The Old Mobeetie Association is presenting "The Last Rose", a Civil War musical living history presentation at the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum on August 16, 2002 at 8:00 p.m. under the arbor. The performers are William and Carla Coleman, professional entertainers for Cold Comfort Productions in Woodburn, OR. They have written, directed and featured in a variety of historic and contemporary productions for the stage. Their Civil War lectures and performances have taken them throughout the United States since 1997, receiving standing ovations and rave reviews from enthusiastic audiences. "The Last Rose" is a story about Pvt. George Boatright

of the 12th Georgia Battalion who was first introduced to Mattie Burrows, a sixteen year old Georgia planter's daughter, at a reception for soldiers leaving for the front in March 1863. This would tragically be their only meeting, yet over the course of the following year and a half his letters reveal in intimate detail a sweet love story set against the dark tapestry of Civil War. Wheeler County Commissioners Meet In Regular Session Mon.

The Wheeler County Commissioners' Court met in regular session on Monday, August 12, 2002. Twenty-four items were on the agenda.

The minutes were read and approved.

The J. P. reports were accepted. The hourly payroll time sheets were approved for payment as were the bills.

The consideration of amendments of budget was tabled.

The abatement of the asbestos at the courthouse is completed

with the removal of lead base paint is scheduled to begin next week.

Item number seven was consideration of the burn ban. The commissioners see no need for the burn ban at the present time.

The architectural firm, Wharry Engineering will be hired by the county to oversee the construction part of the courthouse restoration. The contract is in the amount of \$174,118.00. The county's portion of this expense is approximately 19%.

The court accepted the appointment of election judges and assistants for the November General election as presented by Margaret Dorman.

Item number 10 was "Consideration of a Resolution for Tax Exemption for Charitable Organizations". This was tabled for further study.

Ken Daughtry, Emergency Manager Coordinator met with the commissioners to establish a County Emergency Management Program. It is necessary to establish a County Emergency Management Program to receive any assistance from the state or federal government in case of a natural disaster.

The commissioners also ordered the establishment of an Interjurisdictional Emergency Management Program, which brings the county and cities together in case of natural disaster.

Mr. Daughtry also requested an air conditioner for the basement room of the Wheeler Fire Department, since he has to work there with the courthouse under restoration. The commissioners will allow him to use one of the window units not in use at the courthouse for the present time.

Virgil Simmons met with the council to determine the width of the county right-of-way on his property. The commissioners will check the records to determine the width of the right-of-way.

The commissioners will also offer their support of a "Resolution for Texas Travel Trails Tourism Program. This project will bring birdwatchers, etc. to our area.

Dixie Chick was removed from the county payroll. She worked in the County Attorney's office.

Patricia Guthrie, an employee of the County Clerk, will be moved to the County Attorney's office. No action was taken in filling the vacancy in the County Clerk's office.

No action was taken in setting the tax rate.

The contract with EcoSystems for the asbestos and lead based paint removal was accepted. Their contract is in the amount of \$32,000—the county's part is 19%.

Item 21 was the consideration of an employee hiring freeze. The item was discussed and tabled until a later date.

Items 22 and 23 concerned danger of three Sheriff's department vehicles and one EMS vehicle exploding on impact from the rear. Permission was given to have the vehicles modified and the county will enter into a suit with other entities for the re-embursement from Ford Motor Co. for the expense of the modifications.

Mobeetie City Council held their regular meeting at 7:00 P.M. at the Mobeetie City Hall. Gordon Estes led in opening prayer. He stated that some changes from the way we conducted the meeting due to Laura Fern Selby resignation as City Secretary. He moved the resignation to the front of the meeting. Gordon Estes asks her to stay on a few weeks and Laura Fern Selby agreed, but they would not use her today for the meeting. He asked Patricia Kephart to read the minutes and reports. He asked Emma Swigart to take the minutes for the meeting. He then asked for a motion to table the resignation at this time. Gaylord Thompson made the motion and Dale Corcoran second the motion. It carried 5-0.

