

-cwe-When one goes back to the files and begins looking at the happenings of years past, you spend more time than you intended. You get sidetracked.



sioners Court met Monday, August 11, 2003, at the Courthouse Annex, 410 S. Main St., in Wheeler. Eleven items were on the

agenda.

The court approved the minutes as presented and accepted the monthly reports of the J. P.'s, County Tax Assessor, County Clerk and District Clerk. They also approved the hourly payroll time sheets for payment and agreed to pay the bills presented.

No action was taken on item 5-Consideration of Amendment of Budget.

After meeting with Stephen Dodge, Construction Manager for Phoenix 1, and discussing different parts of the contract for the restoration of the courthouse, Daryl Snelgrooes stated, "I'll bite the bullet" and move we sign the contract; Tommy Puryear seconded the motion. The motion passed with Robbie Robinson, Commissioner Pct. 4, voting against the project.

Item no. 7 concerned the burn ban. The commissioners feel it is still a need to have the burn ban, even with the recent rain.

The commissioners signed a resolution for Victim's Assistant Coordinator grant.

The commissioners approved the reappointment of Willis Smith to the Board of Trustees for the Texas Panhandle Mental Health Mental Retardation for a two year period. Item no. 10 had to do with a contract with Texas Tech for Autopsy services. No action was taken, as no contract was presented. Stephanie Umsted, Turner Transportation, met with the commissioners to seek road repairs on County Road. She had met with the commissioners a few months back seeking repairs to the road which was 1/2 mile of washboard. She was assured work would begin Monday, August 18. The county will use milled asphalt on the roadway. Milled asphalt is obtained from the state and when scattered and compressed in hot weather, should provide a smooth hard surface for several years, after which it can be reworked and compressed.

Editor's Brother Gets Hole-In-One

The family requests memorials be to First Baptist Church in Wheeler, Texas.


Old Mobeetie Assoc. Conducts Business

Superintendent's Notes on Proposed Tax Rate Notice for Wheeler I.S.D.

This year's proposed rate is \$1.50, which is the same as last year's rate and is the maximum rate that a school district can set. In the "Notice of Public Meeting To Discuss Budget and Proposed Tax Rate" that is being published in this issue of the paper, it indicates that to maintain the same level of maintenance and operations revenue that we had in 2002-03 we would need a school tax rate of \$1.75. 
For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving food stamps or TANF only have to list their child's name, food stamp or TANF case number, and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "NONE". The application must be signed by an adult house-

hold member. Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy the school reviewing official will review the applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to the Superintendent of the school.

Households that list a food stamp or TANF case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In accordance with Federal law and U.S. Department of Agriculture policy, these institutions are prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap.

Hours Expanded For School Zone Signs


To increase safety in school zones located along state highways, state transportation officials today approved a measure expanding the hour of operation for flashing school zone signs.

The Texas Transportation Commission, at its monthly meeting, approved the use of flashing school signs for school-related events that occurduring non-traditional school hours, such as athletic and other events.

Commissioners said the change willimprove safety for Texas school children and thanked State Rep. Vilma Luna for suggesting the idea to extend the hours flashing school zone signs could operate.

The commission also approved the 2004 Statewide Preservation Program, which authorizes an average of nearly \$2.2 billion annually during the next four years to maintain the state's highway sys-

Preserving the existing transportation system is one of five major objectives of the commission and TxDOT. The other objectives are to provide reliable mobility, improved safety, faster project delivery and a transportation system that promotes economic vitality for Texas. During the meeting, held in Midland-Odessa, the commission received a report from the Midland-Odessa Transportation Alliance, a group of cities, counties and private citizens in the Midland-Odessa area, that have been working since 1997 to promote the construction of La Entrada al Pacifico, a NAFTA trade corridor. The corridor stretches from Port Topolobampo, a deep-water port on the Pacific Ocean in the Mexican state of Sinaloa, to the bridge crossing at Ojinaga-Presidio on existing roads. MOTRAN, in its report to the Commission, said its mission is to develop an economically viable trade corridor, in partnership with Mexico that will serve to provide economic stimulus and new jobs for the Permian Basin.






Message to homeowners Demand proper identification




