Commissioners Are Advertising For Bids On Courthouse Project

The Wheeler County Commissioners' Court met in regular session on Monday, May 12, 2003, at 10:00 a.m., in the Courthouse Annex at 410 South Main Street in Wheeler. Thirteen items were on the agenda.

The commissioners approved the minutes of the April 10 meeting. A new minute book, ordered by the County Clerk had not arrived for the April 28 meeting to be typed and approved.

The reports from the J.P. offices, County Treasurer, County Tax Assessor, County Clerk and District Clerk were approved as presented.

The hourly payroll time sheets were approved for payment and the bills presented were approved for payment.

No action was taken on item no. 5, consideration of Amendment of Budget.

The commissioners moved to allow for the advertisement for bids in the Courthouse Restoration Project. The blueprints are at the clerk's office and being checked for changes. Bids will be opened June 13 with the date for accepting or rejecting the bids to be announced at a later date. The Burn Ban for the county remains in place.

The county's Employee Policy Manual have changes made in the "carrying over of vacation time". If an employee is allowed to carry over extra hours, he will not be reimbursed for this time if he quits or is fired before he has time to take the extra vacation time. These

changes will be presented to the commissioners at a later meeting for their approval.

Kenny Brdecko, Wheeler County Extension Agent presented certificates of continuing education hours earned by the commissioners at the 45th Annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference.

The commissioners adopted a resolution concerning the budget crisis in the State of Texas. A copy of the resolution is at the bottom of this article.

A 1989 Chevrolet 3/4 ton pickup owned by Precinct 2, was voted to be surplus property by the commissioners.

Action was tabled on the unpaid insurance claims of WTRCA. Work has not been completed.

In the final item on the agenda, Sheriff Jimmy Adams ask permission of the commissioners to purchase a copier for his department. The purchase was in the Sheriff's budget, but any purchase of over \$5,000 requires approval from the commissioners.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Texas House of Representatives and Texas Senate have worked diligently to overcome a state budget shortfall of \$10 billion during the current biennium cycle of the Texas Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the budgets passed in late April by each chamber of the Legislature seek to address the shortfall with budget reductions throughout state programs, such as health care and criminal justice; and

WHEREAS, the finalization of the state budget now moves to a legislative conference committee composed of capable Senators and Representatives; and

WHEREAS, the successful operation of Texas county government is closely tied to the state budget and the effective implementation of state laws and programs; and

WHEREAS, the state budget reductions to health care and criminal justice will greatly affect the counties' abilities to carry out state and federal mandates in those programs; and

WHEREAS, the health care reductions will necessitate counties and their public health facilities to treat increased numbers of indigent and uninsured patients at local taxpayers' expense; and

WHEREAS, the criminal justice reductions will necessitate counties and their jails to house growing numbers of criminal offenders at the local taxpayers' expense; and

WHEREAS, county government in Texas wishes to be an effective partner in assisting the state in addressing its budget constraints; and

WHEREAS, county government in Texas wishes to protect local property taxpayers from escalating ad valorem tax rates;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wheeler County Commissioners Court does hereby call upon the Texas Legislature to seek a statewide solution to the budget crisis, instead of passing the burden to counties and their ad valorem taxpayers; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wheeler County Commissioners Court does hereby urge the Texas Legislature to consider passage of state rev-

