Farmers Make Contribution: Steer Donated To Ranchers

A 4,000-foot San Andres exploration, No. 1 Billy Jim St. Clair and others, has been scheduled 2 1/2 miles northeast of Muleshoe in Bailey County, by W. F. Holloway of Austin.

The drillsite is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east State Capitol Lands survey. There is no nearby production.

Television cameras and 348 boys were on hand at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch near Amarillo Thursday when Muleshoe men arrived with 5,080 pounds of vegetables and a 1200 pound steer to donate to the ranch.

The vegetables were donated by 12 area farmers and the steer by Harold King. The farmers giving an assortment of vegetables were Jimmy Presley, Horace Hutton, Dudley Malone, Omar Kelton, N. A. Dunlap, Byron Guinn, Harry Lee, George Wheeler, Tom Smith, Mrs. Sherman Sweatman, Phil Garrett and Arvis Grogan.

The assortment included tomatoes, bell pepper, green beans, watermelons, cantaloupes, beets, okra, pumpkins, and carrots.

Harmon Elliott, chairman of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation, said that in the past, several loads of grain had been given to Boys Ranch from the Muleshoe area, but this was the first load of vegetables taken.

Instigated by the combined efforts of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation and the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, Elliott said they felt that this was a good way for this area to share with 348 boys the products of the land through this sharing method of home grown vegetables.

Local men going to Boys Ranch were Rev. Doug DuBose, Harold King, Derrill Oliver, Wilbur LeVeque, Jim Cox, Pat Throckmorton, Don Vinson, L. D. Hall and Elliott.

Donald Harrison provided the truck to take the beef and vegetables to Boys Ranch.

Several men in the area assisted with bringing in the products and loading the truck. It was unloaded by the boys at the ranch.

Dimmitt Bobcats were dealt the openers and stood pat until late in the first quarter when they exploded with a series of two quick first downs.

A packed house watched the Dimmitt Bobcats roam over the Mules 12-0 before the end of the opening football game of the 1968 season.

Barley Now Included In Grain Program

First Allotment Notices Incorrect

"Barley is now included in the feed grain program for 1969, just like corn and grain sorghum," Charles Daniel, ASCS office manager announced.

"You may substitute between these three feed grains within your grain permitted acreage and you may substitute between wheat and feed grains within the limit of your total permitted acreage for all of these crops," Daniel said.

Earlier information in pamphlets mailed with 1969 wheat allotment notices and publicized through news items stated barley would not be included in the seed grain program for 1969, but that the barley base could be requested and approved for purposes of substituting wheat for barley provided 15 percent of the approved Barley base was diverted. These statements are no longer correct.

Producers may still substitute wheat for barley just as they can substitute wheat for corn and grain sorghum. The required minimum diversion for feed grains under the 1969 program has not been determined at this time.

Barley planted on any farm in 1969, which is participating in the feed grain program, will count against the feed grain permitted.

Planting barley in excess of the feed grain base on a non-participating farm will have the same effect as planting corn or grain sorghum in excess of the feed grain base for offsetting compliance purpose and will make the producer ineligible for payment on any farm under the 1969 feed grain program.

"Should you have any question concerning how this change in the use of the barley base will affect your farming operation, please call the local office immediately," Daniel said.

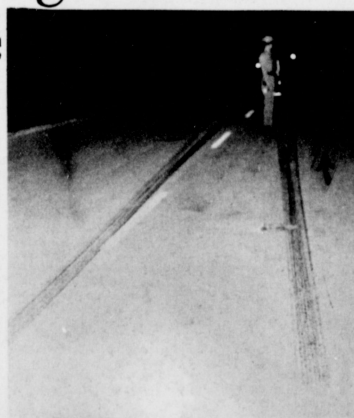
R.L. Brooks, 76, long-time Progress resident, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Joe Vaughn after he had ran into the path of something moving out of the highway from my left. I thought at first it was an animal and applied my brakes, swerved the car, but knew I had hit something. The body came up over the hood, hit the windshield and went back over the front of the car. It all happened so quickly that it was unbelievable." King was returning to Lubbock from a New Mexico business trip.

Brooks' body was 117 feet down the highway from the point of impact. Said to be a lover of animals by neighbors, a small kitten was killed along with Brooks. Brooks was returning to his home, located on the south side of U.S. 84, from a neighbors home on the north side of the highway when he dashed in front of the King vehicle.

The accident occurred at an intersection, near Progress Elevator on U.S. 84. King, an employee of Gifford-Hill Western, was not injured in the accident.

The accident was investigated by Highway Patrolmen Gene Sisemore and Joel Young.

At press time, services were pending at Singleton Funeral Home.

