The schedule Sunday called for brunch with the bride and groom at their home before we returned to Wheeler. The newly weds will take a wedding trip to Hawaii.

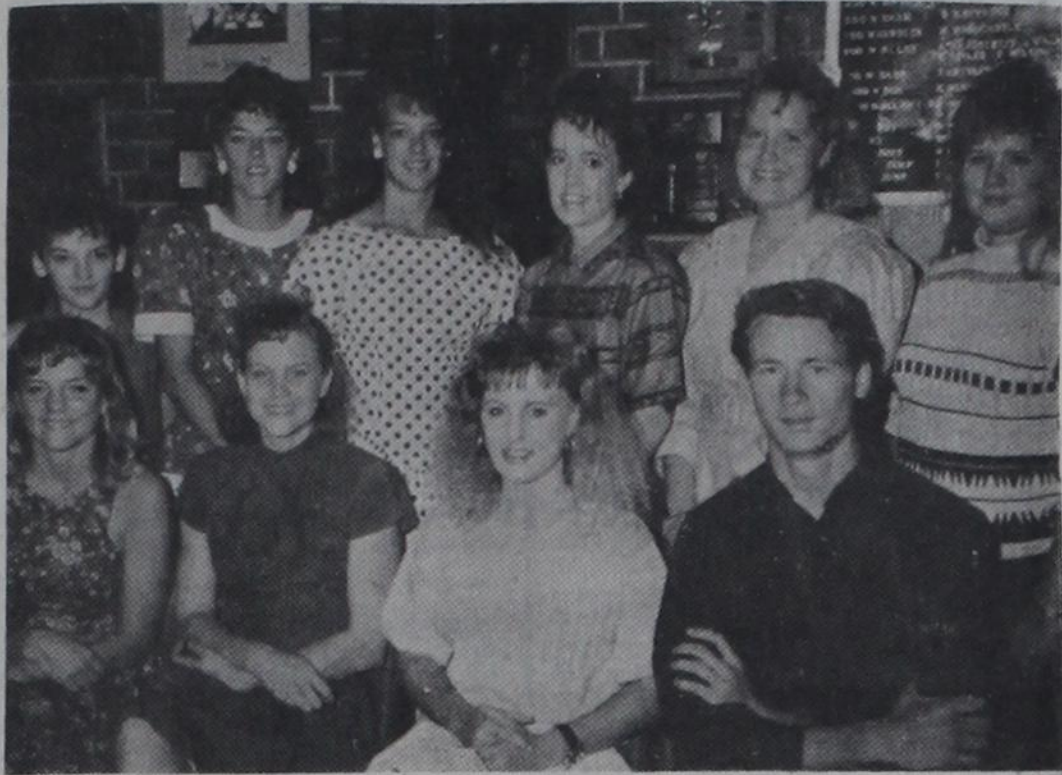

Preacher Artist, Sculptuer To Address Methodists

The Reverend Kenneth Wyatt, of Tulia, Texas, is a licensed United Methodist Minister, artist, and sculpturer who will preach at the Methodist Churches of Allison and Wheeler June 1, 2, 3. He will preach at 7:00 P.M. on Friday at Wheeler, at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday at Allison and at 7:00 P.M. at Wheeler, and at 9:00 A.M. at Allison and at 11:00 A.M. at Wheeler on Sunday. The public is invited to attend each service.

Rev. Wyatt is a graduate of McMurray College, Abilene, Texas and he holds religious study degrees from Baylor University and Cliff Seminary in Colorado. He reports that when he finished high school at age 14 he felt he wanted to preach so he "asked the Methodist district superintendent how one gets a license to preach, and he explained the process. He took me before the ruling conference board which was to determine whether I was capable of preaching. The board members felt I was too young until the conference Bishop said, 'You know, I started preaching when I was 14.' There was on opposition to the vote after they realized he was on my side. Three weeks later, I had a 'five point' church circuit, made up of churches in five, small Texas towns. I had to drive my daddy's roofing truck to the churches because I didn't have a car."

His oratorical talents developed as a minister and eventually led to officials of the Knife and Fork speaking bureau in Texas asking him to become a lecturer at civic clubs banquets and similar functions. This eventually brought him an invitation to speak in Dallas at an employee's banquet hosted by Texas Instruments. Rev. Wyatt related: "I was seated at the head table next to a famous Texas portrait artist named Dimitri Vail who was presenting one of the company's executives a painting he had done. While I was waiting to talk, I began jotting notes and sketching cartoons. Mr. Vail looked at what I was doing and said, 'Do you paint?' I said, 'No', and he replied, 'I think you have talent.'" Rev. Wyatt said, "he was

Pentecostal Sunday Celebration

The Assemblies of God was founded as a result of a religious revival which swept around the world in the early 1900s. During that time, many Christians in the United States and other parts of the world felt a need to pray and seek for more of God's power operating in their lives. In response, the Holy Spirit infilled large numbers of them, prompting a joyous, spontaneous worship and an intense desire to spread the gospel.

