



John Paul Harris Is Diagnosed With Lou Gehrig's Disease

On June 18, 2007 John Paul Harris, husband of Deidre (Dukes) son-in-law of Bevard and Diane Dukes, was diagnosed with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, or ALS, better known as Lou Gehrig's disease. ALS is a progressive neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and the spinal cord. When the motor neurons die, the ability of the brain to initiate and control muscle movement is lost. As motor neurons degenerate, they can no longer send impulses to the muscle fibers that normally result in muscle movement. Early symptoms of ALS often include increasing muscle weakness, especially involving the arms and legs, speech, swallowing or breathing. When muscles no longer receive the messages from the motor neurons that they require to function, the muscles begin to atrophy (become smaller). Unfortunately, the muscle weakness and atrophy has been in his arms for a while now. Deidre is now feeding, bathing and dressing him because he can't lift his arms. Recently this has gotten distinctly worse in his legs as well. It has been an agonizing decision, but after MANY falls (broken ribs, stitches, and lots of bumps and bruises) John Paul and Deidre have decided that it is

time for a full-time wheelchair. His Physical Therapist has recommended the I-BOT. (www.ibotnow.com) This wheelchair is amazing. It offers 5 functions in 1. It can even climb stairs! Medicare does not cover this, so we are trying to raise money for JP to get some independence back that he desperately needs. Any donations would be so much appreciated and can be made payable to:







Parkview Artery Pool safety

With public swimming pools opening, many kids are anxious to dive in this summer. Although lifeguards are on duty, parents are advised to go over a few rules with their children first.

Many kids spend every day of their summer at the pool, but pool personnel say they need to know a few precautions for their safety.

Never swim alone or Ø let small children without adult supervision.

Ø DO not dive or let anyone else dive in shallow water.

Start young children Ø out with swimming lessons. Teach them to respect the water. Set out rules for swimming and enforce them consistently.

Finally no matter Ø where you swim, remember that you are intensifying the effects of the sun on your skin. Always use sun block and reapply often. Swimming is great fun and great exercise. Just remember to be safe in the water.

Lifeguards are well trained and have to complete hours of instructions concerning CPR and life saving techniques. Truths Behind Food vs. Fuel

Studies presented Monday at the 2008 Texas Ag Forum in Austin indicate corn-based ethanol drastically lowers consumers' cost of gasoline and has little effect on retail food prices.

The day-long event hosted a number of university experts, as well as farm group and biofuels representatives. These speakers presented information supporting all sides of the controversial food and feed vs. fuel debate.

In the forum, concerns were raised in regards to increasing corn prices due to its use in ethanol production and the impact these costs have on consumers and other agricultural sectors.

Henry Bryant, Texas A&M assistant research professor, said ethanol production is substantially
