Local citizens will have the opportunity to attend the performance of Wheeler's one-act play. A local performance has been set for Thursday evening at the auditorium.


And if you haven't had the opportunity to purchase Girl Scout Cookies, you can do so Thursday afternoon at Thriftway.

Wheeler Chamber Seeks Landowners To Lease Land For Turkey Hunters

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce is seeking farmers, ranchers or land owners willing to lease their land for the hunting of turkeys. The project has been an annual event since 1988 and offers the individuals an opportunity to earn extra money for the use of their land.

Turkey season this year is April 6 thru May 12.

Landowners receive payment for each hunter on their land. The hunters are screened and sign liability releases. The number of hunters on an individual piece of land is determined by the bird population. Five farmers and ranchers participated in the hunt last year, representing 4,400 acres of land.

The Wheeler area has an abundance of wild turkeys and the annual turkey season draws the attention of hunters from over the nation. Wheeler hosted 10 hunters from over the nation last year and has received national coverage over the past years through magazine newspaper articles.

At the present time 12 hunters have registered for this year's hunt. More hunters are expected to register between now and turkey season. Several of these are repeats from last year. The inquiries and/or hunters have come from South Carolina, Oklahoma, Utah, Minnesota and Missouri.

This would be an excellent opportunity for an alternate income for farmers and ranchers. Last year farmers and ranchers were paid 1,755 dollars.

Darrel Gaines and Robert Ford are the chamber representatives for the turkey hunt. Any landowner or individual needing more information on the hunt or leasing may contact the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber number is 806/826-3408.

The Chamber will also contract land for deer and quail hunting, during season.



dils the snow is like a clean blanket covering them until spring arrives. For the little birds it's time to search


for a morsel of food. Truck drivers, who earn their daily bread in the truck, dread to see the highways piled with snow.


Spring Break Exploring 4-H Activities Planned

Controling Sandbur In Bermuda With Herbicide

Controlling sandbur while promoting a strong bermudagrass stand has long been a problem. But effective, selective weed control in bermudagrass is now possible, according to some promising research on a herbicide known a Plateau herbicide.

Studied by universities and the herbicide's manufacturer, BASF, indicate the Plateau promotes a purer stand of bermudagrass by controlling a broad range of summer annual and perennial grasses and broadleaf weeds, including sandbur, large crabgrass, rhizome and seedling Johnsongrass, vasegrass, yellow and purple nutsedge and broadleaf signalgrass. Plateau offers flexible application timing and residual control for later week flushes. Research from Texas A&M University indicates that the use of Plateau will cause the temporary suppression of bermudagrass growth, reducing the yield of the first cutting after application. However, the research also indicates that the second cutting after application outperforms the first, while treatment results in a more pure stand of bermudagrass. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is currently reviewing the application for use of Plateau on pasture and rangeland. Approval of that application is expected by the end of the year. Plateau is a non-restricted use pesticide. Proposed labeling includes no grazing restrictions. However, hay cannot be harvested for 7 days after treatment with Plateau. Refer to label for application rates and timing.



Weed Control To NRCS Be Checked By

The Natural Resources Conservation Service field personnel will be checking newly seeded CRP grass fields for weed problems. There are a lot of tiny weeds coming up in the CRP fields right now. Producers are urged to control weeds in their newly seeded grasses.


CRP producers have the choice to either do chemical or mechanical weed control. Chemical control is a lot more effective on the smaller weeds than the larger weeds. The chemical should be used before forbs or legumes are planted. Mechanical control is a lot more effective on the taller weeds than the smaller weeds. Your local NRCS would like for each producer to strongly consider the chemical control over the mechanical control. When you control weeds with chemical it may take up to 1 to 2 sprayings during the growing seasons. If you consider the mechanical control it make take up to 2 to 4 shredding during growing season. Weed control is a must to stay in compliance with your CRP contract.

