## **Annual Report Given** By Co. Soil Conservatin

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District was established on April 6, 1948 with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of Wheeler County. A board of five elected directors who are resident landowners in Wheeler County and are actively engaged in fanning or ranching. The current Board of Directors consists of Paul Macina, Chairman; John McDowell Jr., Vice-Chairman; Dean Tipps, Secretary; Eric Zybach and Darville Atherton.

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District entered into a memo of understanding with the Natural Resources Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel who are trained in the field of erosion control. On October 1, 1999, Fred Allison, Jr. became the District Conservationist for Wheeler and Collingsworth counties. The current NRCS staff at the Wheeler office is Calvin Devereaux, Soil Conservationist. The District staff consists of Rhonda McWhorter, District Clerk and Don Humphreys, Earth Team Volunteer. The Wellington NRCS staff consist of Myron Merz, Rangeland Management Specialist and Vernon Brister, Civil Engineering Technician. Catrina Moody is the District Clerk. The Wheeler County SWCD works closely with the NRCS to promote conservation practices and stewardship of the land. Your local SWCD is proud to present this report on our conservation work and accomplishments during the 2002 fiscal year. Wheeler County SWCD has been involved with the development of one new EQIP 2002 contracts on 53 acres. We have a total of 12 active EQIP contracts on 3,180 acres. Conservation practices, which were cost-shared under this program, include: cross fences, water storage facilities, livestock, pipelines, sprinkler system, grass seeding and terraces. Here are some of the accomplishments of the SWCD/NRCS for the year 2002: Land users provided assistance- 850 customers; conservation plans (new and revisions)-40 customers on 6,000 acres; grass-seeding - 500 acres was seed to a native grass mix and 1500 acres was seeded to weeping lovegrass- 640 acres was seeded to plains bluestem; fences 10,000 feet completed; brush control - 320 acres; producers applying RMS plan - 7,000 acres; terraces - 1000 feet completed; 10 conservation presentations were given with 200 people attending. We published 25 news articles and assisted the district with tree sales. The SWCD/NRCS completed 8 O&M inspections on watershed maintenance. The conservation reserve program is still active in the District. We continue to service 5 active CRP contracts on 500 acres. Wheeler County has a total of 270 CRP contracts on 40,836 acres. Your local SWCD/NRCS staff is looking forward to working with you this coming year. If children live with tolerance, they learn patience.


If children live with praise, they learn appreciation.

Keep me serene and posed. I know these children are good when they're taught and treated




teachers must let the children eat from the First Table of Life for awhile. They come first. Help me love each child that's in my care, even the ones with a snotty nose. A child can't learn






