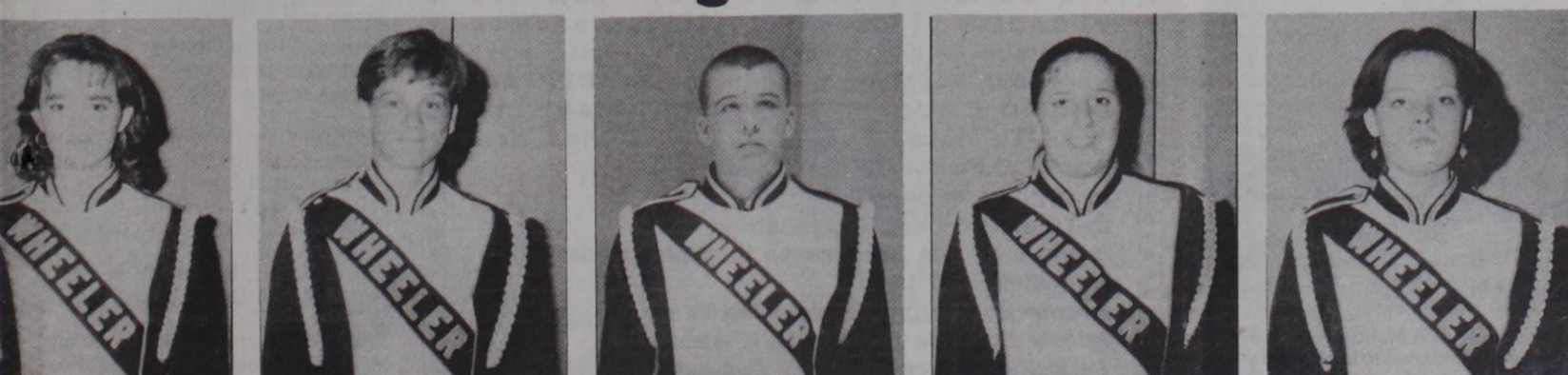

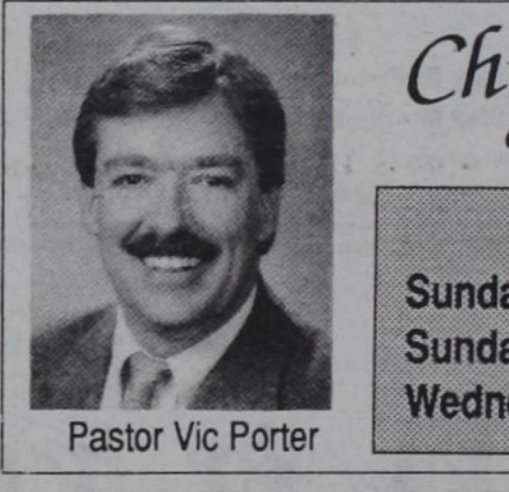

 John F. MacArthur, a noted contemporary religious author, made a very astute observation in one of his books. He said: "Lifeless, dry orthodoxy is the inevitable result of isolating objective truth from vibrant experience. But the answer to dead orthodoxy is not to build a theology on experience. Genuine experience must grow out of sound doctrine. We are not to base what we believe on what we have experienced. The reverse is true. Our experiences will grow out of sound doctrine. And we must continually examine and evaluate our experiences in light of the objective truth of God's precious Word. Any other approach leads inevitably to speculation and error. To build a theology on experience is to build on sand. But to build a theology on God's inspired, revealed Word is to build on rock. (Matthew 7:24-27)"

I believe that Mr. MacArthur's observation is absolutely correct. Throughout my ministry, I have known many people who built their faith upon their experiences or their opinions not upon the teachings of the Bible. These people are easy to identify because they invariably use certain phrases or expressions when they discuss their faith.

Some of these phrases or expressions are: - - -
 "I like."
 "I feel."
 "I believe."
 "It seems right."
 "I am sincere and honest."
 "I think God will understand."

Such phrases and expressions clearly reveal that these people do not believe or understand the teachings of the Bible should be the final authority for their faith. These people need to recognize that the Bible is an inspired book that was written by people who were guided by the Holy Spirit. (II Peter 1:20-21) For this reason, the teachings of the Bible express the inerrant will of God; therefore, people do not have the right to change or alter its teachings by their feelings or opinions.

If people truly want to be disciples of Jesus, they must honor the authority of the teachings of the Bible not their experiences or opinions. They must carefully study the teachings of the Bible and learn the true meaning of these teachings, striving to consciously obey these teachings.
