SKYROCKETS HUMBLE MUSTANGS 20-7

The Wellington Skyrockets proved to be just too tough a nut to crack last Friday night as they put a 20-7 whipping on the Wheeler Mustangs before a capacity Nicholson Field crowd.

It was the Wesley McKnight and James McIntosh show for the visitors from Wellington as they rushed for 287 yards of the 294 yards Wellington netted on the ground and scored all three of the Skyrocket touchdowns.

The loss dropped the Mustangs to a 2-1 record with Wellington keeping their record spotless at 3 and 0. Not only did the Mustangs suffer their first defeat but also had the first points scored on them after shutout wins over Sunray and Sayre.

Taking the opening kickoff, the red and white clad Skyrockets moved to the Wheeler 11 but McKnight was dropped for a 4 yard loss and two incompletions gave the Mustangs a reprieve but it was short lived after taking over on downs.

Getting a first down on their first

two running plays, the Mustangs were forced to kick and Brandon Chick booted the pigskin to the Wellington 49 and lightning struck the Mustangs on Wellington's first down effort. McKnight broke loose and was gone for a 51 yard TD run and after David Duncan's PAT kick was no good, Wellington led by six with 6:47 to play in the opening quarter.

Defense took over for both teams after Wellington's initial touchdown until just past midway of the second period when Wheeler thwarted a Skyrocket drive at the Mustang 5. On

third down from the 4, quarterback Jason Beers ran for 29 yards to the Wheeler 33. Two plays later the Mustangs were back on their 25 when Mark Marshall's number was called and the sophomore tailback responded with a 75 yard touchdown run that

sent the Mustangs into the dressing room with a 7-6 margin after Alamo Altamarino kicked the extra point.

The Mustangs kept trying to get something sustained going in the second half but managed to get inside

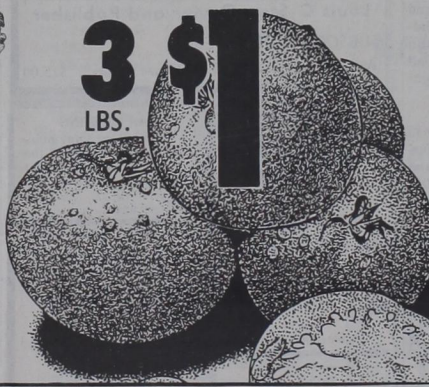

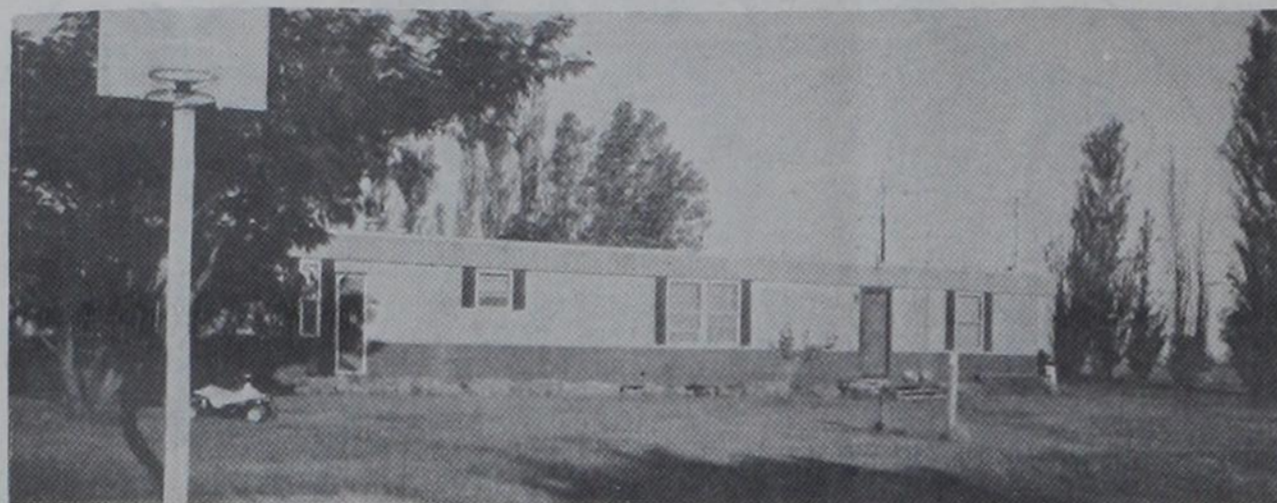

From The Minister's Desk:

A recent issue of Time contains an article that was entitled, "How To Live With Stress". This article was written by Dr. Paul J. Rosch, professor of medicine at New York Medical College and president of the American institute of Stress in Yonkers, New York.

In this article, Dr. Rosch concluded that the nerve-tangling and stomach-tightening lifestyle of Americans has produced an epidemic of stress in the United States. And according to Dr. Rosen, this epidemic has adversely affected this nation. For example, he stated that stress is a major contributor to heart disease which is the leading cause of death in the United States. Dr. Rosch also stated that work stress maybe the United States greatest health problem, emphasizing that its resulting cost to employers totals more than \$200-billion a year.

To control this epidemic, Dr. Rosch gave four suggestions which he called "stress busters". These four suggestions are:

1. Do not waste your time and energy trying to influence things that you cannot possibly.
2. Do not allow anyone to put you in an inferior position. If you have been treated unfairly, learn to act assertively, but reasonably.
3. Do learn to say "no" when a request is unreasonable

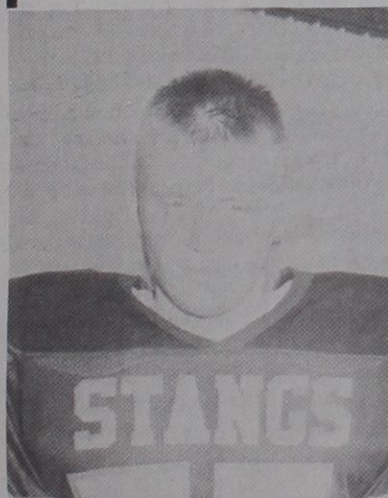

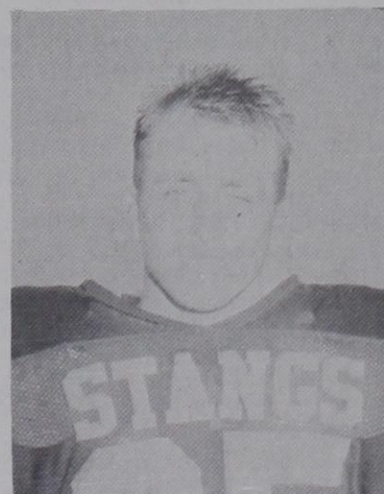

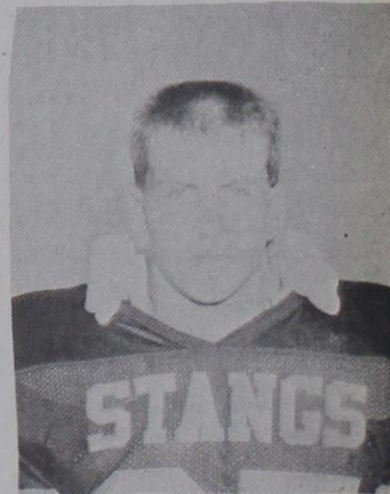
