Vickey Nelson Injured in Freak Accident

Vickey Nelson was injured in a freak accident Monday. She was coming in to the Hospital and had stopped on Alan L. Bean to let a vehicle pass before turning to go to Parkview. Something came through the windshield and hit the steering wheel of Vickey's pickup. She threw up her hand to protect herself; she underwent surgery on her hand Tuesday to have a finger pinned and stitches in her hand.

The projectile was a John Deere Plow shear with a weight of 10-15 lbs., measuring approximately 20" in length and 6.5" width. There is a slightly curved sharp point.

Investigation indicates the shear had fallen off onto the roadway earlier. The vehicle meeting Vickey apparently ran over the curved point projecting the object into the air. When Vickey first noticed the shear coming upward toward her. Had it just been thrown from a vehicle, it would have been falling.

When the shear struck the steering wheel, it was deflected to the right, striking the roof of the pickup and landing in the right front floorboard.

Monday, October 21, is the date for the sentencing of Adam Wright and Dale Wadsworth at the Custer County Courthouse in Arapaho, Okla. The sentencing is set for 1:30 p.m.

On September 5, 1996, the two granite prison escapees pleaded guilty to a variety of charges filed in connection with the kidnapping of an Elk City Woman and her small child in August of last year.

Gena Huckert Childress and her daughter, Caitlyn were kidnapped from their home north of Elk City sometime after 9 a.m. on August 7, 1995. Gena is a graduate of Wheeler High School.

Gena's family feels that a large audience of concerned citizens would might affect the sentences handed down by the judge. If you are able to be in attendance at the sentencing, it would be greatly appreciated.

Arapaho is located a few miles north of Clinton.

The Wheeler Mustangs rolled over the Vega Longhorns in a District 1-1-A contest Friday night with the help of Bryan Judd, who was able to pick up three touchdowns to help Wheeler dominate, 48-9.

In the first half the Mustangs were able to score 34 points, with touchdowns created by Jeremy Davis off of a 35 yard run, a 24 yard run by Bryan Judd, a 43-yard punt return by Ramon Meraz, and another touchdown by Judd, this one off of a 17-yard dash.

Vega scored its only touchdown during the first half, a 23-yard fumble return that was scored by Kellan Richard to put the game's score at 34-7 at the half

The Mustangs scored twice in the second half of the game, once off of an eight yard touchdown run by Davis and the other TD stemming from a Brooks Brown pass to Kyle Masters for a 46-yard touchdown reception to conclude the games scoring. Vega was able to pick up only 2 points during the second half off of a safety in the third quarter.

Wheeler was able to gain 346 total yards while holding the Longhorns to only 146 total offensive yards.

Leading Wheeler in rushing was Bryan Judd, who was able to pick up 148 yards on ten carries for the Mustanges.

Wheeler had 19 first downs compared to 9 for Vega.


Four Area Players Are Recognized Amarillo



John F. MacArthur, a noted contemporary religious author, made a very astute observation in one of his books. He said: "Lifeless, dry orthodoxy is the inevitable result of isolating objective truth from vibrant experience. But the answer to dead orthodoxy is not to build a theology on experience. Genuine experience must grow out of sound doctrine. We are not to base what we believe on what we have experienced. The reverse is true. Our experiences will grow out of sound doctrine. And we must continually examine and evaluate our experiences in light of the objective truth of God's precious Word. Any other approach leads inevitably to speculation and error. To build a theology on experience is to build on sand. But to build a theology on God's inspired, revealed Word is to build on rock. (Matthew 7:24-27)"

Such phrases and expressions clearly reveal that these people do not believe or understand the teachings of the Bible should be the final authority for their faith. These people need to recognize that the Bible is an inspired book that was written by people who were guided by the Holy Spirit. (Il Peter 1:20-21) For this reason, the teachings of the Bible express the inerrant will of God; therefore, people do not have the right to change or alter its teach-

ings by their feelings or opinions. If people truly want to be disciples of Jesus, they must honor the authority of the teachings of the Bible not their experiences or opinions. They must carefully study the teachings of the Bible and learn the true meaning of these teachings, striving to consciously obey these teach-


