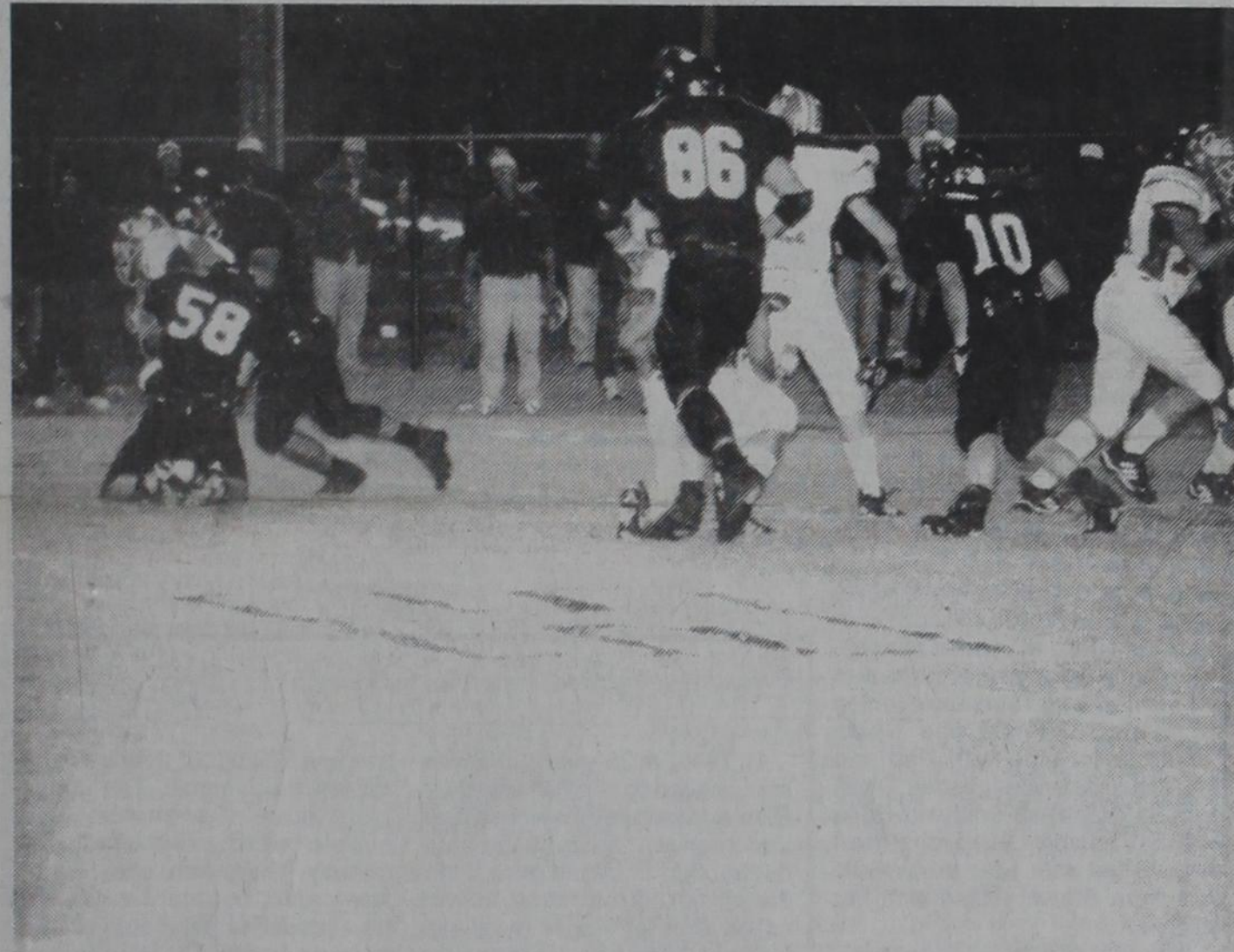

Rites Read Monday For Wayne Haygood, 65

Wayne Haygood of Canadian died Saturday, September 28, 2002. Services were 2:00 p.m. Monday, September 30, 2002, at the First United Methodist Church in Canadian, Texas. Burial was in the Edith Ford Cemetery in Canadian.

Wayne was born in Kaufman, Texas, on September 16, 1937, to Dwight and Mary Haygood. He graduated from Kaufman High School in 1955. He attended Texas Tech University for one year before moving to Oklahoma State University where he received his bachelor's degree in Animal Science in 1959. In 1960, Wayne married Gayle George of Canadian, Texas.

