I like the book of Psalms. A compilation of words written, not by God, but most of the time written to God. Words of praise. Words of thanksgiving. Words of adoration and worship. Sometimes words of frustration, but always spoken with complete trust in God. 150 works of prose or poetry, often short enough to read in about a minute or two. Words that have brought comfort to us when we were at our lowest (like Psalm 23: The Lord is my shepherd, I shall lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters....."). Words that express a longing to be close to God (like Psalm 42: As the deer pants for streams of water, so my soul pants for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God....."). Words that express our desire to have our sins forgiven by God (like Psalm 51: Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me. Do not cast

me from your presence or take your Holy Spirit from me."). Words that express delight in every new day (like Psalm 118: This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."). Words that express how powerful God's message to us is (like Psalm 119: How can a young man keep his way pure? By living according to your word. Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path."). Words that express praise to the One deserving all praise (like Psalm 146: Praise the Lord. Praise the Lord, O my soul. I will praise the Lord all my life; I will sing praise to my God as long as I live.).

Take a few minutes, open the Bible up to somewhere in the middle (you are bound to find the Psalms pretty quickly and easily) and read from the Psalms. I promise it will make your day better.

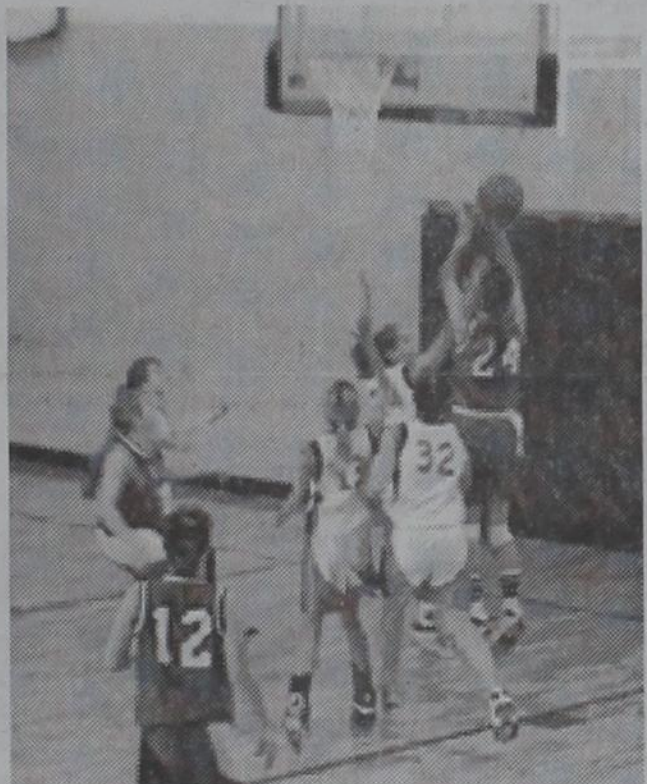

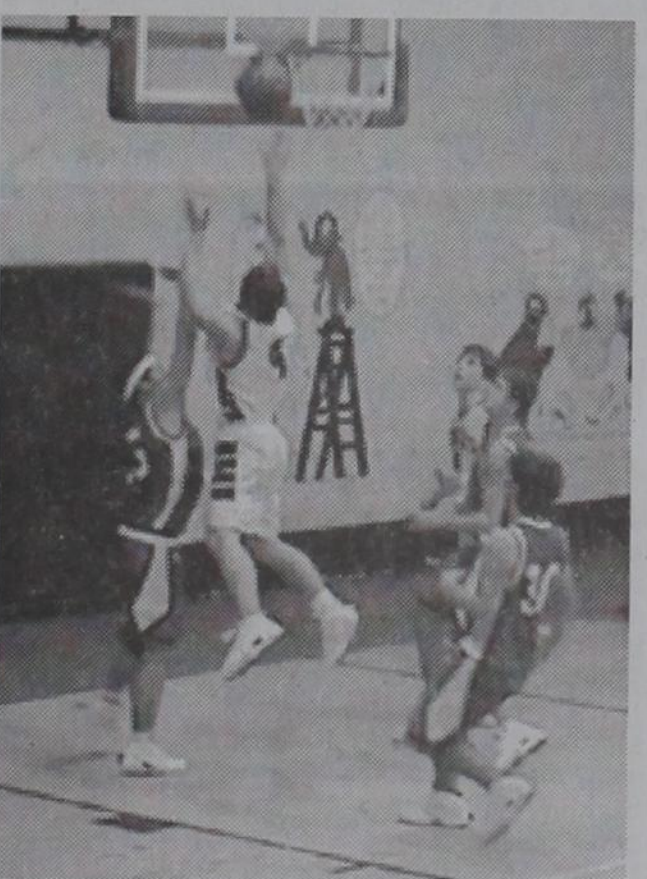

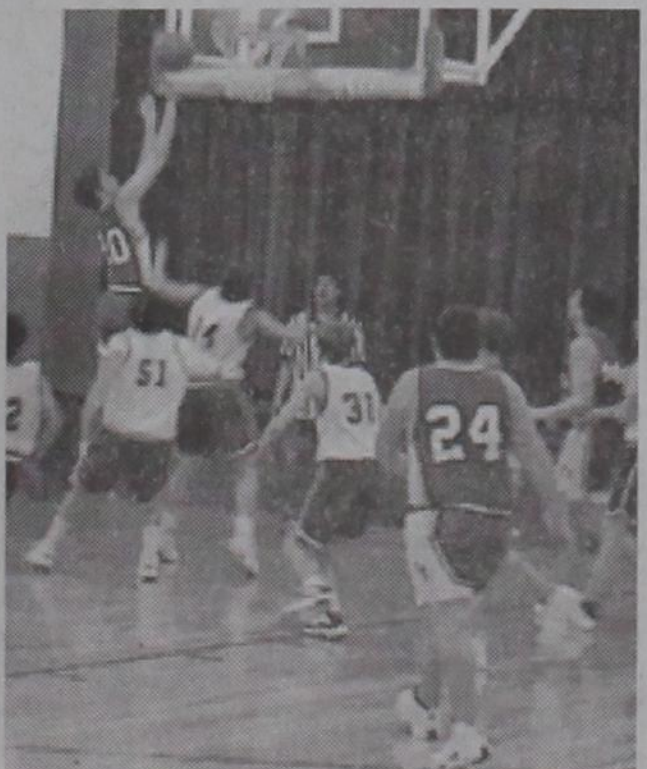

Justice of the Peace Art Taylor reported \$27,230 for the month of November. The report was accepted as received.

The commissioners approved the hourly payroll time sheets for payment.

The bills presented were paid. There was no action on "Consideration of Amendment of Budget."

The commissioners heard a report that the floor plans for the restoration of the courthouse were being redrawn, making changes in proposed office locations and need to relocate elevator. This will delay the taking of bids; they can possibly be taken in April. It is hoped the county part for the restoration will be kept in the neighborhood of \$600,000.