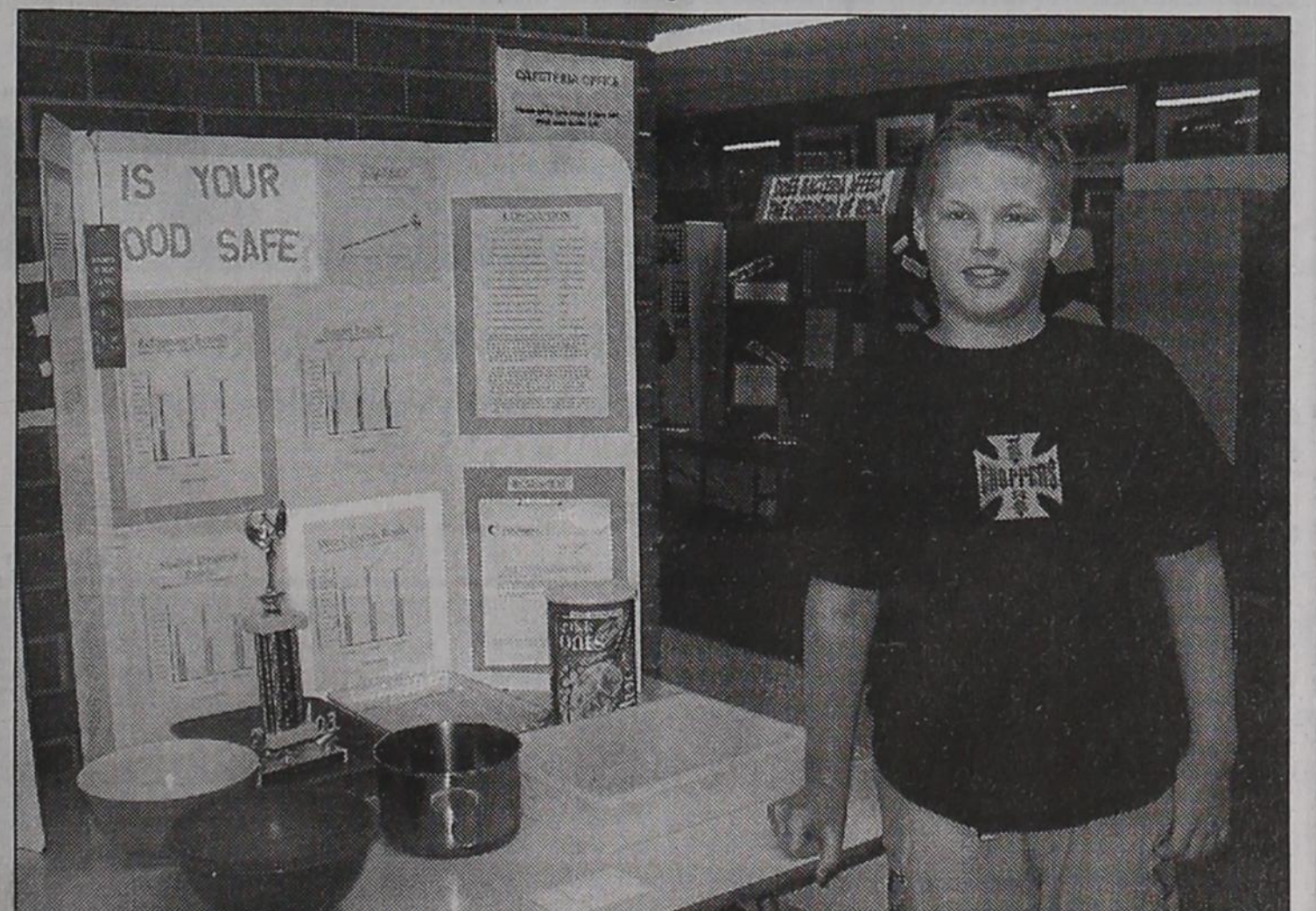
Allison Students At Regional U.I.L Meet

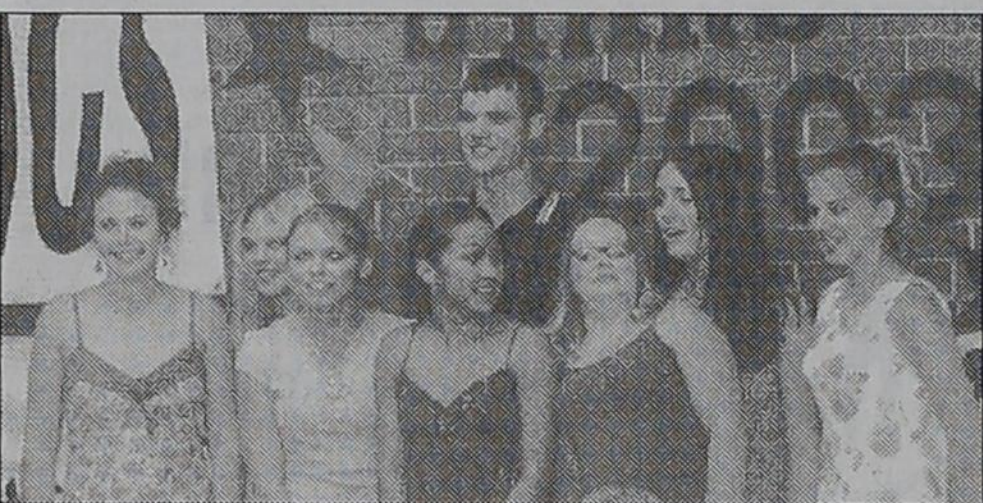

It might have even made some people upset or