Gordon Estes then read the resignation of Tom Swigart as the city mower, since it was a conflict with Emma Swigart being on the council. Motion by Patricia Kephart and second by Gaylord Thompson to accept the motion effected immediate. Carried 2 for and 3 abstaining. Voting for Gaylord Thompson and Patricia Kephart abstaining Jerry Martinez, Emma Swigart and Dale Corcoran.

Patricia Kephart then read the minutes. Motion to accept as read by Patricia Kephart and second by Emma Swigart. Carried 3 for and 2 abstaining. Voting for Gaylord Thompson, Patricia Kephart and Emma Swigart abstaining Dale Corcoran and Jerry Martinez.

Patricia Kephart gave the financial reports. Motion by Dale Corcoran to accept the reports and second by Jerry Martinez. Carried 5-0. Next item was paying the bills. Patricia Kephart made a motion to

Superintendent's Notes On Wheeler's Proposed Tax Rate

Local school districts are being expected to carry more and more of the financial responsibility for educating our children. The state formula for funding a local school district is tied to a number of factors. The following items are included: enrollment/attendance, the

local school district's demographic make-up, the local school district's geographic size, the local school district's property appraisals, and the local school district's tax effort. For some districts with high local property wealth, the formula even forces them to send away local tax money to "equalize" the property wealth among school districts.

Wheeler ISD is not a property rich district, so we do not receive state funds to assist our local tax effort. However, according to the state funding formulas, Wheeler ISD will receive \$147,300 or 15% less in state aid this year. This reduction in funding would be even greater if our local property appraisals had not risen this year to match what the state comptroller says our district's property appraisals are. When our local appraisals are less than what the state comptroller certifies, we receive even less funding from the state.

A Notice of Public Meeting To Discuss Budget and Proposed Tax Rate has been published in this paper in this issue. This year's proposed rate is \$1.50, which is up \$.026 from last year's rate. This rate is needed to generate the revenues that Wheeler ISD needs to offset the drop in state funding and to seek to rebuild our district's fund balance. Please know that the administration and school board of Wheeler ISD are very mindful of the effects of raising property appraisals and of a higher proposed tax rate on our local property owners. The proposed budget for Wheeler ISD for 2002-03 has already been reduced by 6.44% compared to the 2001-02 budget.

Wheeler has an outstanding school system with a rich academic and extracurricular tradition. Our administration and school board will do all that we can to keep Wheeler ISD in a sound financial position, so that we can continue to provide a quality education for our students.

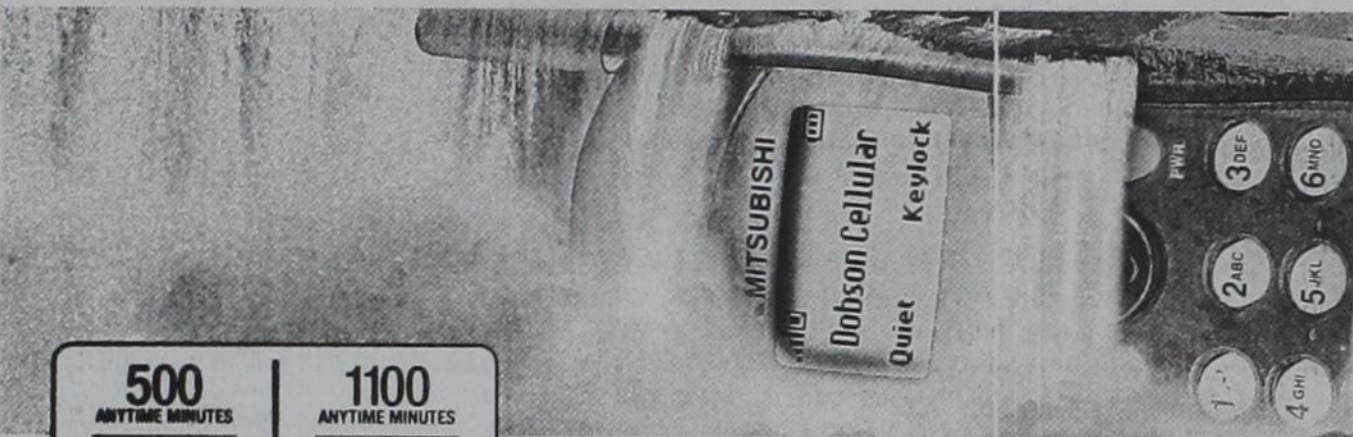

2002 Property Tax Rates NORTH WHEELER COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT

This notice concerns 2002 property tax rates for NORTH HSPT DIST # 1. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

Wheeler Kindergarten Registration Packets

Any child who will be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1, of this year is eligible to attend kindergarten.