1,960 Enrolled

Neal Dillman, superintendent of schools announces that the enrollment of students in Muleshoe Independent School District is only 35 less than that of the same date for the 1967-68 school term.

A check of the school enrollment records on Friday, September 13, shows that 534 students are enrolled in Muleshoe high school with 533 being enrolled the same date the previous year.

Muleshoe junior high school has a current enrollment of 537 students, standing at 11 students above the enrollment, same date last year.

Mary Dehazo school shows an enrollment loss at this time of 47 students. The list contains 458 names this year compared to 505 September 13 last year.

Richard Hills has the exact amount of students on the enrollment sheets this year as they had the same date last year. The figure stands at 441.

Total enrollment for the four Muleshoe schools this year is 1960 while last year the figure was 1955 students.

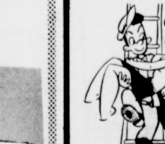

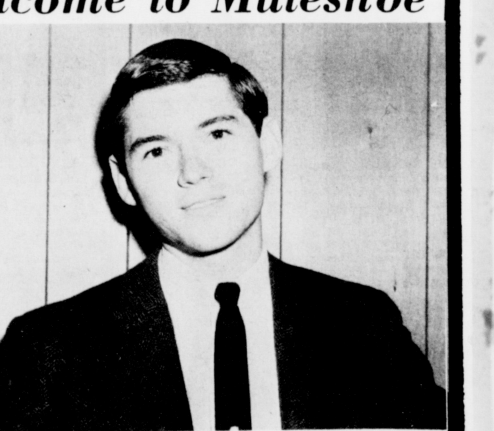

Approximately 65 guests registered in the bride's book by Miss Linda McCamish, from a table covered in white centered with a white vase and yellow rose bud.

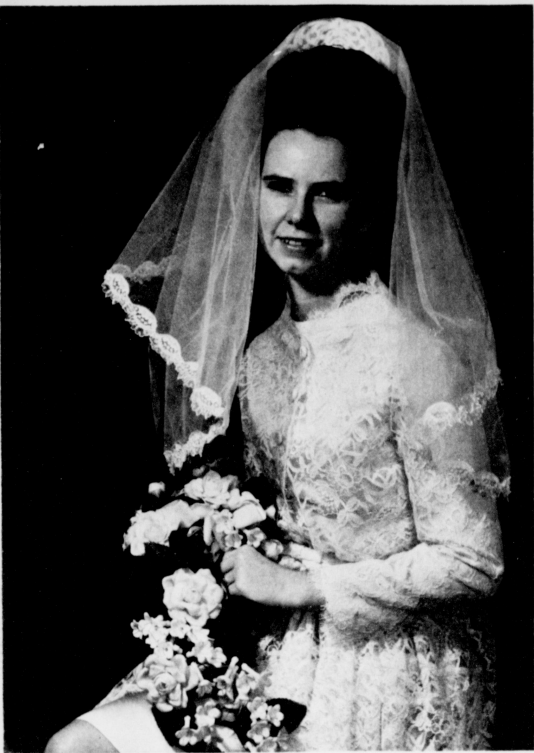

After October 1, the couple will be at home at 707 West Second St., Muleshoe.

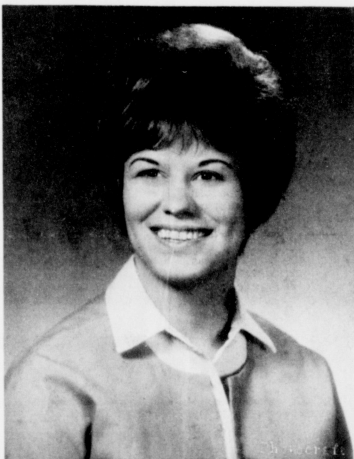
The bride, who is a graduate of Lubbock High School, attended Texas Technological College and was employed by Litton Industries in Lubbock.

Qualification Tests Set For Navy's Regular NROTC



Applications for the Navy's twenty-third annual Regular NROTC qualification test are now available according to M. Gramling, counselor at the Muleshoe High School. This nationwide examination will be given on December 14, 1968, and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, Gramling explained, about 1,700 young men will enter the Regular NROTC Program as midshipmen at NROTC units in 53 colleges and universities throughout the nation. Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17 but not yet 21 on 30 June 1969, and who are now high school seniors or recent graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations next January and February.

A successful candidate receives financial aid for four years of college. This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50.00 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing a baccalaureate degree requirements and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Department Earns Citation

Regular NROTC midshipmen participate in three summer-at-sea training periods with various naval units. These periods assist them in learning about the variety of interesting and challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps officers.

Registrations for the test will close 15 November 1968, 1969 NROTC Bulletins containing eligibility requirements and qualifying test applications are available from Gramling or the U.S. Navy Recruiting Station at Clovis.