The Farm Service Agency will only cost-share one weed control. Please check with either NRCS or FSA to check on the status of your contract. Weed control is required in all of the CRP contracts. If weeds are not controlled in a timely manner, NRCS will turn it over to FSA office. The CHP producers contract could be terminated or fined if weeds are not controlled. It is the responsibility of the CRP producers to control weeds on their CRP acreage without being told by your local NRCS office. At this time, the NRCS office doesn't have the manpower to check everyone CRP fields for weed problems. We urge producers to look at their field and let us know if you have any weed problems. 

National Agriculture Week In Texas Partial Listing On March 12 Ballot Celebrating in the Footsteps of Trailblazers Democratic Primary

Agriculture begins with the land, but it embraces an industry that provides products essential to our daily lives. It is easy for people to take for granted our agricultural abundance, made possible through the hard work and dedication of farmers, ranchers and many other agriculture professionals.

Texas is the second-largest agricultural state, accounting for approximately 7 percent of the total U.S. agricultural income and generating \$80 billion a year for the state's economy. As the second-largest industry in the Lone Star State, agriculture touches every Texan's life in some form or fashion from the food we eat to the clothes we wear to the houses we live in.

Today's Texas agricultural industry starts with the farms and ranches then extends to production, processing, transportation and retail, reaching every Texas home.

"Understanding agriculture gives us a sense of where things come from. It focuses our attention upon the impact that agriculture has on our lives, and should make us more appreciative of the hard work and dedication that make it all possible," Combs said.

Texas' agricultural heritage extends back more than 200 years.

"That is why you can't look at Texas agriculture without seeing real people who are willing to take the risks and brave uncertainties, from the weather to the marketplace, these individuals forged our state's rich agricultural heritage," she said. Today cattle still graze on much of the land in Jim Hogg County that Simon De Hinojosa received as a Spanish land grant when he came to Texas in 1740. Generation after generation, Hinojosa's descendents continued to tend the land, initiating conservation practices to protect their agricultural heritage. Today Isidro Gitienez Jr. and his sister Idela are seventh-generation ranchers.

A 200-year-old rock house stands on Jose Luis Gonzalez' ranch in Jim Hogg County. Six generations ago Jose Miguel Crisanto Ramirez, a Mexico born rancher who came to Texas in 1779 to expand his livestock operation, placed it there. Six generations later, the family still uses the historic structure, and cattle graze on the land that has produced livestock and cotton as well as an enduring legacy of land and water conservation and community support that are integral parts of Texas' heritage.

"These are just two of many examples of the legacy of Texas agriculture, of people who have carried our state's agricultural heritage through good times and bad," Combs said. "These are the folks who have stuck through the tough times, whether it was severe weather, pests or economic downturns like the Great Depression, and they persevered, crafting a legacy in which we all can take pride".

"It's the same pioneering spirit we see in our farmers and ranchers today," Combs said. "They are true stewards of the land who utilize technology and research to grow better tasting fruits and vegetables, offer products that are more nutritious and that provide greater convenience for consumers."

It is an industry that continues to meet the ever-increasing needs of consumers throughout Texas and around the world.



Just a reminder to FRED participants to start logging the minutes you are reading to your child. The start date was March 3rd so remember to log those minutes and have fun reading!

Communicating Effectively Fathers who are effective communicating with their children are those who are clear and direct. This means that the intended message can be clearly understood by the listener and is directed at the appropriate target (Epstein, Bishop, Ryan, Miller, and Keitner, 1993). Children will be much more likely to develop effective communication skills if their fathers model and encourage clarity and directness. Use "I"messages. I-messages are statements that reflect what a sender is thinking or feeling at a particular moment. I-messages focus on the parent, rather than the child. These statements are typically non-threatening and non-judgmental. I-messages stand in contrast to You-messages, which often put down blame, and nag children (Dinkmeyer, McKay, and Dinkmeyer, 1989). For example, a father may say to a child, 'You did a bad job on your homework. The same parent using an I-message, could have said, "I think you could have put more effort into your homework." Imessages tend to be phrased more positively and encourage cooperation.