The beginning of the modern Pentecostal revival is generally traced to a prayer meeting at Bethel Bible College in Topeka, Kansas, on January 1, 1901. The revival spread rapidly to Missouri and Texas, then to California and elsewhere. A 3-year revival at Azusa Street Mission in Los Angeles attracted believers from across the nation and overseas and served as springboard to send the Pentecostal message around the world.

By 1914, the rapid spread of the revival created a number of practical problems. There was a growing demand for doctrinal unity, gospel literature, formal recognition of ministers, and approval and support of missionaries. Consequently, on April 12-14, 1914, some 300 preachers and lay people gathered from 20 states and several foreign countries for a "general council" in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

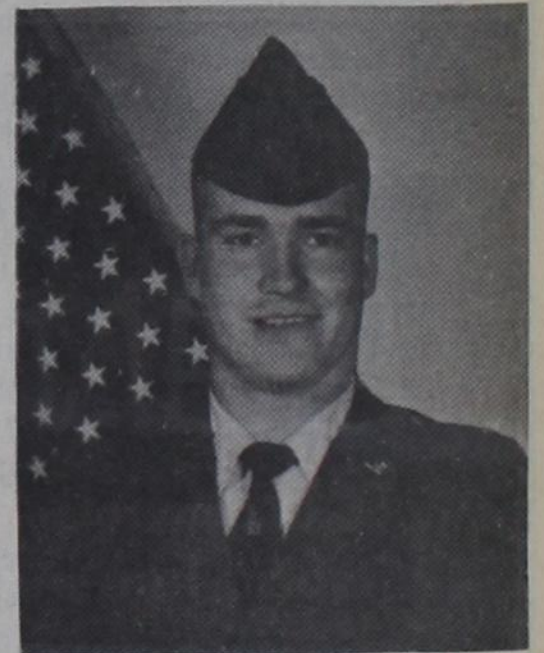

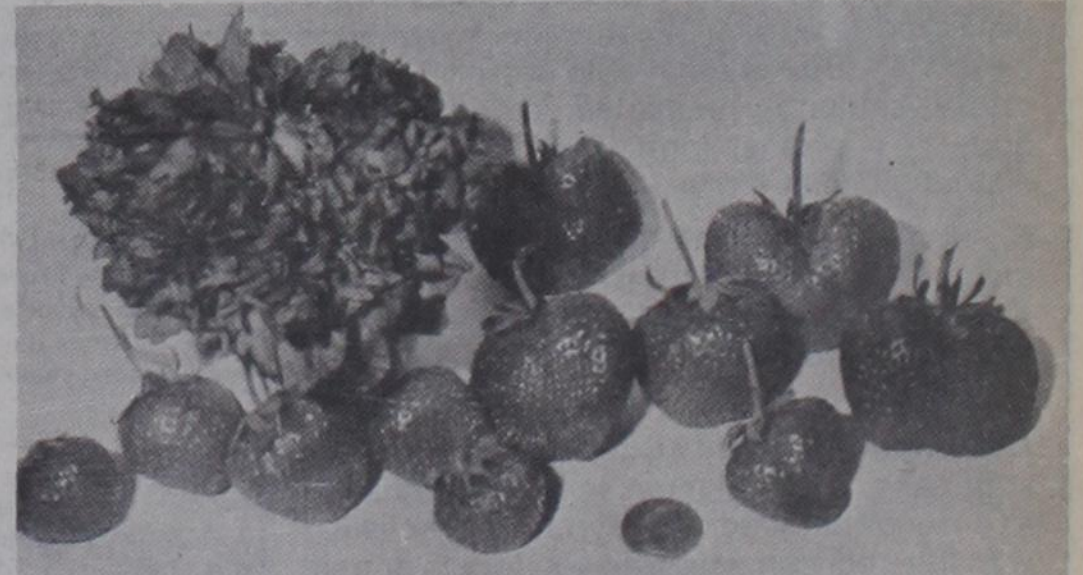
Robertson Receives Achievement Medal

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: Contact the Wheeler County Central Appraisal District Office at 806/826-5900. Larry Schoenhals, Chief Appraiser.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a *notice of protest*) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at P.O. Box 1200 Wheeler, TX. 79096

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the

ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

More information: You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 806/826-5900.

You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Property Tax Board, 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746.

Deadline for filing protests with the ARB

(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

Usual deadline: On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraisal value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

1990 Deadline: June 25
Late protests (if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.) Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact the appraisal district for more information.