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler I.S.D. kindergarten during this school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

This packet contains information necessary for enrollment and the required forms. The estimated length of time needed to finish the forms is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. 2793, 2788, and 2785. Jerry Martinez seconded motion. Motion Carried 5-0. Jerry Martinez made a motion to pay checks 2294, 2295, 2793, 2788 and 2785. Gaylord Thompson seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. Voting for Gaylord Thompson, Patricia Kephart and Jerry Martinez. Dale Corcoran and Emma Swigart abstained.

New Business was Affidavit—Conflict of Interest. Gordon Estes asked Dale Corcoran what this was about. Dale Corcoran asked Laura Fern Selby if any Affidavit had been filed since she was secretary. Laura Fern Selby answered no. Gordon Estes asked for an explanation on this. Dale Corcoran said he needed to know due to legal steps. Emma Swigart asked what they were. Dale Corcoran replied about Gordon Estes bringing up dropping the lawsuit the city had against Gordon and Wanda Estes. Gordon Estes then introduced his personal attorney Jim Fling to answer this question which was very vague. He didn't address the subject just gave a general reading about affidavits.

Next was Review Councilman's employment—Conflict of Interest Texas Gov't. Code 551.074 (Executive Session). Dale Corcoran asked whom they were going to review. Gordon Estes replied that by Dale Corcoran being on the council and taking care of the water. Gordon Estes had approached Emma Swigart on becoming the City Secretary. Gordon Estes checked and found that Emma Swigart couldn't be city secretary and a council member. Gordon Estes was sure that Dale Corcoran could not work and be a council member. Gordon Estes checked and said it was the law that he could not. Emma Swigart corrected him and said it was not a law but a doctorate. Dale Corcoran requested that they not go into executive session to discuss him. Gordon Estes said Dale Corcoran had that right and they would stay in regular session. Emma Swigart said the City Council could pass an ordinance to allow members to be paid employees. Patricia Kephart felt that council members should not be allowed to be hired but to volunteer to do the work. All

Employees should be separated from the council. Gaylord Thompson agreed with her. Dale Corcoran stated that he had been taking care of the system to save the city money. He read meters, set meters, checked the well, did minor repairs, and took samples to Amarillo for less than they could get someone else. Gordon Estes told Dale Corcoran he had a choice to resign from the water or the city council. He had been doing this for \$100.00 to \$250.00 a month for eleven years. Dale Corcoran told them they could get someone else. Melba Corcoran pulled her water license at this point. Patricia Kephart made a motion to not pass a City Ordinance to allow Council Members to be paid city employees in accordance with the law. Died for lack of a second. Motion by Gaylord Thompson to table this to the next meeting. Patricia Kephart seconded the motion. Carried 2-0-3. Voting for Patricia Kephart and Gaylord Thompson and Abstaining Emma Swigart, Jerry Martinez and Dale Corcoran.

Gordon Estes asked The First State Bank to come up with a proposal for keeping the city books. He reported that the bank would charge the city \$300.00 a month for several months while getting the system in place and then would charge \$250.00 a month. Gordon Estes asked Randy McCurley to explain what they would do. Randy McCurley said they would help the city in anyway they could. They will not keep anyone in the City Hall. They would type minutes and do reports. They would assist with the audit and everything will be put on the computer at the bank. The city will have to purchase their own supplies. They will not answer the phone for the city. They would send water statements. They will want to change some things that are now being done on the statements. Gordon Estes suggest that the city would have to hire someone for one day a week for 4 hours to go through the mail and answer the letters. The bank would pick up the mail each day and get all the checks and bills. The City would have to pick up the rest of the mail. Gordon Estes suggested that they could pick up the mail on Friday and get out the agendas. Randy McCurley said they would not have anyone to do the minutes that would be up to the council.

