

WHEELER MUSTANGS STOMP CLAUDE MUSTANGS, 35-20

The Wheeler Mustangs added another win Friday night over the Claude Mustangs to go 2-0 in district play. They are now tied with Booker at the top of the district standings, followed by Gruver and Shamrock at 1-1; Claude and

Vega are 0-2.

The Mustangs struck quickly as Travis Stevens hooked up with Jason Porton on the third play of the game for a 67 yard pass. Jeremy Davis added the extra point and the Mustangs appeared to be off and running. On the ensuing kickoff, the Claude Mustangs were the ones running, as Thomas Justice found holes in the Wheeler coverage and went 90 yards for the score. The extra point was no good and the Mustangs of Wheeler had a narrow 7-6 lead.

Wheeler added another TD on a 1 yard plunge by Jeremy Davis to go up 13-6. The Wheeler Mustangs could not close the door on Claude and they came up with another TD to make the score 13-12. The Wheeler offense got cranked up again and added another score as Travis connected with Jeremy Davis on a 19 yard TD pass. Travis ran in the two point conversion to give the Mustangs a 21-12 lead. A short time later, Bryan Judd gets into the scoring act as he goes over from one yard out. After Jeremy kicks the extra point the Mustangs lead 28-12.

The Claude Mustangs continue to be stubborn as they come back to score on a 21 yard touchdown pass. The two point conversion was good, and Claude had cut the Wheeler lead to 28-21. The Wheeler offense moved

Oneighty Youth Center Opens With Attendance Approx. 365

Oneighty Youth Center in Wheeler, TX. opened on Saturday, October 19, 1996, to a clap-happy crowd of 365 people.

Blaine Bartel, Youth Pastor at Church on the Move, an urban congregation in Tulsa, OK., was there as featured speaker. He told the crowd that he was excited to be in Wheeler for the Grand Opening. He delighted them when he said he had shed his Eddie Bauers for a pair of Wranglers he had purchased on the Square for the occasion.

The old Rogue Theater on the Square received new life over the past three weeks as work crews from Church on the Move converged with supplies and tools. These workers have experience at Camp Dry Gulch, a western style church camp at Adair, OK. They also have movie set know-how with the children's video series "Gospel Bill" and "Bill Gunter, US Marshall" which can be seen on Trinity Broadcasting Network.

Vic Porter, pastor of Christian Center in Wheeler, the host church to 180-Wheeler, said that crews of workers from his own church also participated.

Demolition crews from Christian Center worked early-on, followed by design, construction, painting and clean-up crews from both churches. Last of all, decorators came in armed with 50's type memorabilia, sports equipment, movie set cut-outs and thousands of mini, chaser and theme lights. Ladies from Christian Center served bountiful West Texas meals to the workers.

"We want to thank everyone who helped in any way," Pastor Porter said. "It is a real neat place."

On Sunday he gave 180-Wheeler to the youth and commissioned them to bring in their friends. "The adults will help you run it. Your job is to bring in the teens," he said.

Replacing part of the Rogue Theater auditorium involved converting it to a 50's style diner, an arcade gallery and modern restrooms. A projector with video capabilities was also added. Upstairs are more games teenagers love. These include air hockey, pool tables, several Sony PlayStations and a punching bag.

Ranching gear for the stage set was provided by the R. L. Zybach family of Briscoe.

Oneighty Youth Center was the brain-child of Willie George, pastor of the 9,000 member Church on the Move, Tulsa, OK. He said he realized that a generation of teens was not being reached with the Gospel and that they needed something visual to get their attention.

That church opened the first Oneighty Youth Center several weeks ago in Tulsa to a crowd of 1500 teens. A group from Wheeler, Briscoe, Kelton, Canadian, Shamrock and Amarillo attended to get an idea of what was happening.

Pastor Geroge said 180-Wheeler will teach them how to deal with problems rural teenagers face, while 180-Tulsa will teach them about problems facing urban teens. After the first of the year, he said, their work crews will go to Los Angeles to build the third Oneighty Youth Center. With experience gained from it they will learn how to deal with problems facing gangs.

Following these three openings, the Oneighty Youth Centers will be available for franchising he said.

Willie George spent several years in the Wheeler-Canadian area as a young person and later married Deleva Young, daughter of Frank and Fern Young of rural Canadian.

Gary Ware, Youth Pastor at Christian Center in Wheeler, said 180-Wheeler is open every Saturday night to all the young people of the area. Special speakers, bands and singers will appear from time to time he said.