Special deadlines:
Change of use (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land) Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

ARB changes (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed) Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

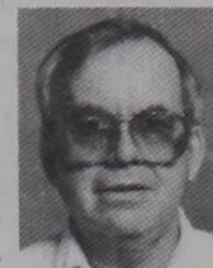

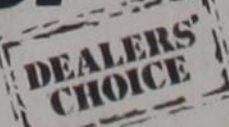

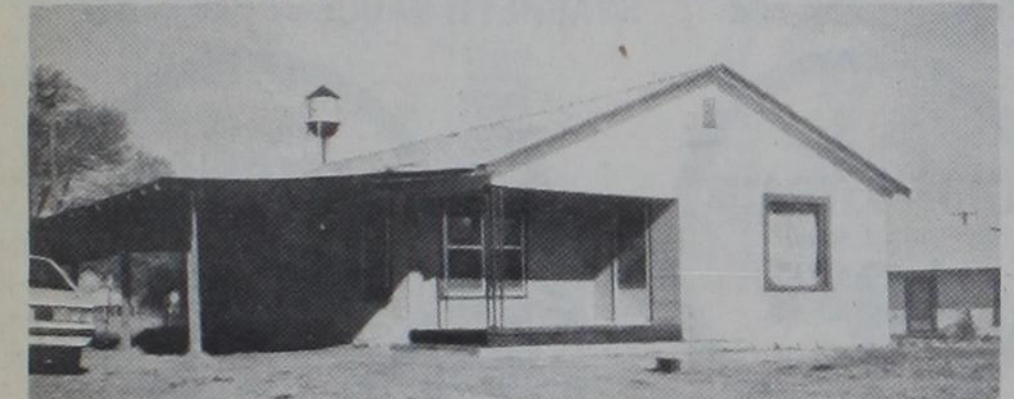

Wyatt From Page 1 getting \$10,000 for his painting, and I was getting \$200 for my speech. I guess, as John Wesley once said, I felt "strangely warmed."

After 30 years of preaching Rev. Wyatt took some time off and began to paint in the area of Western art, later he included religious art to benefit the United Methodist Church.

A few years back he was watching a Barbara Walters television special featuring a tour of President Reagan's Western White House when his eye caught a painting in the background. "There was my painting on the wall," he recalled. "It had been presented to President Reagan in Amarillo by one of the U.S. senators from Texas. I was so excited at seeing it, I ran over and hugged the television set."

Queen Elizabeth of Great Britain has also been presented a Wyatt painting which shows cowboys wearing slickers in a rainstorm; riding their horses while herding cattle. "I like to think, when Queen Elizabeth visited President Reagan, she may have spotted my painting of his on a wall and said, 'Oh, I have one of those.'" Rev. Wyatt muses. "It may have been the only thing they had in common to talk about."

One of his best western art customers is actor Ken Curtis, who played the part of Festus on the "Gunsmoke" television series. Rev. Wyatt reflects that "Ken once told me, 'If you can stay with Western Art until you make a name for yourself, you can go anywhere and paint anything.'"

A request from the Foundation For Evangelism of the United Methodist Church lauded Rev. Wyatt's career into religious art in the early 1980's. The Foundation commissioned him to paint "OFFER THEM CHRIST" to commemorate in 1984 two hundred years of Methodism in the United States when 60 Methodist Ministers organized the Methodist Episcopal Church in Baltimore. That movement led to Methodism being spread to the frontier territories through traveling preachers known as circuit riders.

The original oil painting "OFFER THEM CHRIST" hangs in the Upper Room Methodist Center in Nashville, Tenn. It depicts Methodism's founder, John Wesley, saying goodbye in England to preacher Thomas Coke before sending him to seek converts in the New World. Lithograph copies of the painting were sold to churches and individuals with the money used by the Foundation to help endow Professors of Evangelism in the 13 United Methodist Theological Seminaries in the United States.

A few years back, Rev. Wyatt finished a second project to help endow the Professorships of Evangelism. It is a set of 14 individual paintings showing Jesus Christ, Paul and the 12 apostles. Each set is signed and numbered. Rev. Wyatt said, "Some were easy, Paul just leaped from the brush to the canvas. Some, like Philip, seemed determined to hide forever in the colors of the paint and had to be literally twisted from the tubes."

He used live models. Thomas was a trucker he spotted in a cafe, Paul was discovered in Plainview, Matthew was on the Sesquicentennial wagon train that stopped in Amarillo. Other models are from such places as Florida, Ohio, New Orleans, El Paso, Amarillo and Canyon. His most difficult subject to talk into a setting was the man who finally posed for Jesus - on the condition that his name not be disclosed.

"The last to be painted," Rev. Wyatt said, "was the Master. I thought I could never have the nerve to paint Jesus, but, after the apostles, I had to produce an image of MY Lord and Saviour." The resulting picture shows Jesus preparing to wash the feet of his disciples at the Last Supper.