Wayne's career as a Hereford breeder began when he became the herdsman for Haggard & McHaney Hereford Farm in Kennett, Missouri, in 1959. In 1960 he entered the army and was stationed at Virginia Beach, Virginia, until 1962. Next he became the manager of the Bruning Feedyard in Nebraska. From there he moved to the famous CK Ranch in Brookville, Kansas, until 1964. That year Wayne was hired by K. D. Owen to manage Indian Mound Farm in New Harmony, Indiana.

While in Indiana he established Indian Mound Farm as one of the top Hereford operations in the world. The Indian Mound cattle won numerous shows from coast to coast and compiled more show points than any other herd in the decade of the 1970's. Wayne sold top breeding stock for record prices to the best Hereford herds in 40 states and several foreign countries. While in Indiana Wayne served as President of the Indiana Hereford Association and then served as the President of the American Hereford Association in 1979. Wayne was involved in Hereford events around the world including Canada, Hungary, England, Uruguay and Argentina.

By 1981 Wayne had become a full partner on the Indian Mound cattle and decided to move to Canadian, Texas and start Indian Mound Ranch. Haygood and Owen dispersed the Indian Mound Farm herd that year with a sale that still holds the record for high average of a dispersion sale. Wayne brought all of the female that were two years old and younger to Texas to carry on the Indian Mound breeding.

In Texas, Wayne continued to breed and sell cattle that impacted the Hereford breed. Wayne received the Animal Science Graduate of Distinction award from Oklahoma State University in 1982. He

judged numerous cattle shows both nationally and internationally and is the only person to judge the National Western Hereford show in three different decades. Wayne served as President of the Texas Hereford Association and as a director of the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show in Fort Worth and as a director of the First State Bank in Canadian, Texas. In later years Wayne was honored as an honorary member of the Texas Hereford Association and an Honorary Vice President of the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show in Fort Worth and was inducted into the American Hereford Association Heritage Hall of Fame. In 2002 the Wayne Haygood National Hereford Show was held at the Fort Worth Stock Show. Wayne was a member of the Canadian First United Methodist Church.

Wayne is survived by his wife, Gayle; a daughter Leslie Osborn and husband Tim of Tuttle, Oklahoma; a son Lee and wife Jacqui of Canadian, Texas; a daughter Mary Myers and husband Sean of Amarillo; two grandchildren, Will and Katie Osborn of Tuttle, and a brother Carroll and wife Carla of Amarillo. He was preceded in death by his parents Dwight and Mary Haygood of Kaufman, Texas. Suggested memorials are: United Methodist Church of Canadian, Hemphill County Hospice and the Texas Hereford Association.

