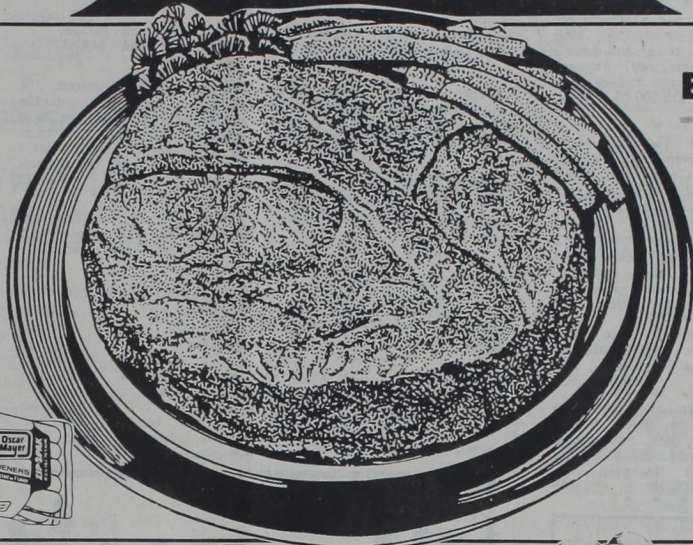




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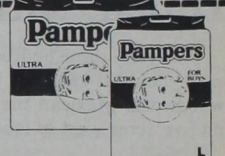



Bob, Deb and Kirbie visited the K. D. Douthits on Sunday and ate lunch there.

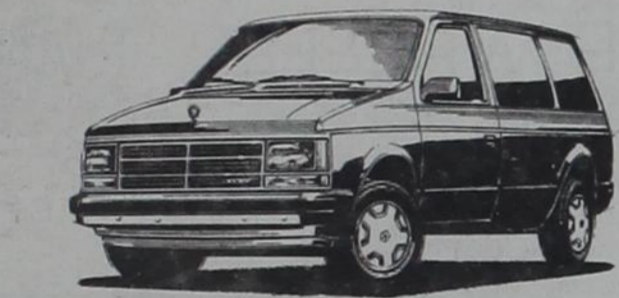
LIBRARY NOTES
