Proposed rule changes must be in the County Extension Office by 5:00 p.m., Monday, April 8th. Rule changes submitted after that date must pass by a two-thirds majority.

Anyone interested in joining the Association can do so by contacting the County Extension Office and obtaining a membership application and paying a \$5.00 membership fee. Parents of county livestock exhibitors are invited to attend and strongly urged to participate. Applications and the \$5.00 membership fee must be turned in prior to the Annual Membership Meeting.

Local Student Wins First In Statewide Contest

Dawson Clark, a student at Sibyl's School of Art in Wheeler, was the first place winner in the statewide competition for his entry in the 2002 International Aviation Art Contest. Clark competed in the six to nine year-old category.

Clark, nine, received a certificate and was recognized for his artistic talents during the 20th annual Texas Aviation conference held in Austin.

The theme of this year's art contest was "Silent Flight". Entries were judged in one of three age groups, six to nine years old, 10 to 13 year olds and 14 to 17 years old.

This year 420 students participated in the art contest statewide.

The annual International Aviation Art Contest is sponsored by the National Aeronautic Association, National Association of State Aviation Officials and Federal Aviation Administration in cooperation with the Federation Aeronautique Internationale (FAI). The art contest is designed to motivate and encourage young people of FAI-member nations to become more familiar with and participate in aeronautics, engineering and science.

The 20th Annual Texas Aviation Conference is co-hosted by Texas Department of Transportation and the Texas Airport Management Association. Participants included airport managers, city and county officials, state-elected officials, the Federal Aviation Administration and others interested in aviation in Texas.

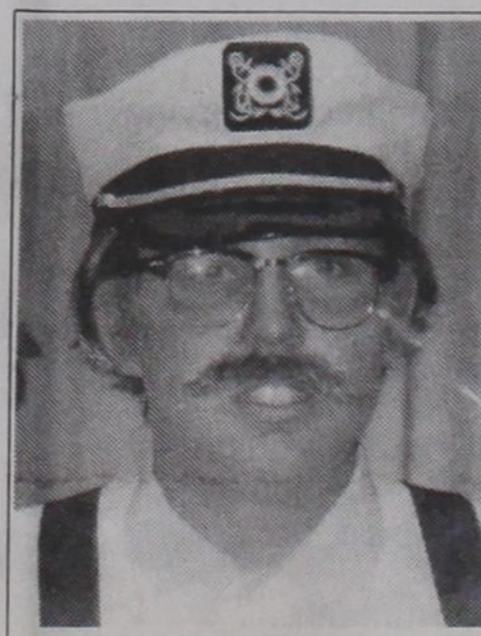

Bro. Ralph Hovey is home from the Veterans Hospital. He and Mary need our prayers. Such sweet people. Ralph is poorly.