Gordon Estes said they need to have a special meeting about the 20th for the budget meeting, book-keeping proposal and Emergency Management Ordinance. Gordon Estes called for a motion to table this proposal to the next meeting. Dale Corcoran made the motion to table the proposal to the next meeting. Gaylord Thompson seconded the motion. Carried 5 to 0.

Gordon Estes thanked Randy McCurley for the proposal. Randy McCurley left the meeting at this time. Jim Fling left also. Gordon Estes thanked Jim Fling for coming.

The next item on the agenda was Gordon Estes is required by law to prepare a budget. He stated he estimated the amounts taken in and expense. He also handed out a copy of the budget and the budget from last year. Gordon Estes told the council to notice he left the income the same as last year. Gordon Estes proposed they lower the tax rates from .72% to .7084%. This will bring in the same income as last year due to the raise of the appraisal value of the property. Gordon Estes will be the city emergency management director and Tim Adcock Fire Chief will be this part of the county and city co-ordinate. Gordon Estes encouraged the council to vote for this tonight so they would abide to the rules of the state. Gaylord Thompson made a motion to adopt ordinance #34 for establishing comprehensive emergency management program for the city of Mobeetie as read. Patricia Kephart second the motion. Carried 5-0. Gordon Estes reported that the second reading would be at the special meeting.

Under old business was the water drop. Gordon Estes wanted to put this up for discussion. Patricia Kephart said she didn't think that we need a water drop. Gaylord Thompson said he didn't want it. Patricia Kephart made a motion to drop the water drop. Gaylord Thompson second the motion and it carried 5-0.

Dale Corcoran gave the water report. All reports were good. They finally have the chlorine up to .8 at the cafe. He had flushed all the lines. He had turned on one new meter. Jackie Don May had bought Terry Mick's house and had the water turned on Saturday.

Under the Mayor's report Gordon Estes reported that the roof had been repaired. He also reported that Ace Lundegreen that lives west of town wanted to run a line to tie on the city water. This will be discussed at the next meeting. Gordon Estes said that the bill from the Wheeler Appraisal District would be \$103.00 a quarter. Farm Credit Bank Has Solid Second Quarter

The Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) and its affiliated lending associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and Texas reported solid financial results for the second quarter of this year.

The bank and associations comprise the Tenth Farm Credit District, a network of rural lending cooperatives established in 1917 to provide agricultural and rural mortgage financing.

Tenth District loan volume totaled a record \$6.439 billion at June 30, 2002, reflecting a 7.2 percent increase from the \$6.009 billion loan balance reported at Dec. 31, 2001. This was the ninth consecutive quarter that the district set a new loan volume record. All of the growth occurred in the mortgage portfolio.

"Demand for rural real estate has remained strong largely because of favorable interest rates," said Arnold Henson, FCBT chief executive officer. "Our loan portfolio is a reflection of this vibrant real estate market and our associations' competitive pricing policies." He also attributed the loan growth to the associations' expanded marketing and customer service efforts and their increased participation in large loans with other lenders.

The quality of the district's loan portfolio remained strong at mid-year, with overall acceptable credit quality of 97.5 percent unchanged from Dec. 31, 2001.

Tenth District net income for the quarter ended June 30, 2002, totaled \$33.7 million, a 21.7 percent increase over the \$27.7 million in net income reported for the same quarter a year ago. This increase was primarily the result of an increase in net interest income.

Net income for the six months ended June 30, 2002, totaled \$58.5 million, an increase of 5 percent from the \$55.7 million of net income reported for the same period in 2001.

The bank and associations' combined total assets grew to \$7.1 billion at June 30, 2002, from \$6.6 billion at Dec. 31, 2001. High-risk assets decreased to \$89.5 million at mid-year from \$90.1 million at year-end 2001.

"We are very satisfied with these mid-year financial results. They are right on target with our goals for the year," said Henson.

"Although we remain concerned that weak export markets will continue to depress farm income, we are confident the new Farm Bill will help our customers plan for the risk that is inherent in farming and ranching. We applaud Congress and the Administration for recognizing the importance of agriculture to our nation's economy and security," he said.

