Centennial Committee To Have Bar-B-Q Dinner

A. W. has released his first C.D., "West Texas Dreams". He wrote 12 of the 15 songs on the soundtrack. He states, "My family has always been involved with music in some way or another. I started writing songs several years ago. On 'West Texas Dreams' I tried to put a little bit of everything. License Plates Will

The Texas Department of Transportation and local county tax assessor-collector's offices are featuring the Ducks Unlimited specialty license plate as the plate of the month of December. By purchasing a Ducks Unlimited conservation plate, motorists will help provide a rich natural legacy of flourishing wetlands and wildlife for Texas.

The Ducks Unlimited plate features a graphic design of a duck head overlaid on an outline of the state of Texas. Below are the words "Texas Ducks Unlimited" below the graphic. The legend "Wetlands Conservation" appears at the bottom of the plate in red lettering.

The Ducks Unlimited license plates are available to motorists for a \$30 annual fee, plus \$40 if personalized, in addition to regular vehicle registration fees. Of the \$30 fee, \$22 is deposited into a special fund for waterfowl and wetland conservation programs. The plates have been offered since 2000.

Applications for Ducks Unlimited plates are available at county tax offices, on TxDOT's web site (www.dot.state.tx.us), by calling the TxDOT Help Desk at (512) 465-7611, or TxDOT's Fax-On-

Demand forms line at (888) 232-7033. Customers requesting orders for specialty license plates through the fax service should enter the code 0999 to receive the form for the license plate they are ordering.

TxDOT started its specialty license plate program in 1965. Today, more than 100 different plate designs are available, many of them benefiting a particular group.

I love to sing. That includes singing with the songs on the radio while driving, singing along with the theme songs to the television shows I am watching, and singing silly songs to my young children. Of course I also love to sing "church" songs. Much of our time together as a congregation is spent singing songs. It is a valuable and enriching part of our worship.

In song, we are all linked together in thought and voice, proclaiming the essence of whatever lyrics have been composed. Often, the lyrics in each song are actually words that come straight out of the Bible. For instance, Psalm 95:1-5: "Come, let us sing for joy to the Lord; let us shout aloud to the Rock of our salvation. Let us come before him with thanksgiving and extol him with music and song. For the Lord is the great God, the great King above all gods. In his hands are the

Singing helps us affirm our belief, acceptance, and living out of God's word as a community of faith. We together praise the Lord, bear one another's burdens, and eagerly anticipate the day of the Lord's coming. The importance of song is not related to how skilled a singer we are, rather that we participate. Psalm 96: 1: "Sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth." Or Psalm 98: 1: "Sing to the Lord a new song, for he has done marvelous things; his right hand and his holy arm have worked salvation for him."

So sing out.

Going to high school is a time for growth, decision making and celebration for young people. Unfortunately, many students decide to celebrate by drinking alcohol or using mind altering chemicals. Too often, this produces disastrous results.

With Help And Encouragement, Young People Can Break This Tradition!

Project graduation was initially developed in Maine, under the title "Project Celebration" as a way to stem the deaths and disabilities associated with drinking, taking drugs and driving. In 1985, 95% of the schools in Maine hosted successful Chemical Free Parties.

This project celebrations planning guide provides ideas, resources, fund raising and promotion tips, and much more. It can be used to plan Prom/Graduation Celebrations as well as other parties during the school year. At the end of the 1983-84 school year, two schools in Texas piloted project graduation with great success. At the end of the 1985-86 school year approximately 200 Texas High Schools reported that they had successfully hosted Chemical-Free Celebrations around graduation time.

Description of Project Celebration

A statewide project celebration campaign spreading through Texas helps youths, parents, schools and communities help themselves. Local planning, organization, promotion and fund raising are necessary to successfully implement this idea. Committees of youths, parents, school personnel and community leaders produce their variations of project celebration to tailor ideas to fit their needs.

The primary aim of project celebration activities is to reduce the number of young people involved in drug and/or alcohol related driving accidents. Communities can offer an alternative method of celebrating special occasions. In many communities a Chemical Free Party is in stark contrast to a tradition of student/parent sponsored drinking or keg parties.

Implementing a local version of project celebration will often involve changing many established norms, attitudes and behaviors related to alcohol and other drug use.

