasts prior to and during travel. Call TxDOT's toll-free highway conditions line at 1-800-452-9292 or check Texas road conditions on the Internet at http:// www.dot.state.tx.us/hcr/main.htm. During these conditions only make trips that are necessary.

I Drive with caution on bridges and overpasses since elevated roadways freeze over first.

I Stay in the vehicle if stranded or

stalled and wait for help. Use car heater sparingly and with plenty of ventilation while, doing so. Stay awake and move around as much as possible to maintain circulation and body

I For severe winter weather keep flashlight, new batteries, jumper cables, matches, abrasive material (sand, kitty litter, even floor mats), shovel, ice scraper, warning devices (like flares) and blankets in the vehicle. For long trips, take along water, non-perishable food, medicine and a cell phone. Inform others of your anticipated route and arrival time.

I Plan ahead by allowing plenty of time for travel. Be prepared for possible delays by leaving early.

I Buckle up and use child safety seats properly.

I Do not drink and drive.

Russell Hefley wasn't looking for a big whitetail buck the second Saturday of deer season.

He'd been watching the Buckmasters TV show like other fifth graders watch weekend cartoons, learning about deer hunting and deer management.

"He said he'd decided that this year he'd just shoot a couple of does because it was good deer management," his father said. Russell had shot a respectable buck last season, so he'd already overcome his "first

Russell's dad, Potter County game warden Billy Hefley, had to work that particular day. So Russell, 10, had his mother, Lisa, take him to the family's deer lease in the eastern Texas Pan-

Lisa is herself a serious deer and elk hunter.

But neither son nor mother was quite ready for the craggy-horned buck that stepped from the brush soon after they climbed into their stand that Saturday morning.

"Lisa said 'Russell, maybe I better shoot this buck.' 'No way!' he said," Billy laughed in recounting their experience.

The buck was about 100 yards away, feeding on beans beneath a black locust tree when Russell leveled his Ruger .243 and dropped the buck. Lisa was so excited she almost forgot to turn on the video camera

Russell's was not the only big nontypical whitetail to come from Eastern Panhandle

Jim Howell of Amarillo was hunting in Donley County last week when he shot a huge non-typical. Jim's massive buck carries 16 points including a second beam off the right antler base. Biologist Danny Swepston scored the buck at a gross 183 5/8 B&C.

On another interesting side not to a story we reported previously. Raymond McCabe's big buck taken opening day in Donley County has been certified through DNA tests as a true hybrid buck including both whitetail and mule deer characteris-

Such hybrids are very rare. Raymond's buck, which weighed a whopping 311 pounds before field dressing, scores 162 B&C points as a whitetail.