The Tenth Farm Credit District is composed of 10 Federal Land Credit Associations, which make rural mortgage loans, and 12 Agricultural Credit Associations, which provide both mortgage and production financing. Together, these 22 lending associations comprise the largest rural lending network in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and Texas. At June 30, 2002, they had a total of 61,558 loans outstanding to agricultural producers, agribusiness operations, rural homeowners and other rural landowners.

The Tenth District is part of the nationwide Farm Credit System, which reported combined net income of \$524 million and \$934 million for the three and six months ended June 30, 2002, respectively. This compares with combined net income of \$474 million and \$864 million for the same periods last year.

Hints on Packing Safe School Lunch

Packing a Safe School Lunch The school lunch that children take to school may be the reason they come home with stomach cramps, diarrhea or even vomiting. Their illness might actually be caused by a "food bug" instead of a "flu bug."

Karen Tellman, of Texas Cooperative Extension, Wheeler County says that packing a lunch that will be stored at room temperature and eaten many hours later requires special precautions. Harmful bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow best at room temperature. Temperatures between 40 and 140 degrees F, also known as the "danger zone," can cause these harmful bacteria to multiply and cause illness.

Bacteria that cause foodborne illness need moisture, the right temperature, a food source like protein, and time. Any moist protein food is especially susceptible. Foods that are handled a lot during preparation pose an extra risk because bacteria from hands can spread to them. These foods include protein salads such as ham, chicken, or egg.

To avoid spreading harmful bacteria to food, maintain a clean area when preparing sack lunches. Make sure utensils, hands, work areas, and food containers are clean. Remember to wash the lunch box or thermos after each use. If using a paper bag, use a bag made for food. Do not use grocery bags because they may be contaminated from insects or food leakage.

Keep cold lunch foods cold. Store lunches in a refrigerator. If one is not available, insulated lunch boxes keep foods colder than paper bags. A freezing gel, ice, or frozen drink placed in an insulated lunch box will keep food chilled. Advise children to place their lunch in a cool place out of direct sunlight.

Keep hot lunch foods hot. Use a

thermos for hot foods such as chili, soups, and stews. Use a clean thermos with a tight fitting lid. Rinse the thermos with boiling water and pour steaming hot food into the thermos. The food should still be hot at lunchtime.

If you choose to pack lunch meat sandwiches, make sure to keep them cold. When purchasing lunch meat, pay close attention to "use-by" dates. These products can harbor bacteria that can grow slowly, even at refrigerator temperatures.

Plan a menu of properly prepared and healthy foods. Foods that look or smell sour may be contaminated with bacteria that cause foodborne illness. Don't pack leftovers that have been in the refrigerator for an extended time and don't re-pack perishable lunch items that have not been eaten. Throw them away.

Foods that don't need to be kept hot or cold are a safe choice when there is no cold storage to keep foods chilled. These foods include peanut butter; dried products such as beefjerky; non-perishable cheese and cheese spreads; canned products that can be opened and eaten immediately such as meat, poultry, and seafood; fresh fruits and vegetables; and breads, cereals, and nuts. Ready-to-eat foods in individual servings such as puddings or canned fruits make a nice addition to sack lunches.

New Video Offers Help And Hope

Chris Vacca and Dennis Berry had to learn to say their names over again.

For the three million Americans who stutter saying their own name is just one of the many challenges confronting them as they start their day.

Vacca, Berry, and a dozen other adults who stutter discuss how they have coped successfully with stuttering in a new videotape produced by the Stuttering Foundation of America called *If You Stutter: Advice for Adults*, now available at the Wheeler Public Library in Wheeler. "It's meant to give stutters some insight into the tools they need to begin dealing with stuttering and offers good ideas for families, speech-language pathologists, and health care professionals," said Barry Guitler, Ph.D., a University of Vermont professor and one of the experts featured in the video.

In the 55-minute program, men and women discuss how stuttering has affected their everyday lives and how they've learned to deal with it. They discuss challenges like using the telephone, interviewing for a job and shopping in a store.

Between real-life examples, experts identify ways people who stutter can manage the problem and become more fluent speakers.

