





Corn borer moths continue to lay eggs in corn. Larvae that have hatched from these eggs are feeding in the whorl and on leaves. They will soon begin entering the stalk where they will continue feeding for a short time before pupating. Moths that emerge from these pupae will produce the second generation of corn borer that quite often requires an insecticide appli-

The early spider mite problems in edges of fields seem to have declined either because of miticide applications, beneficial insects

Western corn rootworm beetles that are active now will lay the eggs that produces next year's rootworms. Rotation from corn to some other crop next year is the proven practice for reducing future rootworm problems; otherwise, insecticide applications may be required to control rootworm infestations.

Corn leaf aphids are present in some sorghum fields. These aphids are not considered important pests; however, they are important from the stand point that they establish a beneficial insect population that will help in control-


ling greenbugs that develop later. Check for cotton fleahoppers and Lygus bugs in area cotton. Once cotton begins to square these bugs become important pests, because they feed on the squares and cause them to shed. Protection of these early squares is very important in early fruit set on area

Beet army worm moths have been caught in pheromone traps, but no infestations have been reported in area fields.

outdated buildings for newer structures, the fate of the murals becomes increasingly uncertain," Parisi writes. "As of 2003, seven Texas post office murals already have been lost, destroyed, or have simply vanished without explanation.'

Laws for the treatment of post office murals are sketchy, though they are federal property and, theoretically, cannot be removed or altered without permission. In practice, however, murals are frequently taken down or painted over on sudden whims or lost through abuse or neglect, making it important, writes Parisi, to keep a written record of them.

Clyde A. Milner II of Arkansas State University says the themes, images, and artists of the Texas post office murals "now have a masterful reference work thanks to Philip Parisi. This great public art came out of the Great Depression. Some art lost; others, destroyed. But Parisi accounts for all of them and tells numerous fascinating stories about their creation."

About the author: Philip Parisi, who now lives in Logan, Utah, and is a freelance writer and visiting assistant editor of the Western Historical Quarterly, began work on this manuscript while on the staff of the Texas Historical Com-