disagree with what Jesus said. Of course, read the rest of God's word and you realize that everything Jesus said was correct. 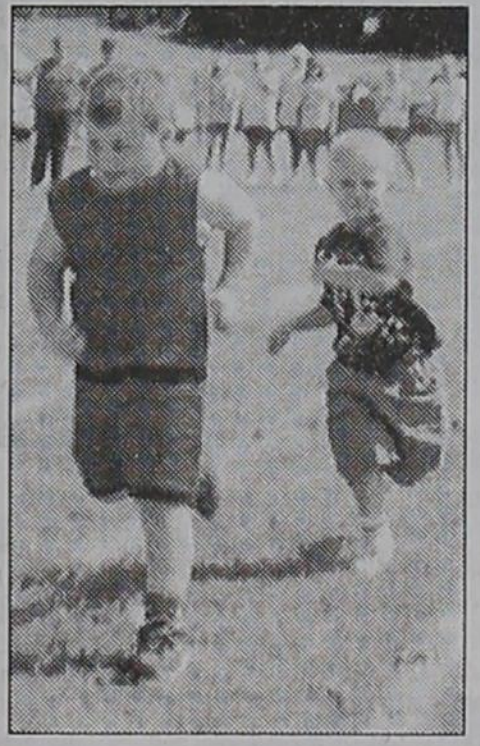

