Once upon a time we knew potential crime, we keep our

our neighbors. I mean more than just knowing their names, jobs, and any other superficial dewhere we practically do know we don't spend our time with neighbors being neighborly anymore. We meet each other at our places of business, in the grocery store or restaurants, at school events. Gone are the days when we just stood by the fence and visited with those who live next door to us. Gone are the days when we frequently have people in our homes for dinner, or to play 42 or spades.

We still have friends, but our friends are based upon common interests and common activities rather than similar addresses. There are some legitimate explanations for this, and we might not like all of the reasons. One reason is security. Due to events in this world and