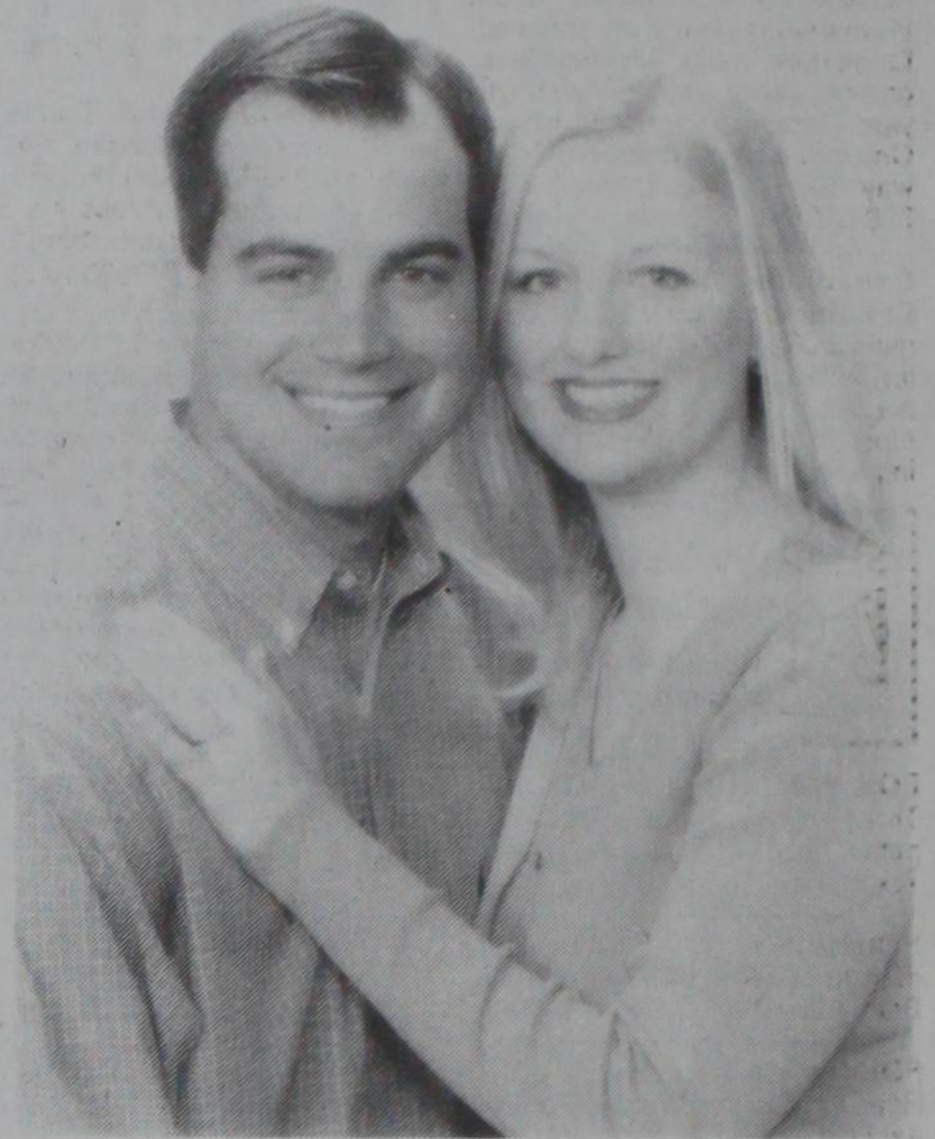

Wheeler Church of Christ

In 1940, a 25-year old Swiss man moved to a small village in France to help people whose lives had been torn apart by the early destruction of World War II. Although not his real name, he was called Brother Roger by everyone who knew him. He tended to those who suffered from physical infirmities. He listened to those who had tales of woe to tell. He grabbed a hammer or a saw or a screwdriver or whatever tool he could find to help reconstruct torn homes. This quiet man was making quite a noise with those whom he ministered to. Brother Roger was a religious man, but was by no means outspoken. After spending time helping widows and orphans and the hurt and the lonely others learned lessons about Jesus simply by watching him. Not surprising, others followed his example. Some went to Taize, France to spend time with Brother Roger and his work. Some stayed. Some learned lessons and then went back to their own homes, having been changed for the better by being a part of this learning experience. Yes, they had worship services

there at Taize, but they were by no means dynamic. The songs were more like chants, with simple words repeated frequently. There were a few scriptures read, but there might not be a preacher in the pulpit delivering a sermon. There were long moments of silence. And yet these moments of reflection amid work of service and dedication were more profound than virtually anything that could have been said.

Sixty-two years later people still visit Taize for the same purpose that Brother Roger went there for in 1940. People today can still show their desire to truly serve God, even in Wheeler, Texas. You don't have to say a lot with your mouth to say a lot about Jesus. Help others. Lead by example. Do. In praise to God, the songs sung don't have to be done by an operatically-trained singer. The sermons don't have to be preached by a master rhetorician. Moments of silence can be powerful if we are engaged with God.

