

Honor Students, Grads Are Named At Tex. Tech.

In the summer of 2001 Texas Tech University graduated 1,016 students, awarding 754 bachelors degrees; 211 masters degrees; 43 doctorates and 8 law.

In the fall semester of 2001, students making the Honors List numbered 1,890. Students on the President's List earned a 4.0 grade point average while enrolled in 12 or more semester hours of class work. Students who carried 12 or more hours with a grade point average of 3.5 to 3.9 qualified for the Dean's List.

Fall 2001 commencement took place on December 11, 2001. Texas Tech University graduated 1,624 students. Degrees were awarded as follows: 1,317 bachelors degrees; 231 masters degrees; 44 doctorates and 32 law.

Wheeler City Council Raises Water Rates; Election Called For May 4

Regular Meeting February 18, 2002 Mayor Wanda Herd called the regular meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. in City hall.

Jimmy Hill made the motion seconded by Bob McCain to approve the minutes as written. The motion carried.

Walter Simmons made motion seconded by Barbra Koelzer to pay the bills as presented. The motion carried.

Frank Clymer reported on the activities of the city employees. He stated the ramp at the library had been completed. It was stated that there needed to be some adjustment to the threshold of the Handicap Accessible entrance at the library. Frank also stated there had been many water customers that were not paying their bills in a timely manner, some waited until the end of the month. Frank also stated the charge for loadout water was lower than the residential customers charge for water. It was suggested that a rate of 25 cents per 100 gallons be charged.

Charles Kuntz presented cash receipts and disbursements and discussed same. After discussion, the motion to amend the budget as recommeded was made by Jay Randels, seconded by Jimmy, and passed unanimously.

Tommy Holcomb and Bart Sherell, representing the Texas Department of Transportation provided information regarding US 83 and school and speed zone adjustments which would be implemented with installation of lights and signs. Barbra Koelzer made motion seconded by Jimmy Hill to adopt an Ordinance zoning for traffic and rate of speed on US Highway 83 in the city limits of Wheeler. The motion carried unanimously.

The City Council went into executive session at 7:38 PM to discuss real property and water rights and for consultation with the Attorney for the Council, Ken Fields. This action was pursuant to Texas Open Meetings

Act, Code Sec. 551.071 and 555.072. The Council returned to open session at 7:56 P.M.

Marla Ford, Wheeler Economic Development Coordinator, made a presentation regrading the Sewer plant and Prairie Rivers Trail. She requested the Council not to take action affecting the Sewer Plant as a Public Site on the Prairie Rivers Trail until she could obtain more information regarding this matter.

The U-Turn Ordinance was tabled. The Council went into executive session at 8:23 PM in order to review summer help application and library employee applications, pursuant to Texas Open Meetings Act, Code Sec. 551.000740.

The Council returned to open session at 8:33 P.M. No action was taken.

Barbra Koelzer made motion, seconded by Walter Simmons to advertise for a Swimming Pool Manager. The motion carried.

The city water rates were discussed. After much discussion and comparison of water rates with Shamrock and Canadian, Jimmy Hill made the motion, seconded by Jay Randels to change the water rates for the customers in the City of Wheeler. The minimum charge of \$7.50 for 3,000 gallons for residential customers and \$9.50 per 3,000 for business will not change, but the next 8,000 gal will be \$1.85 per 1000 gallons; usage above 11,000 gallons will be charged \$2.25 per 1,000 gallons. The motion passed unanimously.

Bob McCain made motion, seconded by Walter Simmons to change the water reconnect fee from \$5.00 to \$20.00. The motion carried unanimously.

Jimmy Hill made a motion for Mayor Wanda Herd to order an election to be held May 4, 2002, to elect a Mayor and Council members Place #2 and #4. Walter Simmons seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Fire sirens were discussed. Walter Simmons stated there were several persons who know how to turn off the sirens in case of electrical problems instead of only one person.

The motion to exempt travel trailers from Wheeler City Tax was made by Jay Randels, and seconded by Barbra Koelzer. The motion passed unanimously.

PIONEER AWARD:




The whole family worked together for it's livelihood. Food was grown and preserved on the farm. The family ate three meals a day together.





She brought the Homemaking Cooperative Education Program to Wheeler Schools. She served on the State Advisory Cooperative Education Committee for cooperative educations. She organized the Young Homemakers Association, which was recognized as the Outstanding New Chapter in Texas the year it was organized. In 1982 she was awarded Honorary Membership to the Area Young Homemakers Association of Texas for Outstanding service to that organization.