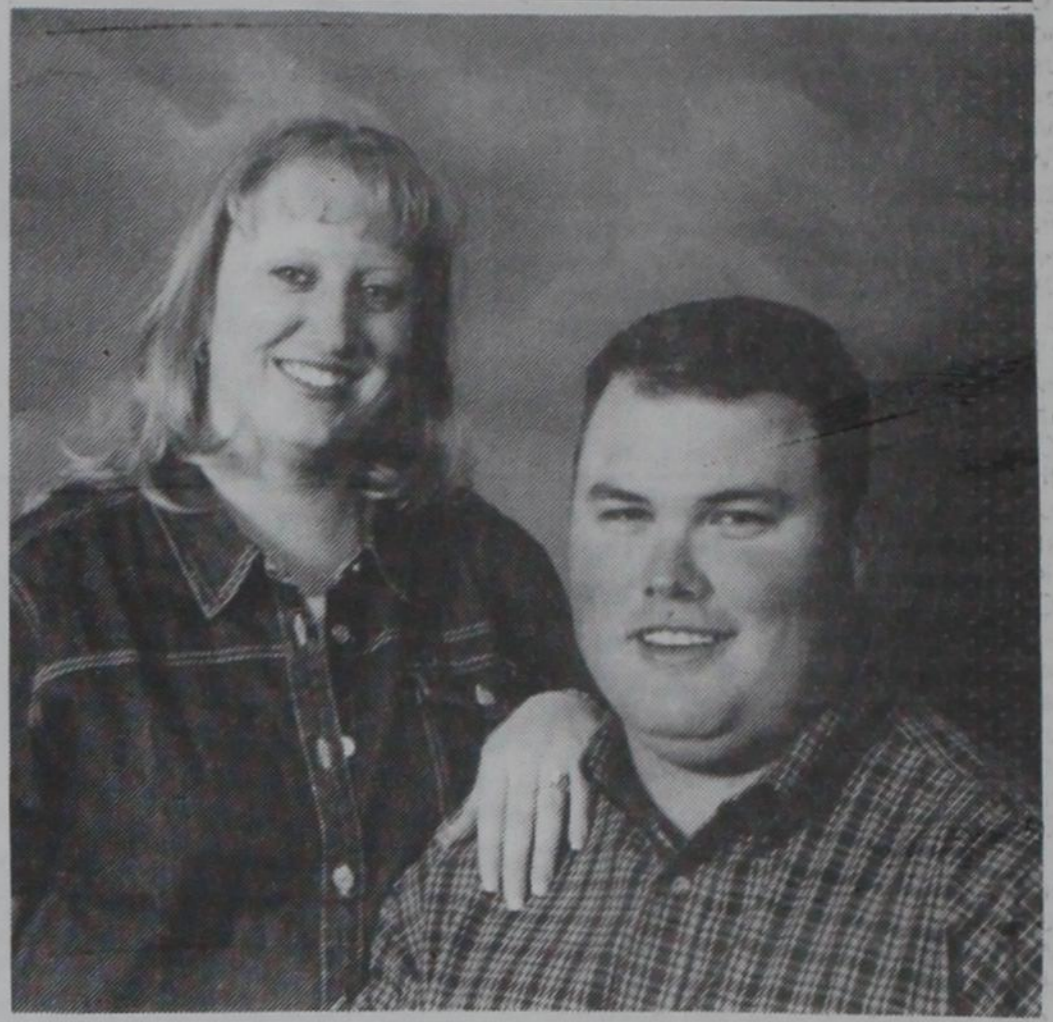

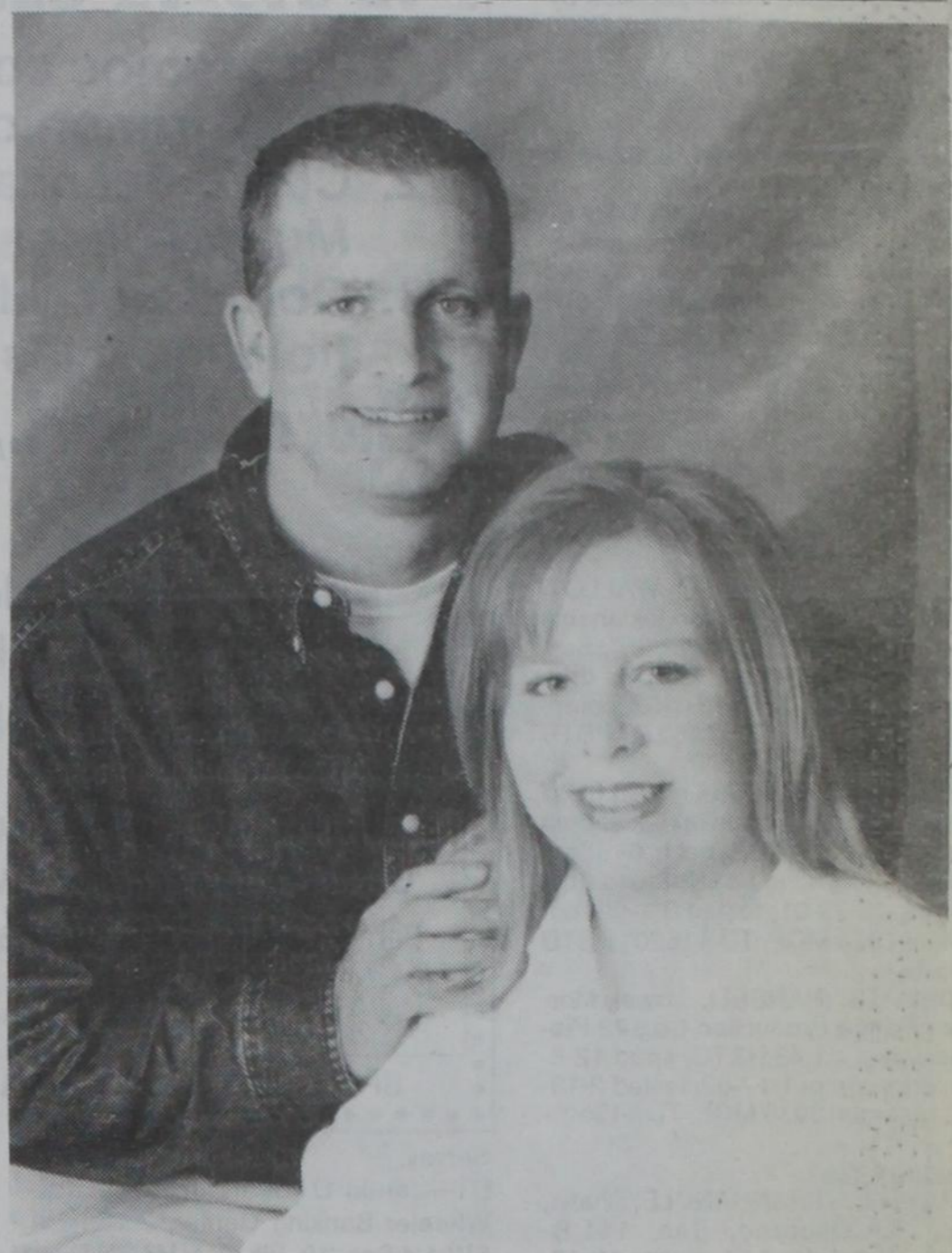

Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office . . . or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?
You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?
The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2001. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2002.

