In Wheeler's first win of the season 44-18 against Boys Ranch

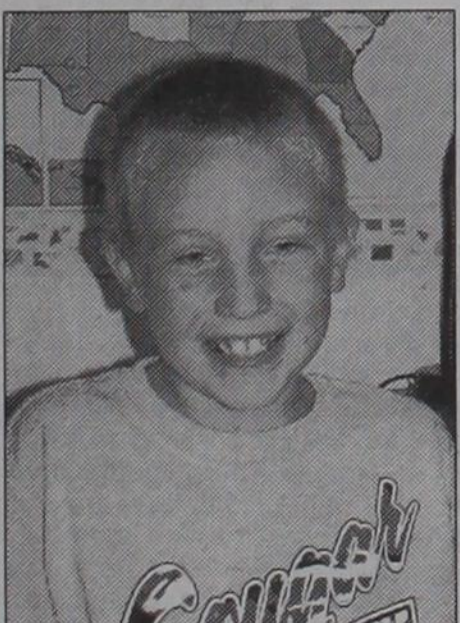
Terry Menefield carried 16 times for 71 yards and two touchdowns, returned an interception 53 yards for a TD and threw a 25-yard touchdown pass.

Wheeler won their second game of the season in Friday night's game against Claude 43-14.

Miguel Ramirez ran for 144 yards, and Terry Menefield scored three touchdowns in the game.

Ramirez scored twice for the Mustangs (2-3), Menefield cashed in a pair of 1-years runs and ran back an interception 40 yards for a score.

Commissioners Meet For Regular Court Tues.

Wheeler County Commissioners' Court met in regular session on Tuesday, October 9, 2007, in the commissioners' courtroom of the Wheeler county courthouse. The meeting opened at 10 a.m.

Seven items were on the agenda.

Before the items on the agenda were discussed, Larry Settle, a consultant with TES Energy Services, LP was introduced to the court. Settle informed the commissioners how deregulation of electricity in Texas could be of benefit. The only deregulated energy provider serving Wheeler County is Texas Utilities. The county presently pays the electricity at four locations receiving electricity from Texas Utilities.

There are 37 retail energy providers in Texas. Electricity customers with deregulated companies can receive their service from any one of these 37 companies. If the county at the next meeting chooses to check into the savings on electricity available, past bills can be checked and bids can be taken. Approximately 30% could be saved on the county's electricity bill in the Texas Utility area.

TES Energy Services will be on the agenda for the next commissioners' court meeting.

The court had no minutes of the previous meeting to take action on.

The monthly reports of the Justices of the Peace 1 and 2, County Treasurer and County Clerk were approved.

The commissioners voted to approve the hourly payroll time

The Mobeetie Volunteer Fire Department would like to thank everyone that made the Labor Day fundraising roping possible.

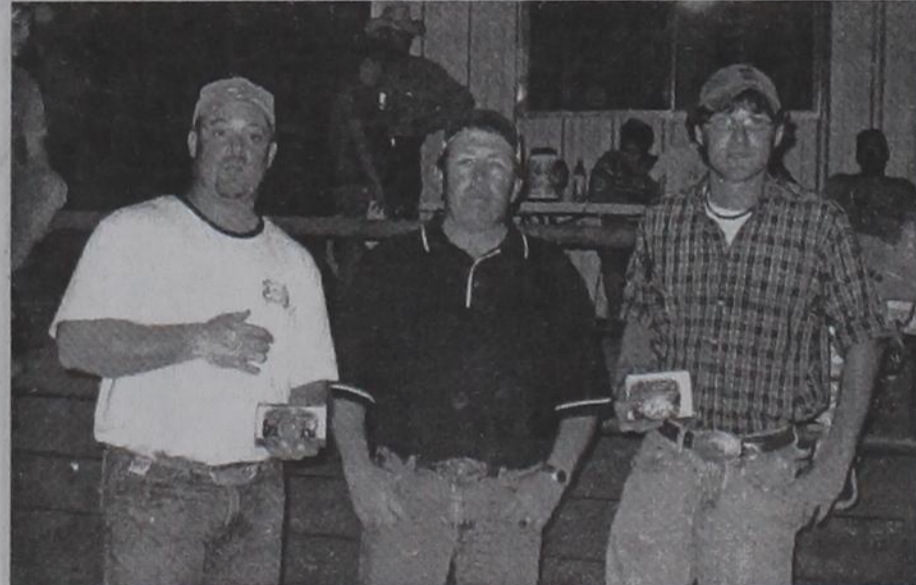

 Have you ever noticed how many genealogies there are in the Bible? There are literally pages and pages of genealogical information scattered throughout the Old Testament, filled with names of people that are so difficult to pronounce. The easy thing for us to do is just skip over those sections and regard them as useless or boring parts of the Bible. Granted, they may not be the most exciting passages in the Bible, but they are in the Bible. If we believe the Bible was inspired by God (I do!), then we must also believe that even these genealogies are in there for a purpose. Even the New Testament kicks off with a genealogy. Matthew 1:1-17 is only genealogy, but there is a lesson to learn from this particular genealogy.
 The list starts with Abraham. The Jewish audience would fondly remember that Abraham was in their genealogy, too; He was their father. They remembered his life of faithfulness and the promises God made with him. Jump down fourteen generations and there is David...King David! The greatest king that ever lived from their perspective. In fact, Israel was never better off than when he was the earthly king. Jump down another fourteen generations and there are some names that we would probably not recognize, like Josiah and Jeconiah, but they would remember that those men lived when Israel (Judah by this time) were taken into Babylonian captivity. That was their saddest national memory. But now, another fourteen generations have passed and there is the birth of Jesus.
 The way Matthew starts this book (and the New Testament), his audience should be ready to pay attention. These genealogies are setting up something incredible. Once this book is read, those who take the time to read will most certainly agree.



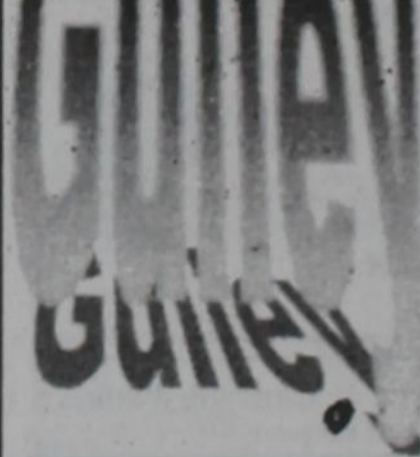
