



### **Wheeler Kindergarten Registration Packets**

Any child who will be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1, of this year is eligible to attend kindergarten.

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler I.S.D. kindergarten during this school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on busi-

ness days. This packet contains information necessary for enrollment and the required forms. The estimated length of time needed to finish the forms is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents, who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.

Kindergarten registration will be in the Wheeler school cafeteria on Friday, August 16, from 9:00 a.m. and registration will be at the same location and time.

1. Qualifying Condition: Economic disadvantage, based on the W.S. Department of Agriculture's guidelines for free and reducedprice lunches. If a child qualifies for free or reduced lunches he qualifies for Pre-Kindergarten.

2. Qualifying Condition: English is not the native language of the child. (ESL) Parents will enter the name of the native language of the child using the Home Language Survey. If a child's native language is not English he qualifies for Pre-

Kindergarten. If you believe your child will qualify to attend Pre-Kindergarten and wish to submit an application on his behalf, please come to the Wheeler School Cafeteria Friday August 16, 2002 any time from 9:00-11:00 a.m. You must bring with you a copy of your child's birth

### 2002 Property Tax Rates in CITY OF MOBEETIE

This notice concerns 2002 property tax rates for CITY OF MOBEETIE. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.