What is the deadline?
The last day for filing 2002 renditions is April 15. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.

From January 14, 1932 Wheeler News Review and Mobeetie News. Mail Plane Crashes, Burns Near Mobeetie. Pilot wanders from route in heavy fog. Escapes with only slight injury; saves 14 sacks of mail as flames destroy plane. Lost in the fog, the motor missing and the gasoline supply almost exhausted a Western Air Express all-metal mail plane crashed into the Santa Fe railroad embankment about one mile west of Mobeetie around 1:30 a. m. Thursday when pilot Ted Hereford attempted a forced landing in a field. The plane was one of those on the Kansas City to Amarillo jump of the transcontinental mail route. It left Kansas City for Amarillo with 32 sacks of mail at 9:15 p.m.

Wednesday. The beacon lights obscured by heavy fog the pilot wandered south from his route. He said he had been lost about two hours before the crash. He was first attracted by the lights of the Jowett Power Station. Flying on west he saw the lights of Mobeetie circled the town two or three times and decided to try a landing. Coming down, the plane struck the Santa Fe right-of-way fence, plowing through the four stands of barbed wire and plunging into the soft dirt of the embankment. Fire broke out almost at the instant it came to rest, the pilot said. He fought the flames with the extinguisher carried in the plane, but could not check the blaze. He was able to save fourteen sacks of mail; eleven of which were registered. The pilot was only slightly injured. The fuselage of the plane and one wing was totally destroyed. One wing and the tail assembly were undamaged and the motor was only slightly damaged. The machine was valued at between \$25,000 and \$30,000.

M. E. Dikay superintendent of mails and C. B. Wilber, field manager for Western Air Express, both of Amarillo notified of the crash arrived in Mobeetie at 5 p.m. Thursday. They took charge of the rescued mail and photographed the ruins of the plane. Dunn's Buy Interest In Mobeetie Store. Geo B. Dunn and son John Dunn, of Mobeetie, have acquired the interest of Dr. H. 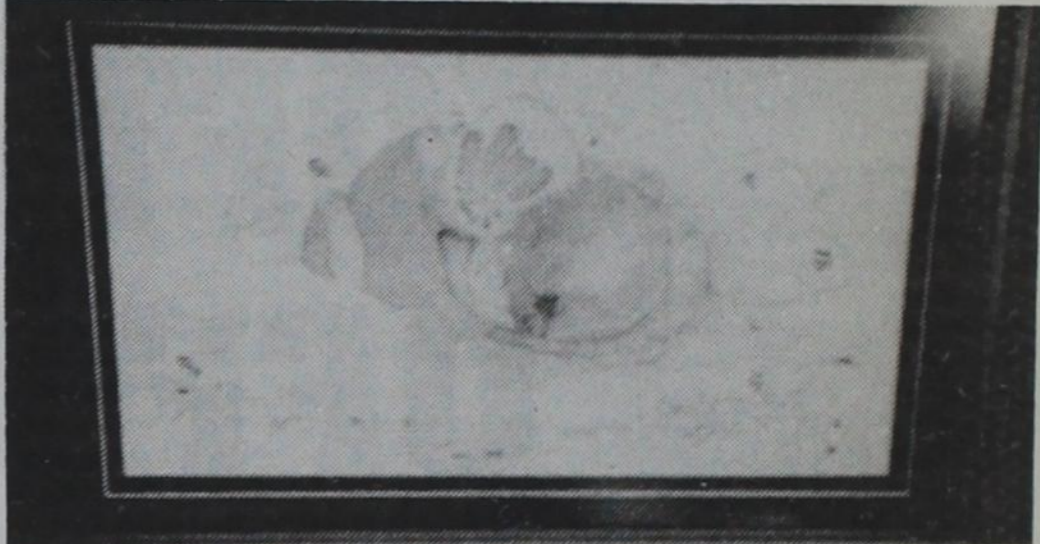

STORM WARNING INFORMATION

If tornadic conditions are detected the storm sirens will be sounded. When the sirens sound you should enter a storm shelter immediately. (The County Courthouse will be open for persons without access to a cellar.) The siren will sound for 105 seconds. The WVFD will NOT give an "ALL CLEAR" signal. YOU are responsible for determining when the weather conditions are settled enough to leave your shelter. The siren will only sound when dangerous conditions exist and for testing each Saturday at 12 noon. For those with scanning radios, the following list of frequencies will keep you informed of weather conditions: 154.310 MHz—Wheeler Volunteer Fire Dept. 159.360 MHz—Area Fire Dept. Repeater 154.725 MHz—4-County Repeater 155.460 MHz—Dept. of Public Safety, Amarillo 162.550—National Weather Service, Amarillo 155.580—MHz Wheeler Sheriff Office, Local 155.370 MHz Intercity NOTE: If the siren sounds during the school day, parents are ask not to go to the school after their children. The Wheeler School is prepared for such a situation; the basement under the gymnasium will house students and school personnel.