"We focus on demonstrating a variety of therapy strategies that are appropriate in working with adults and teens," said the University of Colorado's Peter Ramig, Ph.D. "We also answer questions about stuttering and present examples of therapy sessions showing how stuttering can be better understood what stuttering is, how to improve their speech, and how to regain fluency even when they relapse. "Because many people are unable to get therapy or aren't aware of it benefits, we wanted to produce a video that would show the results of effective programs and also give some self therapy ideas," Guitler said.

Therapy must be tailored to an individual's needs, and it's important to find the right program. As the video points out, there are several valid approaches to therapy that can be used individually or in combination to achieve lasting success.

"We've seen many people deal with stuttering so effectively that they have become better than average communicators, good listeners, and even excellent public speakers," said Hugo Gregory, Ph.D., a Northwestern University professor who offers advice in the video.

Other experts appearing in the video include June Campbell, M.A., of Northwestern University, Deborah Kully, M.S., of the Institute for Stuttering Treatment Research in Alberta, Canada, and Catherine Otto-Mongomery, M.S., of the American Institute for Stuttering Treatment in New York, NY.

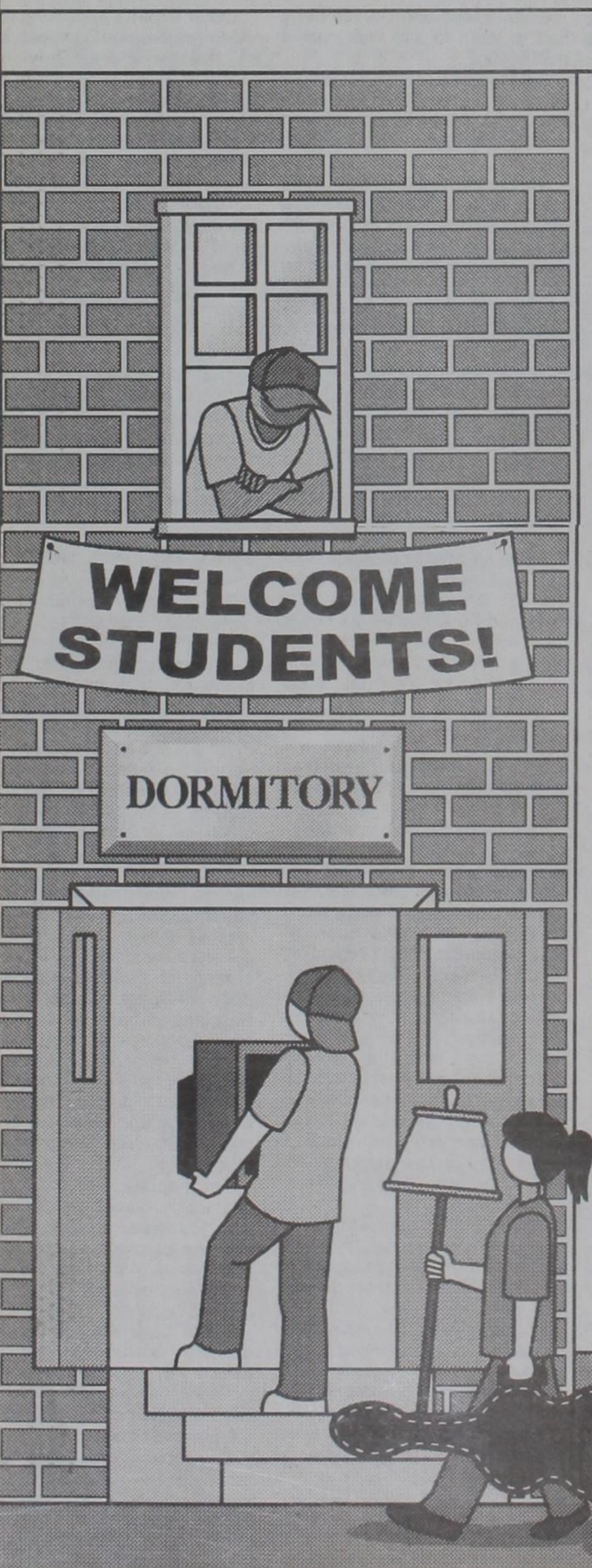
