Over 125 contestants have entered the Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo that is scheduled for August 2-4 in the Shamrock Rodeo Association Arena. Performances will begin at 7:00 p.m. each night. Admission will be \$3.00 for everyone 6 years of age and older.

On Thursday night, contestants in the five and under and the six to nine age groups will compete. Contestants in the 10-13 and 14-19 age group will compete on Friday and Saturday nights.

As an added attraction at this year's rodeo, two teams of adults from Wheeler and Shamrock will be competing against each other each night.

 In the eighteenth century an important religious leader was John Wesley. According to Biblical historians, Mr. Wesley was a brilliant preacher who constantly emphasized the practicality of Christianity. This practicality can clearly be seen in a reply that Mr. Wesley made to a man who boasted: "I never forgive people who offend me." Mr. Wesley's reply was: "Then I hope sir, that you never sin." With this reply, Mr. Wesley acknowledged a great New Testament truth. The New Testament clearly teaches that disciples of Jesus must extend forgiveness to people who offend them if they expect God to forgive them. For example, the eighteenth chapter of Matthew records a parable that Jesus told about a man who refused to forgive another man even though he himself had recently been forgiven. Because of his refusal to forgive, Jesus says that this man was handed "...over to the torturers..." (verse 34) And then Jesus concluded this parable by warning: "So shall My heavenly Father also do to you, if each of you does not forgive his brother from your heart." (verse 35)

# History Is 'Shorty' Sechrist's Hobby; Old Fort Is His Hunting Ground

**[EDITOR'S Note:** The following story was taken from the Shamrock Texan, May 11, 1989 by Kip Pease.]

Shorty Sechrist leased his first piece of land in the mid-1930's to begin his hobby of looking for artifacts from Fort Elliott, Mobeetie, Texas, and some 50 years later still enjoys the excitement of finding a piece of lost history.

Shorty, 76-year-old Wheeler resident, is probably the best authority on life on the calvary at Fort Elliott, which is now Mobeetie, but he learned about the Fort a little differently than most people; he received his education digging up old ruins in

what used to be the Calvary's dump ground.

Today, Shorty has quite an impressive museum, which includes everything from old bottles, uniform pieces, weapons to Indian arrowheads.

According to Mr. Sechrist, Fort Elliott, Mobeetie, Texas was established in 1875 and was one of the earliest settlements in the Texas Panhandle. The Fort was named after Major Joel Elliott, who was killed in battle with the Indians in 1868. The Fort was abandoned in 1889.

Shorty explained that the area now

known as Wheeler County was a little wilder than it is now. Not only was the country unsettled, but Old Mobeetie had ten saloons from 1874 until 1889. Of those were: The Mint, The Cabinet, The Traders, Ring Town, Frenchy's Hotel, Dutchey's Ranch, Perciller, Kesiah & Co., Dugout, and Trout Water City. Shorty has numerous bottles dating back to the saloon and the old Fort.

Some of the bottles in Shorty's collection include: Wine bottles, Lea Perrin Worcestershire Sauce, C Conrad and Co., Budweiser bottle, and Bitters bottles of all kinds. He estimates a total of 300 bottles are in his collection.

While looking at his collection of artifacts, Shorty commented: "I like to tell the story of old friend Wes Johnson who leased us the Calvary Fort Junk Ground. His remarks was "I laughed at you when I leased you my junk yard, but I had a gold mine and you were the only one who knew it."

Shorty's digging partner for many years was C.J. VanZandt. They also hunted with Ab Gunter, who is the subject of Shorty's favorite hunting story.

The story goes like this: "Mr. Gunter and I were walking our usual site looking for old treasures, I had put a gold painted arrow in my pocket and while Ab wasn't looking I threw it in front of him. He picked up the arrow and checked it in his teeth, then put it in his pocket after realizing that it wasn't the real thing. Mr. Gunter never said anything about it until a year later he sent it to me along with a

beautiful white Calvary dress hat with all the accessories which really added to my collection," said Shorty.

Shorty estimates that he has hunted approximately 25 camps in Wheeler County. He started his collection in Collingsworth County about 50 years ago with a few skeletons, beads, horse hair ropes, Mano and Metato stones, hide rocks and sets.

When asked if he had to pick out his favorite piece he said it would certainly be the 41 caliber Derringer pistol that he found with his son Richard. Shorty's dad carved the handle of the pistol which also made the piece special.

Shorty and his wife Sally grew up in Dozier and their parents' farms joined so they knew each other all their lives. Shorty and Sally were married in 1945 and moved to Wheeler where they raised three children; LaDonna of Ardmore, Oklahoma; Richard of Denver, Colorado, and Calvin of Amarillo.

He served as the Commissioner of Precinct 1 for three-two year terms. "I really enjoyed serving the people of Wheeler County and Precinct 1", said Shorty.

Another of Shorty and Sally's hobbies include a 45 acre peach orchard. According to the Sechrists, this year the freeze got most of their orchard but they will still have plenty of peaches.

It doesn't take long to figure out when talking to Shorty and his wife that their proudest treasure is their family and that they are Christians. They currently attend the First Baptist Church in Wheeler, Texas.

"He always took care of business first, but sometimes I think he would rather dig up one half an acre, two feet deep than dig up a flower bed for me," said Sally Sechrist.

## 4-H Junior Rodeo Dates

Canadian 4-H Riding Club opens the annual Hemphill County Junior Rodeo August 10 and 11.

Under the direction of Connie Rutherford, Riding Club Sponsor and Dan Cornett, Hemphill County Extension Agent, the two day show is open to young people between the ages of 8 and 19. Contestants will vie for nightly jackpots along with buckles to be awarded to the average winner in each event. Additionally an "All-Around Buckle" will be awarded in each age group based upon a two day average. Awards will be given to the Reserve All-Around in each age group.

Young cowhands ages 8 to 12 compete in breakaway roping, barrel racing, pole bending, goat tail untying, ponies, junior bulls and adult-youth ribbon roping. Adult-youth ribbon roping points do not count

towards the all-around average buckle. Entry fees are \$10 per event plus stock charge.

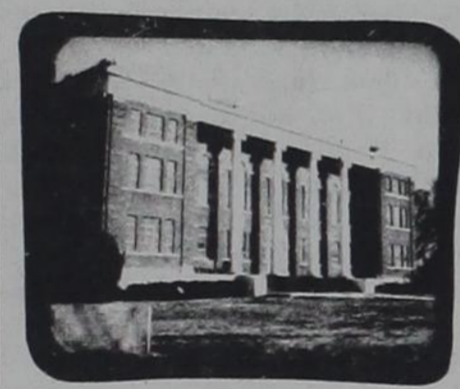
Open to youth age 13-15 is breakaway roping, ribbon roping, barrel racing, pole bending, goat tying, barebacks, and bullriding.

Events open to young people age 16-19 include tie-down roping, ribbon roping, breakaway roping, barrel racing, pole bending, barebacks and bull riding. Entry fees in both the 13-15 and 16-19 age groups are set at \$15 an event plus stock charge. Paybacks will be figured on 100% of the entry fee.

Open to all age groups, team roping fees are set at \$15.00 plus a \$6.00 stock charge. Team roping is a one header-enter twice. Points from this event cannot be counted towards All-Around awards.