The commissioners agreed to pay the invoices for the annual barbecue held in connection with the County Livestock Show in January.

County Treasurer Jauna Benefield presented the commissioners with a printout of the county budget, expenses and balances as printed out by the new computer program. The commissioners will be able to look at the printout and see where they stand each month.

The treasurer also presented the commissioners with the new time sheets for the county employees with completion required before a check will be cut. The time sheets will show hours worked, comp. time taken each month and vacation time earned and/or taken. The new time sheets were approved and will be used beginning January 1, 2003.

The commissioners approved the employee holidays for the year 2003. The county will observe 12 holidays through the year. Holidays are: Jan. 1, Wednesday, New Year's Day; Feb. 17, Monday, President's Day; April 18, Friday, Good Friday; May 26, Monday, Memorial Day; July 4, Friday, Independence Day; Sept. 1, Monday, Labor Day; Nov. 11, Tuesday, Veterans' Day; Nov. 27-28, Thursday and Friday, Thanksgiving; Dec. 24-26, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Christmas.

An independent count audit of Wheeler County was done by Grantham, Cory and Heare, P.C. The report was good and accepted by the commissioners.

The Kelton Fire Department requested assistance from the county for work on a fire truck. The department wanted to put a flat bed on a '89 Ford Pickup and install a 400 gal poly tank. \$5,577.80 was requested; the commissioners contributed \$4,233.80, the cost of the tank and fixtures.

OBSERVATIONS

... from the Wheeler Superintendent
Have you ever seen a really good magician perform? A good magician can give an audience the illusion that he can really make things happen that seem near impossible. The thought has occurred to me that sometimes we all wish that life could be more magical: if we have a problem, we would say some magic words, and hocus-pocus, things would magically and instantly be better. Life just does not turn out that way.