Buckle Bear Pays Visit To Kelton & Wheeler Schools

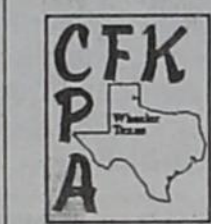

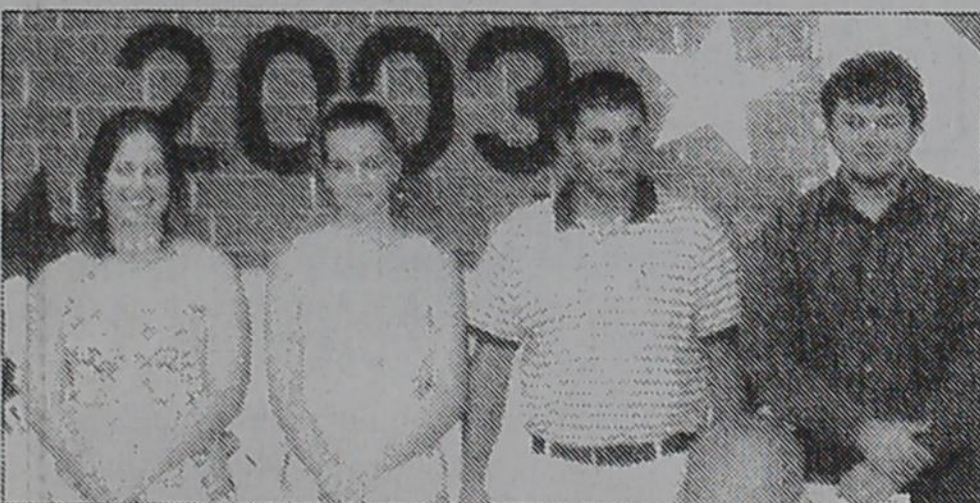

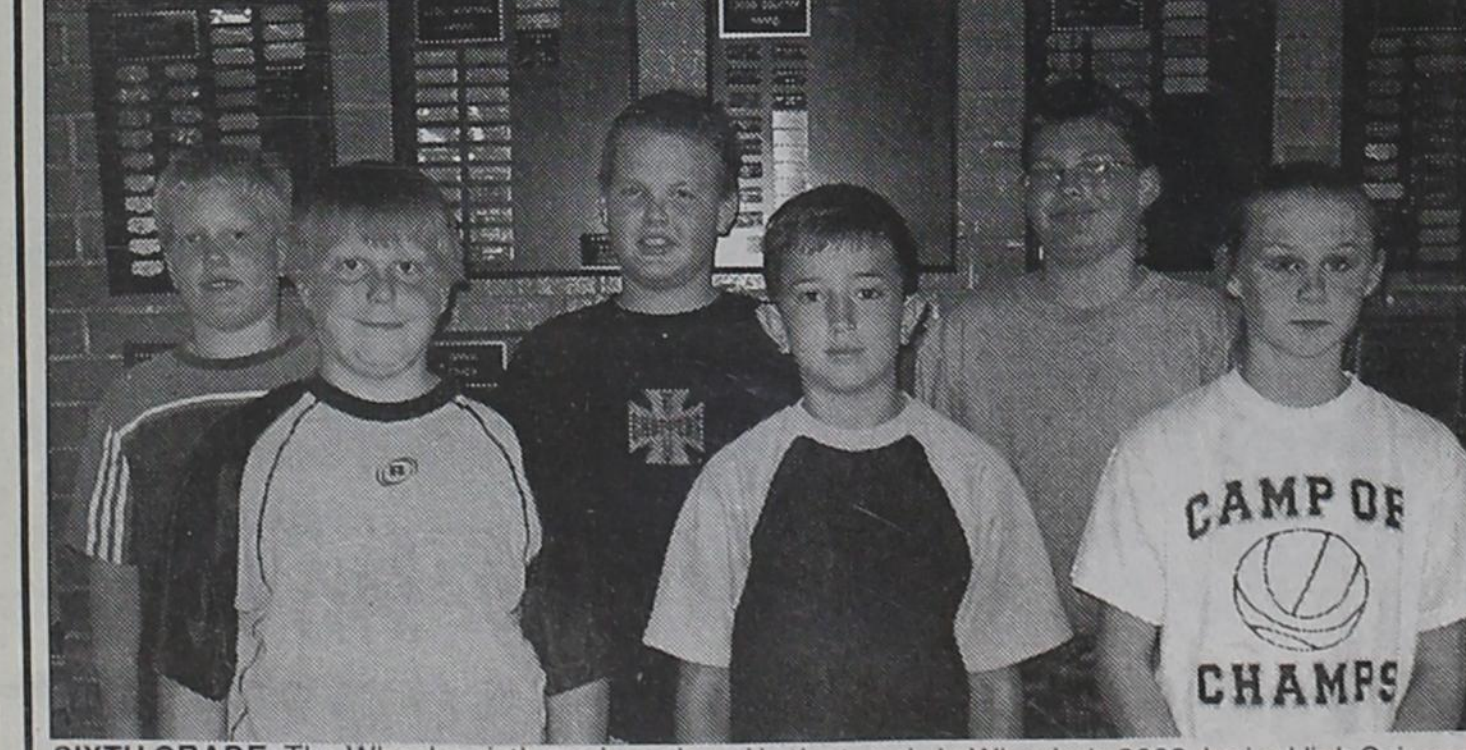
