### **Unofficial Count Shows Puryear Leads By 1 Vote**

A recount is likely in the Wheeler County Precinct 2 Commissioners Race. Three hundred & Ninety-seven voters in precinct 2 cast their ballots Tuesday; 199 voted for incumbent Tom Puryear and 198 voted for Dwayne Baker.

A recount request is likely after the canvassing of the votes.

In the primary election on March 12, the three candidate shared 334 votes. Baker received 148 votes and Puryear received 130.

There are 923 registered voters in commissioner's precinct 2. Tuesday's vote was a 43% voter turout.

### **Baptist Bible Drill Team** For State Competition

The Bible Drill team from 1st Bapist Church, Wheeler will be traveling o Lubbock, Friday April 12th to combete in the Children's State Drill, and the Youth Semi-State Drill.

In Bible Drill the children memorize 25 verses and 10 Key Passages. They must also know the books of the Bible and be able to locate any book or Key Passage within 10 seconds. A perfect score is 24, and to advance to the state level the children must have scored 16 or higher in the Associational Drill. Those competing at State level are Josh Henson, Nicole Moore, and Kelby Vice.

At the youth level the students memorize 10 Doctrinal verses, 10 Bible Questions with Answers, and 10 Identifying verses. They must be able to locate any of these, plus any book of the Bible and random verses within 8 seconds. A perfect score is 300 and to advance to the Semi-State level they must have scored 200 or higher in the Associational Drill. Those competing at the Semi-State level are Lauren Fite, Jonathan Hampton, and Ryan Henson. Please remember these students in your Prayers.

Leave your child's other records at home. Bring all records when you come

to enroll your child in the fall. If your child is unable to visit, but you plan for him to attend Kindergarten at Wheeler I.S.D., please call the elementary office at 826-5934 and leave your child's name, address and telephone number.

What degrees do you have? A Batchelor of Arts in Mathematics and a Masters in Math Education. What are some of your thoughts about teaching?



### State Conservat'n Board Offers Videos To Public

The Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB) offers a large selection of conservationrelated videos to the public for loan. Over 150 videos are available at no charge to soil and water conservation districts, public and private schools and public organization.

"The video library is a resource that we want the public to take advantage of," said Kris Parker, Director of External Customer Relations. "These are great learning tools on most every subject in conservation."

In addition to the video library, the TSSWCB offers two hands-on educational models to loan. The Watershed Model shows students the effects of non-point source pollution and how it makes its way to lakes and streams. The Groundwater Flow Model shows a cross section of soil layers and illustrates how pollutants can travel in groundwater.

"Both educational models give the students a very clear picture of how pollution affects us and why it is important to take care of our land," Parker said.

Rockville, MD-The Stem Cell Research Foundation (SCRF), a program of the American Cell Therapy Research Foundation, has awarded its first research grant to John D. Dr. Gearhart and his co-investigator, Michael J. in November 1998 that he had isolated human stem cells and had found a way to maintain them in their pluripotent state. The cells must be maintained in their undifferentiated form before they can be used in research to treat diseases. Dr. Gearhart and Dr. James Thompson of the University of Wisconsin were the first scientists to succeed (separately) in deriving and maintaining these powerful

Past studies have shown that human embryonic stem cells are difficult to grow and maintain in culture. One reason is that the cells stick tightly to each other, making them difficult to separate and manipulate in the laboratory. Under the \$300,000 SCRF grant, Dr. Gearhart and his colleagues will attempt to identify molecules on the cells' surfaces that bind them together and find a safe way to separate them.

The scientists are also working to establish a way to transfer genes into these pluripotent cells. Gene transfer will become much more important as stem cell technologies move close: to implantation in humans. Transferring an individual's genes into therapeutic stem cells before implant ; them could radically reduce the possibility of the body rejecting the cells.

The Gearhart team is also seeking

to develop cell lines exclusively from human tissue sources, thereby avoiding the issue of possible contamination from mouse feeder cells and other animal growth factors. The issue of mingling with animal cells applies to most, if not all, of the stem cell lines President Bush approved last year for federal research funding. If Dr. Gearhart can develop a cell line without using any animal products, his cells would not have to pass FDA standards for animal-to-human transplantation as most of the other cell lines will have to. "Dr. Gearhart is one of the most knowledgeable and respected researchers in this field," said Brian T. Regan, Ph.D., president of the SCRF and the American Cell Therapy Research Foundation. "We believe that his work is very important if we are to unlock the incredible potential of human pluripotent stem Dr. Susan Garfinkel, also a spokes-

person for the SCRF, said, "We hope to till in the gaps by supporting research that isn't eligible for federal funding under the current restrictions. Dr. Gearhart's work addresses several of the scientific hurdles we need to overcome to move the field of stem cell research forward." For more information about stem