As parents and educators we need to remember that shaping the lives of our children and students is work; it can be very rewarding work, but the task is still work. As educators we all have different bodies of knowledge we want our students to learn. Also, as educators, we know there is no magic formula for helping students to learn the material we put before them. To be successful as a teacher, we know it takes long hours of preparation and study, to be able to present a lesson that catches all the learning levels and styles of our students. Sometimes it seems an almost impossible task; but the reward is in seeing a student really get excited about what they are learning. This is especially so at the secondary level, because students at their stage of life tend to want to hide any excitement about school.

However, as important as the subject material that our students are learning in school, more important are those great lessons we teach in the relationships that we have with them. The greatest lessons our students are learning, not only from us as educators but also from their parents, are the values and the lifestyles that they see in us as adults. It would be nice to be able to have some magic to fix our mistakes, but instead all we have is the ability and, hopefully, the willingness to work at being the kind of people that we want our students to become.

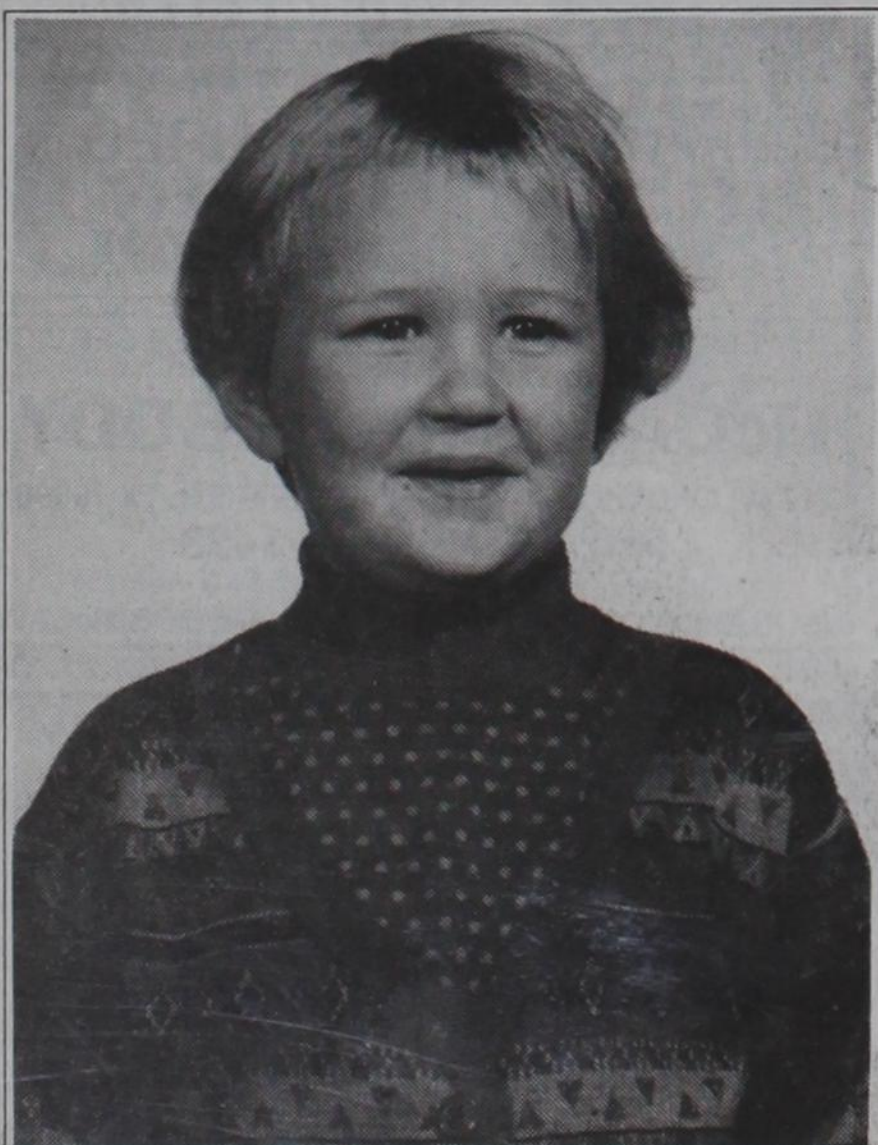

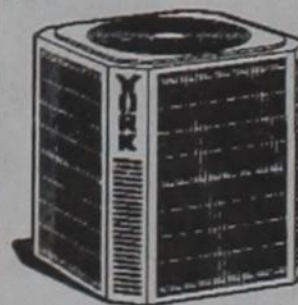
