

NRCS (from Page 1) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Amarillo, Texas, was named the agency's National Rangeland Conservationist of the Year at the joint annual meeting of the Society for Range Management and the American Forage and Grassland

Council in Louisville, Ky.

"Clint-has demonstrated leadership in his field for many years," said Dennis Thompson, NRCS national range and grazing land ecologist. Much of Rollins' work has been with other entities. He developed educational contacts working with NRCS partners such as universities, state and federal agencies, and local land stewardship groups ranging from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service toWest Texas A&M University to the Native Plant Society. He has compiled educational booklets, plant identification resources and presentations that are used by schools, universities, 4-H clubs, vocational agriculture teachers and conservation districts.

"Clint's work with livestock producers has certainly benefited the rangeland resources in Texas," said Don Gohmert, NRCS state conservationist forTexas. "But by working with others, our young employees, and students, Clint has guaranteed that his knowledge will be passed along to the next generation of land stewards. For that, he is to be commended.'

Each year, Rollins provides a variety of trainings on range management to NRCS employees, conservation stewardship partners, landowners and youth at

Baby Animals Don't Need Human Help

Spring is almost here, bringing blooms, blue skies, and baby animals. If you spot a baby animal:

* Wait and watch. Most baby animals don't need humans' help-their parents are usually nearby

* Don't put baby birds with a half-inch or more of tail feathers back in the nest unless they are in obvious danger—they will only hop out again. If necessary, place the bird on the lowest limb of a small tree or shrub.

* Put featherless birds back in the nest (your scent won't keep the parents away). If you can't reach the nest, make one from a berry basket, kitchen strainer, or small plastic container with holes punched in the bottom and filled with shredded tissue. Hang it in a sheltered spot near the original



Protect Propane Tanks From Fires

At this time of year, wildfires fanned by dry winds threaten propane storage tanks in many areas of Texas. The Railroad Commission-the state agency in harge of propane safety-wants Texans whose homes or businesses are fueled by propane gas to know what to do in the event of one of these fast-moving fires.

"Wildfires have burned more than half a million acres in central and west Texas, so far this year, said Railroad Commission Chairman Michael L. Williams. "If you have a propage tank, you need to be prepared to protect your family and property.

"That means knowing what to do before, during and after a wildfire event," said Commissioner Victor G. Carrillo. "There are several simple, but important steps that need to be taken to be ready for wildfires."

"After a fire, if the service valve n your tank was closed, please contact your propane supplier before turning the tank back on," said Commissioner Elizabeth Jones. "For safety's sake, suppliers are required by law to inspect and leak-test your propane system before restoring service Iter any interpuption of service, including an emergency.'

Before A Wildfire: Make sure any small propane cylinders are stored outdoors, and check the area around your main propane fuel tank. Clean and clear out vegetation or other items that can burn around the tank.

Mow close to the ground, and cut back all growth around tank supports. Trim everhanging trees or shrubs.

Your propane supplier can help by showing you where your service line is buried and how to operate your propane system's safety features. Have your supplier show you and your family how to turn off the gas at the tank.

Your propane supplier can also ut a reflective Railroad Commission tank locator decal on or next to your electric meter or service box. The bright orange decal helps emergency responders find your tank, even if it's underground or dark outside. Finally, post emergency phone numbers in an greed location and make sure all ramily members know your community's warning signals and

gency Broadcast Network. During a Wildfire: If it is safe to do so, disconnect small propane cylinders from grills or other appliances and move them away from any structures. Shut the cylinders' service valves by turning them all the way clockwise. In the event of an evacuation, follow

After a Wildfire: Propane storage containers exposed to fire need to be inspected and, if necessary, tested and repaired after an emergency. Contact a licensed propane supplier to inspect the container and system and ensure it is safe for use. Always use cauon when re-entering buildings following an evacuation. If you smell gas, do not operate electrical switches, appliances or telephones. These actions could ignite propane vapor. Exit the building quickly and carefully. By Thomas A. Bowden First, the robber hit Willie Lee Hill more than fifty times with a can of soda, knocking him unconscious. Later, the 93-year-old victim awakened, covered with blood, to find his 24-year-old assailant ransacking the bedroom. When Hill pulled out a .38-caliber handgun from near his bed, the robber lunged at him. Hill stopped his attacker with a single bullet to the throat. "I got what I deserved," the robber told police afterward.

That episode happened in Arkansas last July, but similar acts of self-defense occur by the thousands all across America every year. Overwhelming historical evidence and common sense demonstrate that guns-often called the "great equalizer," for obvious reasons—are a powerful method of self-defense in the precious minutes before police can arrive.

In the District of Columbia, however, citizens may not lawfully possess a handgun for self-defense, even in the home. The Supreme Court will soon hear oral argument in D.C. v. Heller, which is expected to determine whether such a blanket ban violates the Second Amendment. But regardless of how the Court may interpret the Constitution, citizens deserve a legal right to own a handgun for self-defense.

As the Declaration of Independence recognizes, governments are created to protect our individual rights to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." The right of self-defense is included and implied in the right to life. In forming a government, citizens delegate the task of defending themselves to the police. But to delegate is not to surrender. Each citizen retains the ultimate right to defend himself in emergencies when his appointed agents, the police, are not available to help.

But what constitutes an emergency? What acts of self-defense are permissible in such a situation? And what tools may private citizens own for emergency selfdefense? The law's task is to furnish objective answers to such a few cars there every time we've questions, so that citizens may defend their lives without taking the law into their own hands.