A factor in drinking and driving behavior is the lack of accurate information concerning alcohol. Adult and youth drivers have a lack of knowledge in the areas:

- Effects Of Alcohol On Teen's Driving Skills
- Amount Of Alcohol Needed To Produce Impairment
- Alcoholic Content Of Various Drinks
- Time Required To Oxidize Alcohol
- Ineffectiveness Of Popular Methods Of Sobering Up
- Penalties Of Drinking And Driving
- Nature And Effectiveness Of Chemical Tests

Some parents who sponsor drinking parties for young persons are unaware of their moral and legal responsibilities for the health and safety of their minor guests. Typical excuses parents have offered for serving alcoholic beverages to minors are:

- "I'd Rather Have The Kids Drink Here—It's Safer"
- "It's My Kids Turn To Have A Party And ALL Her Friends Have Had A Keg At Their Parties"
- "We Won't Serve Hard Liquor, Just Beer"
- "All The Parents Allow It"
- "If My Kid Doesn't Drink At Home, He'll Do It Some Place Else"
- "I'd Rather Know What's Going On"
- "High School Kids Are Under A Lot Of Pressure. I Want Our Kid To Think Of Us As Friends"

Project celebration involves establishing a new tradition in many communities. Students and adults can learn that it is possible to have a good time at a party without drinking or using drugs. In many Texas communities, The Chemical Free Party idea has transcended graduation night, and now includes proms, end of sport season parties and other special activities.

This guide provides some specific suggestions for successfully implementing project celebration. Suggestions are provided for various tasks a school or community committee should accomplish. These suggestions have been used in communities across the nation.

Work Zone Fatalities-On Rise In Tex.

An increase seen in the number of highway work zone fatalities in Texas is prompting state transportation officials to ask motorists to use caution and heed warning signs in construction areas. Texas reported 192 highway work zone fatalities in 2002, up from 140 in 2001. The release of the figures comes on the eve of National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 4-10, during which transportation officials have an opportunity to get the message out about the increase in highway work zone fatalities. "We are striving to lower this troubling statistic by developing additional safety measures and supporting research dealing with work zones," said Mike Behrens, TxDOT executive director. "We hope motorists will do their part to increase safety." In recent years, highway work zones have been improved through the use of plastic construction barrels, signs and barricades, which are designed to reduce both vehicle damage and potential driver injury when hit by a vehicle. The use of portable concrete barriers and crash cushions also protect drivers from dangers such as steep drop-offs and construction equipment, as well as protect workers from traffic. TxDOT workers are wearing new safety vests with fluorescent reflective material all the way around, rather than just the front and back. The vests increase the visibility of the flaggers and maintenance crews. TxDOT has begun using prismatic fluorescent orange coloring on all work zone signs and safety devices in all new highway work zones in Texas. The fluorescent nature of the orange coloring makes work zone signs much more visible during dawn, dusk and nighttime hours as well as in foggy conditions. Texas, which has lead the nation in work zone fatalities since 1994, was followed in 2002 by California (119), Georgia (118), Florida (87), New York (60), North Carolina (47) Arkansas (40), Tennessee (38), Pennsylvania (33) and Alabama (33). Roadway construction zone-related fatalities have increased 70 percent since 1997, according to federal data recently posted at the National Work Zone Safety Information Clearinghouse. The data, compiled by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), show that 1,181 people died in roadway construction zones in 2002—an increase of 102 deaths compared to 2001 figures. Motorists can increase safety in work zones by: Staying alert and giving full attention to the roadway, signs and work zone workers; turning on headlights to make vehicle more visible; never tailgating or speed; always slowing to the posted limits, even if workers are not visible; never changing lanes in work zones. Motorists

should minimize distractions in vehicles such as cellular-phones and onboard navigation systems; always expect the unexpected in a roadway work zone; and be patient. **Work Zone Safety Tips**
 * Stay alert and give full attention to the roadway, signs and work zone workers.
 * Turn on headlights so workers and other drivers can see you.
 * Never tailgate or speed.
 * Always slow to the posted limits, even if workers are not visible.
 * Never change lanes in work zones.
 * Minimize distractions in vehicles such as cellular phones and onboard navigation systems.
 * Always expect the unexpected in a roadway work zone.
 * Be patient. Roadway work zones are necessary to improve the roads and make them safer.

\$325 M Is Available For Rural Commun.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced that it is making \$325 million in loans and grants available to rural communities to strengthen distance learning and telemedicine programs that serve rural America.

"Bringing specialized health care and expanded educational programs to rural areas will save lives and improve the quality of health care for residents who live in more sparsely populated areas of the country," said Acting Under Secretary for Rural Development Gilbert Gonzalez.

Telemedicine technology makes it possible for doctors to examine and direct the treatment of pa-

tients without being physically present. The distance teaming program finances equipment to expand educational resources to students and educational institutions in isolated rural areas. care.
