





Wheeler Students Take Honors In 2002 **U.I.L. District Academic Competition**

Wheeler students participated in the 2002 U.I.L. District Academic competition on March 20-21 at Amarillo College. Nine schools were represented in the competition with Wheeler placing second with 156 points, following Stratford with 287.

The total number of students participating in the competition was 414. Wheeler entered nine of the events.

With 22 individuals entered in Calculator Applications, Wheeler students took the top three places and as a team took first place honors. Students in the order of their placing were Andrew Hampton, Hadley Mitchell and James Chapman. As a team, Wheeler had 627 points; second was Gruver with 361 points.

Twenty-one students competed in Literary Criticism. Wheeler's team took first place honors with 175 points, compared to Stratford with 135 points. Individually, the students Jake Britt, Blaine Rutherford, Gavin McQueen and Cassie Brown placed 2nd,3rd,5th & 6th.

Tyler Lewis placed fifth in a field of 28 students in Mathematics.

Wheeler students James Chapman, Andrew Hampton and Lindsey Lewis placed 4th, 5th and 6th individually with 26 students competing in Number Sense. As a team the local team took second place honors with 187 points, behind Stratford with

In Science competition, Tyler Lewis took second place honors in Biology. The science team scored 206 points, behind Vega with 332 points. Team members were Ben Howard, Tyler Lewis and Dagen Moore.

Wheeler's Pam Murphey took second place honors in the Speech Events. Four students were entered. In Extemporaneous Speaking (Persuasive) Hadley Mitchell earned

fourth place in a field of 17 students. Wheeler's Saharay Barboza competed against 23 other high school students in Editorial Writing and brought home fifth place.




Texas Tech University recently announced its President's and Dean's Lists for the 2001 fall semester.



Mobeetie Jail Museum News The Mobeetie Jail Museum need pictures of men from Wheeler County that served in World War 2 for a display. They also need the branch of service and a brief history of the men. Any help would be appreciated.

Also need information of anyone that remembers an old saloon, trading post, or outpost about 12 miles west of Mobeetie on the Roberts/ Gray county line. They think a man of the name of Pheiffer, who passed the property to the Totty Family of Mobeetie in the early 1900's, built it. The building was rather large for the time about 30 feet X 50 feet of native cliche rock with a dugout, and two other small buildings. Only the foundations remain. This is to help the Roberts County Historical Society with a historical map of Roberts County.

A Recipe found in the paper was Dixie Relish

1 quart of chopped cabbage



1 pint chopped white onions

1 pint sweet red pepper 1 pint sweet green pepper

4 tablespoon salt 2-tablespoon celery seed crushed 3/4 cup sugar

4-tablespoon mustard seed: 1 quart cider vinegar

Soak the peppers in brime (1-cup salt to 1-gallon water) for 24 hours. Drain well, remove seeds and coarse white sections, chop separately and measure the chopped cabbage, peppers and onions before mixing. Add spices, sugar and vinegar. Let stand over night, cover in crock or enameled vessel. Next morning drain off juice, pack in jars pour over vinegar which was drained off, be careful to remove air bubbles. Garnish each jar with 2 slender strips of red pepper. Placing strips vertically on seams on opposite sides ofjar. Process for 15 minutes at 180 degrees Simmering.

taxes on your farm,

ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2002 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.



A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium, or mobile home. (Counties, cities, and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2001 you won't need to reapply for 2002 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you 've moved to a new home you'll need to file for an exemption for 2002. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you become disabled during 2001 you need to file for the disabled person's exemp-

When and where should I file?

county just across the river offers them \$4,000, \$5,000 or even \$6,000 more a year. Common sense dictates what they'll do."

An annual turnover among deputies and certified jailers in excess of 33 percent isn't unusual in many of the State's rural counties.

In one instance, I know there are more former Deputies working for law enforcement agencies in an adjacent county than are currently employed in that County.

Of course, the adjacent County out-numbers its neighbors to the west by a 9-1 margin. And the fact that the two county seats are only 25 miles apart and joined by a four lane, divided highway makes it even more

So it's easy to see why many of our youngest and brightest peace officers are jumping ship.

The Sheriff in the first County referenced only makes \$30,000 a year, which is low. Yet, it's a figure that he accepts, because he knew what the salary was when he ran for the job.

But, \$18,500 a year for a deputy sheriff is a horse of a different color. If he's got a wife and a kid or two, chances are he'll qualify for food stamps. In this day and time, rent and a car payment can wipe out most of the \$1,100 a month take home pay.

This County isn't alone, however, in its struggle to keep quality officers. A sheriff in another county recently lost a deputy who had been with him for over 11 years.

That Sheriff was almost in tears as he said, "He knew the county like the back of his hand; he knew the drug pushers and usually had a gut instinct about a burglary. We lost him because he couldn't make it on \$21,500 a year. He would have stayed for \$24,000 because this was his home, but he left for a job in an adjoining county that pays \$26,000." Law enforcement is no longer just

about pinning a badge on your chest and strapping a .45 around your waist. It's all about training and spe-

These folks are professionals whether we recognize it or not. And an officer who doesn't have a basic understanding of the penal code or code of criminal procedure can sink a ship before it ever leaves the port. Just ask the DA that has the responsibility of trying some of their cases.

Juries aren't kind to officers who make stupid mistakes. They expect professionalism, because that's what they've seen on television.

Most Sheriffs won't complain when they lose a good officer to the Department of Public Safety Academy, because they see that as a career defining opportunity. But when an officer leaves to pursue a job in an unrelated field, it's an even bigger loss.

The business community is always looking for good people and many have deep pockets with a benefit package to match.

And that is something that can be extremely attractive since most officers work far more than 40 hours a week, only to get comp time that they are never able to use. Many are on call 24 hours a day and weekends or holidays with their family are few and

It's time local governments established a career ladder and recognized these officers for what they are: pro-

The larger cities and metropolitan areas have and that's why we're seeing a steady migration in their direc-