This reporter asked a couple of teens their impression of the Oneighty Youth Center.

Davy Clawson, Kelton, said, "I liked it. It was excellent! The drama was good, too. I plan to be there every Saturday night that I possibly can."

Niki Galutia, Wheeler, summed it up with, "It was a blast!"

SWOSU Orchestra Will Give Concert Tuesday

Southwestern Oklahoma State University's orchestra will be in concert on Tuesday, Oct. 29, at 8:15 p.m. in the lobby of the Fine Arts Center on the Weatherford campus. Admission is free, and the public is invited.

The orchestra, conducted by Dr. Robert Chambers, will perform Alexander Borodin's *In the Steppes of Central Asia*; Symphony No. 94 by Joseph Haydn; and *Danse Macabre* by Camille Saint-Saens.

In the Steppes of Central Asia begins with the horizon presented by the string section and follows a caravan of camels and horses as they travel across Central Asia, with pizzicatos in the string section portraying the sound of hooves.

Symphony No. 94 utilizes dynamic contrast to create surprises in the second movement.

In anticipation of Halloween, the final work by the orchestra will be *Danse Macabre* which opens with the strings striking midnight for the skeletons to come out and dance. The concertmaster acts the part of the devil tuning his fiddle and rattling bones can be heard in the strings. The end is called by the "crowing" of the oboe as the skeletons scurry back down to avoid the sunrise.

After the Oct. 29 concert, the orchestra's next performance will be December 3. Included on the program will be Peter Tschaiakowski's *Nutcracker Suite* and Leroy Anderson's *Sleigh Ride*.




Them folks you meet and deal with are truly the Very Spice of Life. I know by experience and by what my family have told me.

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


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Sweetwater News





From the Minister's Desk:
During World War II, the military posted warning signs on its installations. These warning signs said: "Careless talk costs lives."

This warning is, in my opinion, still relevant. I am not thinking about the casualties of a "shooting war". Rather, I am thinking about the destructiveness of gossip. This sin can ruin the reputation of people and destroy their happiness.

For this reason, I thought that Jim Hudson, the editor of *The Perryton Herald*, recently wrote a very thought-provoking editorial. This editorial was entitled, "Rumor Control", and it read:

"Anytime we are as inundated with news as we have been lately at the *Herald*, one of our major jobs is to separate fact from fiction. Ask any attorney—the worst witness is any eye witness. Everyone sees something from a different point of view."

"Though the rumor mill has been running full time, it has yet to match my favorite all-time rumor. It happened a few years ago when the county was dredging Lake Fryer. An anonymous tipster called the sheriff's department and demanded to talk to Sheriff Hataway."

"In breathless tones the caller related that the dredge crew had pulled up the bones of two black men at the lake. He then wanted to know exactly what Joe was going to do about the situation."

"After a thorough investigation, Sheriff Hataway found some cow bones that had been dredged up, but no human bones. To this day I wonder how someone could determine the race of an individual by bleached bones."

"Over the years in the newspaper business I have always found that information from anonymous sources is incorrect at best and vicious gossip at the worst. That is why we have a policy at the *Herald* of not printing anonymous letters to the editor. If a person is not willing to put their name in print, then I am not willing to put their words in print either."

"Not all news organizations follow that theory. On my way to the bank the other day, I ran into a friend of mine. He had talked the previous evening with some of his relatives on the West Coast. It seems that news of our flood had reached across the country, but with a slight error. The local television station there had reported that the entire town of Perryton, Texas had been evacuated by helicopter in advance of the flood waters. Gee, I would love to have a picture of that!"

"That is the side of the rumor mill that is simply amusing. There is another darker side. It is when false information is passed on which hurts the reputation of an individual. Without proof a tale is passed from mouth to mouth with little regard to the damage it might inflict."

"A number of years ago my father, Harold Hudson, told me this story and it has stuck with me. It is set in a mythical kingdom in another time and place."

"A man was brought before the king on the charge of spreading malicious gossip about his neighbors. The gossip maintained that he did nothing wrong. After listening to the victims of the gossip, the king ordered the man to place a feather on every doorstep in the kingdom and return in the morning."

"The next day the gossip appeared before the king and asked if that was the end of his punishment. The king then told the man to go and pick up every one of the feathers he had placed the night before. 'That is impossible', said the gossip. 'They have blown to the four corners of the kingdom.'"

"The king told the gossip that is the same with his vicious words. Once they are spoken they take a life of their own and can never come back."

"Think about that tale the next time you hear rumors about your neighbors."
