mind, And it makes me sad that I left you behind.



DALLAS AREA JUNIOR HIGH STUDENTS TOUR HERITAGE BEEF CATTLE COMPANY

A group of Dallas-area junior high students traded in their tennis shoes for cowboy boots to gain a first-hand look at award-winning environmental practices Thursday, October 3.

Wheeler Named In List For Emergency Loans

Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman has named 26 counties in Texas as eligible for Farm Service Agency emergency farm loans because of losses due to various disasters, including drought, high winds, freezing temperatures, sleet and snow from June 1, 1995, through June 11, 1996, and continuing.

Gray, Kerr, Navarro, and Starr counties were named as primary disaster areas on September 3. Also eligible because they are contiguous to one or more of the primary counties, are Armstrong, Bandera, Brooks, Carson, Collingsworth, Donley, Edwards, Ellis, Freestone, Gillespie, Hemphill, Henderson, Hidalgo, Hill, Jim Hogg, Kendall, Kimble, Limestone, Real, Roberts, Wheeler, and Zapata counties.

Farmers in all 26 counties have eight months to apply for the loans to help cover part of their actual losses. To be eligible, they must have suffered at least a 30 - percent loss of normal production in a single enterprise, be able to repay the loan and any other loans, be unable to obtain credit elsewhere, have adequate security, and have multiperil crop insurance, if available.

Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

MACRONUTRIENT NEEDS FOR PEOPLE 65 AND OLDER

Now more than ever before, the nutritional needs for macronutrients -- water, fiber, carbohydrate, protein and fats -- are very important.

Why worry about it now? Mainly because by the year 2000 there will be approximately 40 million people in the United States over the age of 65. Many will remain active and healthy. Others will suffer from one or more chronic diseases, live alone or have varied backgrounds and living situations. That's why knowledge about the macronutrient needs of this over-65 age group is important.

Not to be forgotten is the nutrient water. When it comes to the elderly, water consumption is of special concern since they have inadequate water intake. This is caused by a decrease in the antidiuretic hormone with aging and more water loss through their urine. Memory loss or physical incapacity may prevent the ability to satisfy their thirst or inability to express their need for fluids. For whatever reason, dehydration is a common problem for the elderly. Dehydration can be prevented by consuming approximately 1-1/2 to 2 liters of fluid per day, or more if there is vomiting, diarrhea or other increased fluid loss.

For a variety of reasons, fiber in our diet is important for all of us. Waterholding fibers, such as found in wheat bran, along with adequate water intake, are helpful with reducing constipation and in decreasing formation of diverticula in the colon. Soluble dietary fibers -- those in oats, legumes

Nadine Williams moved we give a \$25.00 Beef Gift Certificate that night of our November 11th meeting. It was seconded and carried.



Energy intake needs to be enough to maintain a normal weight and prevent undesired weight loss. Overeating fats and carbohydrates results in protein used for energy draining necessary amino acids. Decreased muscle mass and less physical activity reduce the need for calories so fat intake is usually decreased in the elderly to about 25 percent to 30 percent of total calories. Protein, 10 percent to 15 percent, and carbohydrate, 55 percent to 60 percent, intakes are about the same as for the general public.

Moderation in eating and changing the diet such as reducing cholesterol to reduce risk factors are good for any age. Following a balanced meal plan such as the USDA Food Guide Pyramid which promotes good health without creating undue hardships or decreasing their quality of life is the type of dietary recommendations being made by most of the health organizations. So find out more about changing your eating habits the pyramid way to promote health and well-being, contact your local county Extension agent in family and consumer sciences or a local dietitian.

Extension Provides Free Opportunity For Disposal of Pesticides, Chemicals, Tires

The Texas Agricultural Extension state are invited to dispose of unneeded waste pesticides and agricultural chemicals. The collection locations also will recycle tires, batteries, waste oil and oil filters.

Clifford Hoelscher, professor and posed. This will be a good opportunity to help clean up trash in the community."

The Extension Service has contracted with a private pesticide disposal company to collect and dispose of the waste chemicals. The company takes the materials out of state where they are incinerated.

More than 950 tons of waste pesticides have been collected by the program. A total of 168 tons were disposed of during the 1996 spring program alone. Only 66 tons were disposed of in 1995.

The Texas Panhandle collection will be conducted from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m., in Amarillo at the U.S. Department of Agriculture Experiment Station, seven-tenths of a mile west of FM 2381 on the 1-40 service road.

This collection site will be taking empty pesticide containers for recycling. Hoelscher said these containers must be triple-rinsed and clean in order to be accepted.

Farmers and ranchers need to secure and pack all materials so they do not spill or fall from their vehicle during transport. He said any specific questions on the transport of pesticides could be answered in the Regional Pesticide Disposal Bulletin which is available in the County Extension Office.

Farmers and ranchers are reminded the contractor working with the pesticide disposal project will not accept explosives, fertilizers, paint, 2,4,5-T or pentachlorophenol because they require special handling. All other agricultural chemicals will be accepted for disposal.

Extension agents will be coordinating the event and taking surveys to see how far people have traveled and how much pesticide they are disposing with the program.

"We want to stress that it's free and there are no questions asked." Hoelscher said. "We do a survey, but it's just to check, the success of the program."

Money for the project is coming from chemical companies in their registration fee which they must pay to sell their products in the state. No taxpayer dollars are being used for the program, but the budget is limited.

Information on the disposal program, including which materials will be accepted and how empty containers must be prepared, can be obtained from the Wheeler County Extension office.


Wheeler Senior Citizens Gather for Bus. Meeting