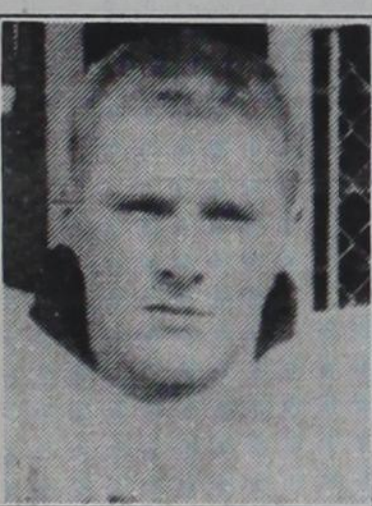

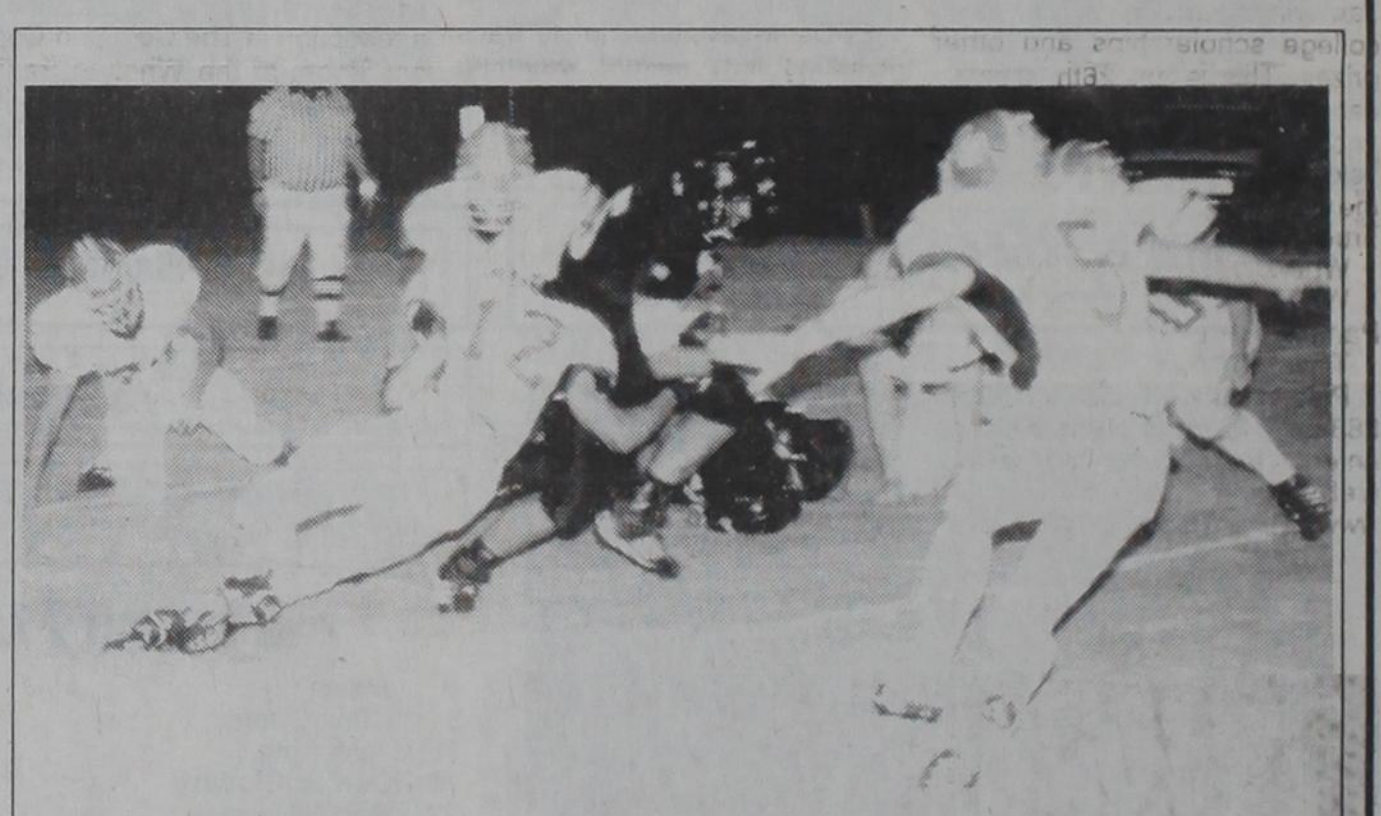

No one individual is credited with originating the 4-H program, rather it was founded through collective efforts over the course of a few years. However, it was in 1902, that A. B. Graham, Superintendent of Schools in Clark County, Ohio, organized a boys' and girls' agriculture club. In 1907, the first boys' and girls' demonstration clubs under USDA sponsorship were begun in Holmes County, Mississippi.

In 1907 or 1908, the first emblem was used nationally, designed by O. H. Benson. It was the three leaf clover representing head, heart, and hands. In 1911, Benson suggested a fourth leaf and H be added. Originally, the fourth H was to stand for hustle, but it was later changed to health. By 1912, 96,000 youth were enrolled in 4-H club work and in 1914, the passage of the Smith-Lever Act established the Cooperative Extension Service of which 4-H is a part. In 1918, the first use of the term "4-H Club" appeared in a federal document.

Today 6.8 million youth, ages 15 to 19, are involved in 4-H. There are an estimated 60 million 4-H alumni. 4-H programs exist in all 3,150 counties, U. S. territories, and the District of Columbia. Nearly 35% of 4-H participants live in urban communities and about 30% represent minority, racial, cultural, and ethnic populations. As in 1902, 4-H'ers today are involved in experiential learning in projects that are important and of interest to them. Today's project areas range from aerospace to zoology.

