 The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service, is once again offering the Tax Practitioner Workshops across the state of Texas, in the Fall of 1990. These workshops are led by CPA's and attorneys who are experienced in the field of income tax reporting and planning. They provide valuable continuing education

opportunities for tax professionals seeking CPE and MCLE credit.

This year twenty-six General Tax Workshops, designed for practitioners who work mostly with individuals and small businesses, are offered in major Texas cities. The nearest one will be in Amarillo, on November 15-16, 1990. Fifteen Advanced Tax Workshops are also offered. They are directed to the practitioner with substantial experience with individual returns, who does some business work, and feels the need to develop more skills in business related work. One will be offered in Amarillo on December 3-4, 1990.

In addition to the General and Advanced Workshops, there will be four each of the Partnership Taxation and Estate Planning Workshops, and three each of the Income Taxation of Trusts & Estates and Problem Resolution Workshops. The Agricultural Tax Problems Workshop, which was introduced in 1989, will be offered this year in two locations - San Antonio and Amarillo.

When I read this prayer, I was immediately reminded of an event in the life of Jesus.

This event occurred in the Garden of Gethsemane when Jesus went to prepare Himself for the ordeal of Calvary. (Matthew 26)

He was accompanied by Peter, James, and John who were asked by Jesus to "keep watch" with Him. (verse 38) Jesus then "...went a little beyond them, and fell on His face and prayed..." (verse 39) But when He returned to the place where He left the three disciples, they were not watching. Rather they were asleep! And Jesus said: "So you men could not keep watch with me for one hour?" (verse 40)

What was Jesus emphasizing to these three disciples when he asked: "So you men could not keep watch with me one hour?" He was apparently emphasizing to these disciples that they had failed. They could have been of help to Him, but they had miserably failed.

After this initial failure, Jesus departed from them two more times to pray. And each time that He returned to these disciples, they were asleep. Jesus then said: "Arise, let us be going; behold, the one who betrays Me is at hand." (verse 46) Notice that Jesus said: "Arise, let us be going..." He did not say: "Get away from Me! I will not associate with failures like you." Regardless of their failure and regardless of the number of times that they had failed, Jesus was willing to be their Master if they were willing to be His disciples.

Here is one of the greatest blessings of Christianity. Jesus is not like the individual who says: "No one fails me, but once." There is no failure or sin so bad that Jesus cannot and will not forgive. He is not only the Lord of the second

1. If you have failed, do not quit. Try, try again! Seek the forgiveness of God that is found in Jesus Christ. The Apostle Paul described this forgiveness when he wrote: "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of His grace, which He lavished upon us." (Ephesians 1:7-8)

God is not only willing, but pleased to use any life that is cleansed by the blood of Jesus. It may be a life that is filled with many failures, but when God forgives, He forgets. (Hebrews 10:17-18)

Do not accept your failures as final. Accept the invitation of Jesus who said: "Arise, let us be going..."

2. If you know someone who has failed, but who is now trying to live a godly life, do not be cynical about this person, questioning their sincerity and honesty.

The Bible is filled with the stories of people who repented and were used by God in His eternal plan. For example,--

Abraham was a liar and a worshipper of idols. But he became the father of the nation of Israel.

Moses was a murderer, but he was the man who was selected by God to lead the Israelites from the bondage of Pharaoh.

Peter openly denied the Lord, but he was God's spokesman on the day of Pentecost, preaching the gospel of the crucified Christ.

Saul of Tarsus was "blasphemer and a persecutor and a violent aggressor." Yet he became the Apostle Paul who wrote the majority of the New Testament.

How malignant is sin. But how great is the forgiveness of

WINTER HOME FIRE SAFETY CHECK LIST

With winter approaching it is important to check home heating devices. Heating devices are high on the list of fire starters in the home and should receive periodic attention. The best time to check them is just before the heating season. Most stoves and furnaces do their jobs pretty well when the weather outside isn't severe, but when they're overtaxed, usually during the coldest part of the winter, they may let you down with disastrous results. Before each season, inspect all parts, including smoke pipes and flues; repair all defective or questionable parts, and give your system a good cleaning to insure safe operation.

FIREPLACES: Have the brickwork checked in older fireplaces. Use a screen to prevent flying sparks and logs from rolling out of fireplace. Keep dampers open. Never use flammable liquid to start or freshen fire.

STOVES: Coal and wood-burning stoves have a poor fire record because they require and do not receive special knowledge of installation and constant, careful tending. Here are a few of the major fire causes of wood burning stoves:

- * Heat radiation from stove, stovepipe or chimney igniting adjacent combustible materials
- * Sparks escaping into house
- * Sparks from chimney top
- * Fires from creosote accumulation in chimney

These fire hazards can be greatly reduced with:

- * Proper equipment selection
- * Proper stove installation, including adequate air space clearances and circulation

MAINTAINING AND USING WOOD STOVES:

- * Stove connector pipes and chimney should be inspected by competent professionals at least annually for possible defects that may have developed.
- * Use short hot fires rather than long smoldering ones.
- * Don't leave stove burning unattended or when children are present.
- * Do not store dry wood near or under stove and be careful of burning embers when tending fire.
- * Never use gasoline, kerosene, charcoal starter or other flammable liquids to start a fire.
- * Equip your home with adequate fire extinguishers and smoke/heat detectors.
- * Don't burn trash in stove.
- * Empty ashes into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid. Keep container off combustible floors.