An emergency, properly defined, arises from an objective threat of imminent bodily harm. The victim must summon police, if possible. An emergency ends when the threat ends, or as soon as police arrive and take charge. During that narrow emergency interval, a victim may defend himself, but only with the least degree of force necessary under the circumstances to repel his attacker. A victim who explodes in vengeance, using excessive force, exposes himself to criminal liability along with his assailant.

Many objects commonly owned for peaceful purposes can be pressed into service for emergency self-defense. But unlike kitchen knives or baseball bats, handguns have no peaceful purpose-they are designed to kill people. The same lethal power that makes handguns the most practical means of self-defense against robbers, rapists, and murderers, also makes handguns an essential tool of government force. Handguns are deadly force and nothing but-a fact that gives rise to legitimate concerns over their private ownership in a civi-

These concerns can be resolved only by laws carefully drawn to confine private use of handguns to emergency self-defense, as defined by objective law. Such laws must also prohibit all conduct by which handguns might present an objective threat to others, whether by intent or negli-

Contrary to an often expressed worry, therefore, a right to keep and bear arms in no way implies that citizens may stockpile weaponry according to their arbitrary preferences. Cannons, tanks, and nuclear weapons have no legitimate use in a private emergency, and their very presence is a threat to peaceful neighbors.

If handguns are confined to emergency self-defense, no legitimate purpose is served by an outright ban such as the District of Columbia enacted. Even if such laws actually deprived criminals of guns (which they don't), they would infringe upon a law-abiding citizen's right in emergencies to repel attackers who are wielding knives, clubs, fists-or cans of

With the aid of his handgun, Willie Lee Hill survived that violent home invasion last July. Selfdefense was his right, as it is ours. A proper legal system recognizes and protects that right, by permitting private ownership of handguns under appropriate limits.

Lapband Surgery Is Performed At GPRMC

Dr. Henry Horrilleno, a general surgeon at Great Plains Medical Center, performed the area's first lap band procedure on Elk Citian Anita Clinesmith.

Horrilleno has been performing this surgery for several years inDallas. He's now making it part of his surgery practice in Elk City. Horrilleno says it's one of the tools he can use to help his patients lose weight.

"The lap band procedure is the latest and, in my opinion, the best type of bariatric surgery available for those who, for whatever reason, can't lose weight on their own," says Horrilleno. For Clinesmith, the surgery was a last resort, but a necessary one.

"I've tried for years to lose weight, even lost 50 pounds a couple of years ago, but the weight kept coming back," said Clinesmith. "I was sick of dieting all the time, sick of diet pills, sick of exercising, sick of the whole

"I also suffer from obstructive sleep apnea and have to use a C-PAP machine at night to sleep properly. My research indicated many obese sleep apnea patients can stop using the C-PAP machine once they get their weight

"I saw a review of the lap band procedure on the Internet earlier this year. When I started check-

ing to see who could do the surgery, I found out about Dr. Horrilleno. I signed up for the surgery not long after he came to Elk

Horrilleno says the lap band is a tool for those wanting to lose weight.

"With the lap band procedure, we can use the lap band to make the stomach smaller. By doing that, the stomach tells the brain its full quicker, the patient eats less and starts to lose weight. But, the patient must also do the other things necessary for weight loss, continue to eat less and exercise for at least 30 minutes a day."

"Like any type of bariatric surgery, it's possible for the patient to gain weight if they don't eat right and exercise. That's why it's so important for the patient to be totally committed to following the plan. The lap band is just one part of the equation."

Clinesmith says she's already lost 30 pounds and dropped four clothing sizes.

"I went on a liquid diet before the surgery to get myself ready. Since the surgery, the weight has started to come off. I'm walking 30 minutes a day and sticking to the diet. For two weeks after the surgery I was on a liquid diet, now I'm eating solid food and eating three small meals a day. One thing I've learned is the importance of eating slowly and chewing your food properly. With the lap band in place, you have to do both these things, otherwise, you can find yourself with an upset stomach.

Clinesmith says the surgery was easy as far as surgeries go. "I went in early one morning, had the surgery and was released to go home later that day. I was a little sore for a couple of days but I feel great now!"

Horrilleno says the surgery is not as invasive or as drastic as stomach stapling or gastric bypass surgery.

"What we do is make five small abdominal incisions, all less than two inches long. I place the lap band around the upper part of the stomach, and then use saline solution to fill the band, making the small stomach opening smaller. By doing this, we trick the stomach into signaling the brain that it's full. Feeling full, the patient eats less.

Clinesmith says the thought of doing this surgery was a bit scary at first but Dr. Horrilleno put her

'He's such a great doctor. He really put me at ease about the surgery and what to expect. He's also given me a great deal of encouragement, helping to keep me motivated. My family's been great too, so supportive of my decision to have this surgery and they're helping me keep to the program."

Dr. Horrilleno says there are a few requirements to meet before being considered for the surgery. The person considering the surgery must have a body mass index greater than 35. The candidate for lap band surgery must not have any conditions that might make the surgery excessively dangerous.

With the surgery behind her, Clinesmith is feeling better, losing weight and thinking about the fu-

"My goal is to get my weight down to 135 pounds, which means losing more than 100 pounds. Once I get there, I know I'll be able to keep the weight off thanks to the lap band and to the changes I've made in my lifestyle.

Dr. Horrilleno says that's the right attitude to have.

"Like I have said before, the lap band surgery is a tool, a tool to help someone who can't otherwise lose weight and keep it off. I think Anita will do great because she has the right attitude. She knows that keeping her weight down is up to her. We've give her the tools to lose weight and keep it off. Now it's up to her.'

Clinesmith says she already feels better than she's felt in a long time. And that she says she can't wait to see herself when she's down to 135.