Lee Haygood of Briscoe Has Amer. Angus Bull

Lee Haygood, Briscoe, Texas, owns one bull listed in the 2002 Fall Sire Evaluation Report published by the American Angus Association headquartered in St. Joseph, Missouri. Issued in both the spring and fall, the new report features the latest performance information available on 6,362 sires. The report is accessible at www.angus.org.

"This report provides both Angus breeders and commercial cattle producers using Angus genetics with accurate, predictable selection tools for improving their herd," says Bill Bowman, American Angus Association director of performance programs. Expected Progeny Differences (EPDs) are generated from the performance database of the American Angus Association, which includes information submitted by more than 7,500 Angus breeders this past year through the Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) program.

EPDs are available for 17 traits including birth weight, weaning weight, milk, yearling weight and height, mature daughter weight and height, and scrotal circumference. Carcass progeny measures generate EPDs on carcass weight, marbling, rib eye area, external fat thickness and percent retail product. Ultrasound body composition data also generates end product predictors for rib eye area, intramuscular fat percentage, fat thickness and percent retail product. The semi-annual analysis for the sire evaluation report is conducted at Iowa State University.

Angela Presley Returns After 2 1/2 Year Missionary Trip To Tokyo Japan

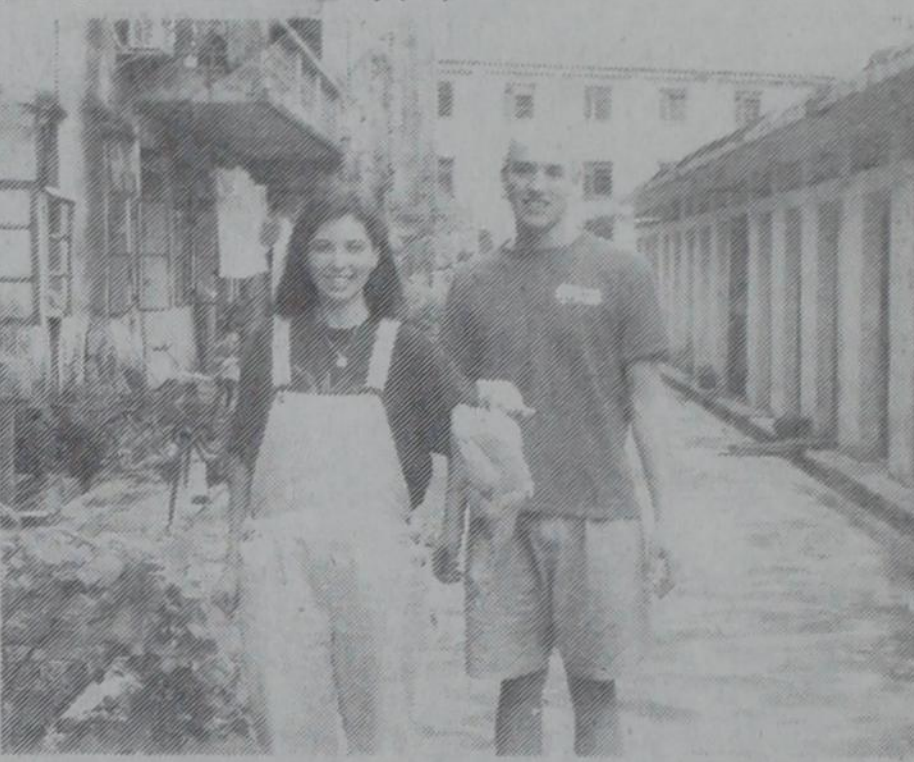

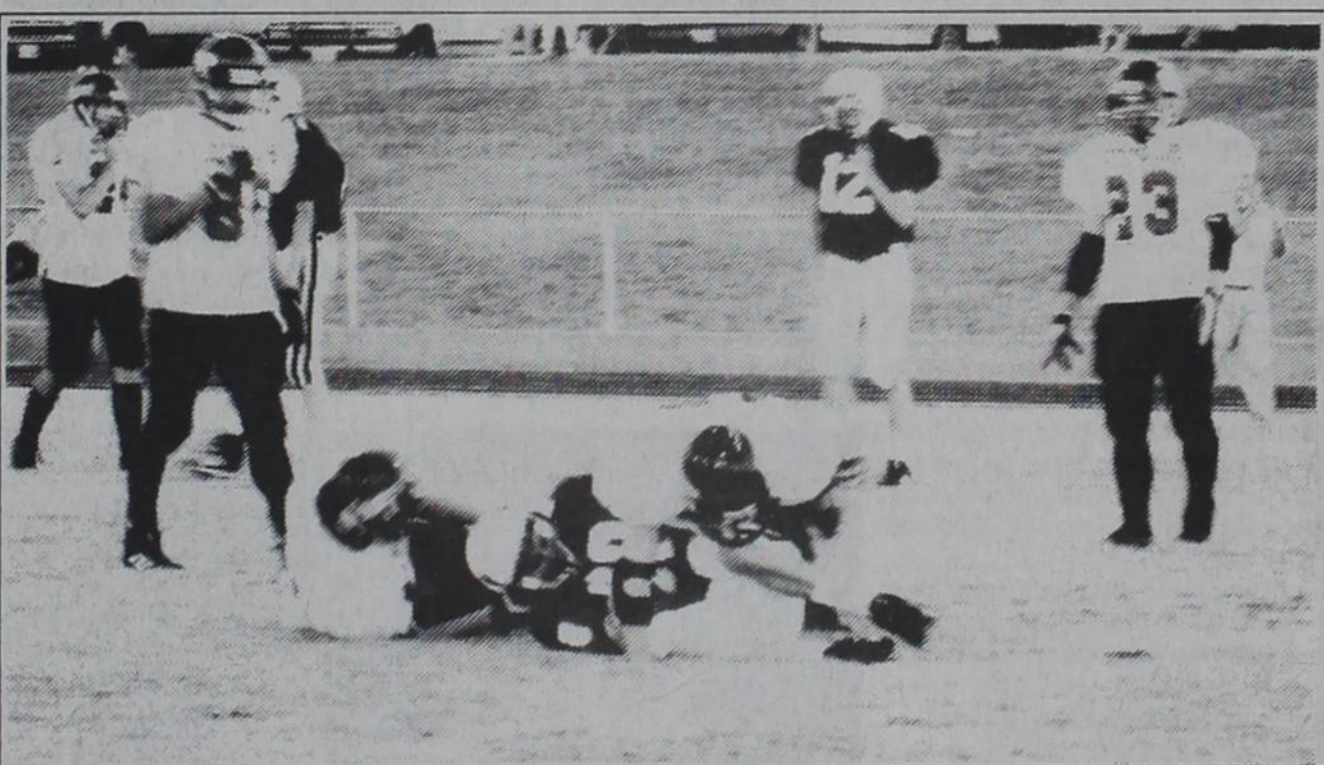

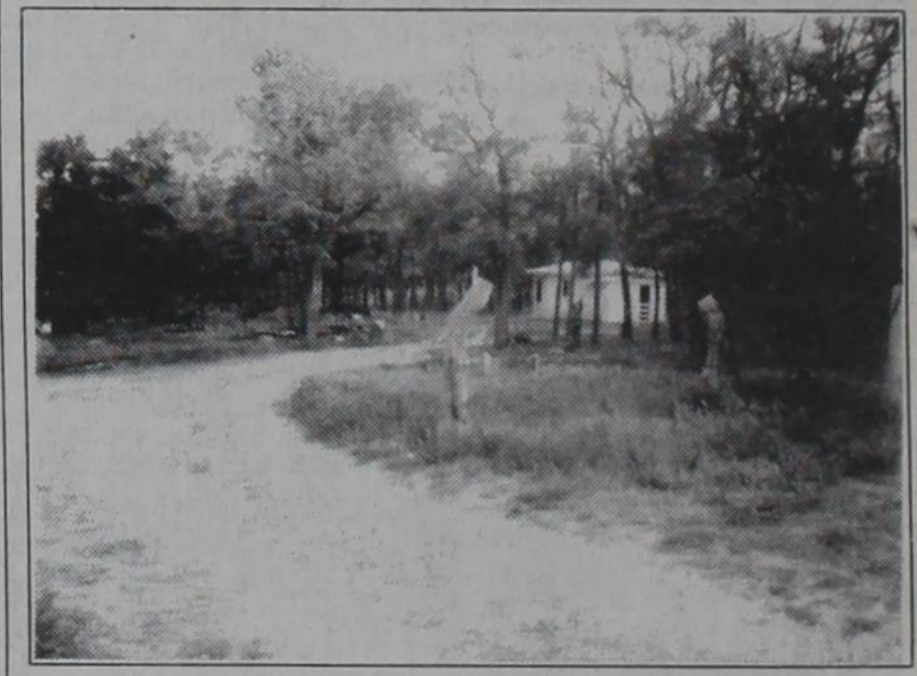
