

Jimmy Lee Donaldson, 41, was shot early Monday morning after Wheeler County Sheriff's Deputies were called to the scene of domestic violence in the Allison community.

The call came into the Wheeler County Sheriff's office around 1:30 a.m. The location was 1 mile west of Allison. Two deputies, John Burrell and Mack Marshall, responded to the call.

One officer remained outside to search around the house and garage, according to Sheriff Jimmy Adams. The first officer on the scene went into the house.

As the officer entered the house, the suspect informed him he had a gun. The officer started to leave the house, but upon hearing a woman screaming and hollering, the deputy entered the master bedroom.

When the officer entered the bedroom, Donaldson pointed the gun at the deputy. The lawman backed out of the bedroom and out of the site of Donaldson to radio the other officer of his location.

Dawn Donaldson had been shouting and stopped. The deputy re-entered the bedroom to find Donaldson aiming the shotgun at him. According to Adams, the officer shot Donaldson one time in the chest to disable him. The officer immediately called for an agenda. ambulance, but Jimmy Donaldson died before it arrived.

Dawn Donaldson, the wife, was severely beaten. She was taken by Lifestar to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo and was listed in critical but stable condition.

Dept. will have a complete food concession, including its famous homemade Ice Cream, during the festival.

No alcohol or drugs will be permitted. All pets must be on a leash and everyone is expected to clean up after pets.

The Admission Fees are: Friday-\$8.00; Saturday-\$10.00; Sunday-FREE, or a weekend pass for \$16.00. Children under 12 are admitted free.

There will be nightly picking and jamming on the campgrounds, for several days before and during the festival. It is recommended that you bring lawn chairs, as seating is limited. However, there are plenty shade trees.

The Old Mobeetie Texas Museum Association sponsors the music festival as its primary fund raising event. Proceeds from the festival will be used for museum activities as well as helping provide for the continuation of the music festival. Being considered is the "contingency fee", which is presently \$300,000; both the county and the contractor feels this could be cut in half.

The contingency fee is a protection for both the county and the contractor to cover the cost of some unknown "added cost" which may arise during the restoration-some needed repair or damage not found prior to the letting of the contract. Dodge had two items in mind where costs could be cut. The contract presently calls for the restoration of the seating in the balcony; possibly the seats could be added at a later date. The balcony seating is listed as Alternate 4 in the contract as "fabrication and installation of bent plywood and cast iron seating for balcony" at a cost of \$70,000. The contract presently calls for linoleum in the courtroom of the same design as the original; this would have a special made item and is quite expensive. Present day materials could possible be made to look similar and

be much cheaper. A special meeting of the commissioners has been set for Monday, July 21, at 1:00 p.m. for further discussion of cost saving cuts. Item No. 7 was the consideration of the Burn Ban. The commissioners feel the ban is necessary at the present time. Should the hurricane in the gulf produce rain for this area, the ban can be lifted. Shannon M. Ferris Services In Houston


Shannon Michael Farris was born May 7, 1970 and died July 4, 2003.

The Dyson's have 2 tapes out now and working on their 3rd tape. Be sure and stop by their tape table. They would love to visit with you.









help with the funding. Action was tabled, awaiting response from the letters.

Daryl Snelgrooes, Commissioner, Pct. 1, informed the court of his need for a tractor and a brush beater. Neither of the items would reach the \$25,000 amount, which requires the approval of the court. The court approved Snelgrooes pricing the two items. County Clerk Margaret Dorman informed the commissioners of the special election set for September 13-Constitutional Amendment Election. The cost of holding an election is \$3058.00 with the 10 polling places. Dorman suggested the commissioners could consolidate the election precincts and reduce the cost to \$1355; this would be with two voting boxes in Shamrock and two voting boxes in Wheeler. After consideration, the commissioners voted to consolidate the voting precincts and add a voting box in Allison.

For the September 13 election only, voting precincts 1, 2 and 10 will vote at the W/Wheeler location, Senior Citizens Bldg., behind library; voting precincts 3 and 7 will be E/Wheeler, Wheeler Vol. Fire Dept.; Allison, voting precinct 4, will be at the Allison School voting precincts 5, 6 and 8 will be W/Shamrock, city hall; and voting precinct 9 will vote at their regular place, Shamrock Junior High Gym. As an added bit of information, the cost per ballot for the last Con-

stitutional Amendment Election was \$5.98 per ballot; the voter turn out was 3%.

Items 13 and 14 on the agenda concerned the North Wheeler County Ambulance Service. The county judge received a check in the amount of \$70,642 from the Texas Department of Health-Bureau of Emergency Management; this is grant money for the purchase of an ambulance to replace the unit destroyed in a wreck. The commissioners approved the transfer of the money into the Ambulance account.




The Wheeler County Commissioners Court adopted a County Wide Burn Ban EFFECTIVIEJULY 17, 2003, THROUGH OCTOBER 17, 2003. Specific restrictions will apply. Those producers wishing to burn crop residue on land designated for Ag use will have to follow the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission guidelines as set out below AND contact the local Sheriff s Office or Police Department BEFORE ANY burning may be done.

GUIDELINES:

1. Burning shall be commenced and conducted only when wind direction and other meteorological conditions are such that smoke and other pollutants will not cause adverse effects to any public road, landing strip, navigable water, or off-site structure containing sensitive receptor(s).

2. If at any time the burning causes or may tend to cause smoke to blow onto or across a road or highway, it is the responsibility of the person initiating the burn to post flag-persons on affected roads.

a. The initiation of burning shall commence no earlier than one hour after sunrise. Burning shall be completed on the same day not later than one hour before sunset, and shall be attended by a responsible party at all times during the active burn phase when the fire is progressing. In causes where residual fire and/or smoldering objects continue to emit smoke after this time,




