## MUSTANGS TROUNCE MEMPHIS 61-0

### Wheeler Wins District 1-1A

The Wheeler Mustangs tuned up for the state playoffs last Friday night as they rode a great defensive effort and trounced the Cyclones of Memphis to the tune of 61-0.

Three fumble recoveries led to easy touchdowns; two punts were blocked that led to touchdowns; the second half kickoff was returned for six points and an intercepted pass set up an

easy six pointer so the Mustangs used these gimmies to just toy with the hapless Cyclones.

The win gave the Mustangs the outright championship with a perfect 5-0 record and set up the bi-district game with the Nazareth Swifts this Friday night in Canyon.

Wheeler led the Cyclones 34-0 at halftime after putting 27 of those points on the scoreboard in the second

quarter after a short 38 yard drive gave the Mustangs a 7-0 margin at the end of the first quarter. Mark Marshall got his first of three touchdowns in the game at 6:04 with a one yard run and Arthur Altamirano booted his first of seven extra points.

Memphis got no closer than the Wheeler 45 to scoring and this was the result of a lost Mustang fumble and ended the game with just a yard total offense and this was a team that was picked to fight the Mustangs for the championship.

The scoring explosion in the second quarter got its start with a blocked punt at the Cyclone 16. A 14 yard pass to freshman running back Ashley Brownfield from Jason Beers put the ball on the 3 and two runs by Mark Marshall upped the score.

The next three times the Cyclones had the pigskin, they fumbled it away to Wheeler on the Memphis 34, 10 and 39 and each time the Mustangs capitalized and got six points. Mark Marshall scored from the 10 and Brownfield went over from the 2.

The first half scoring was closed out

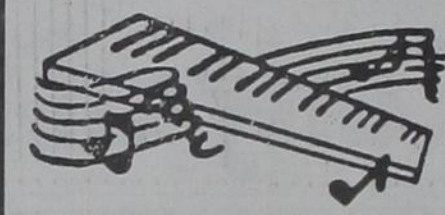

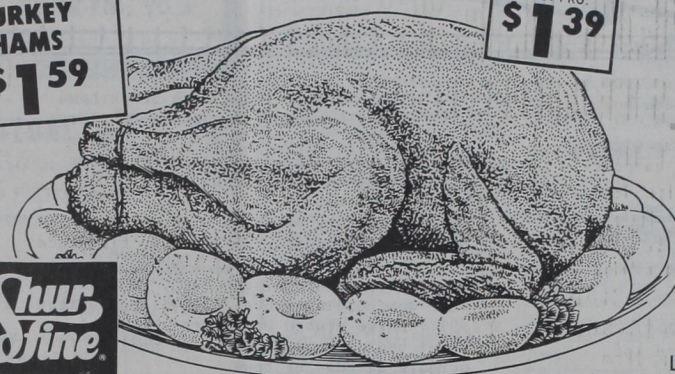

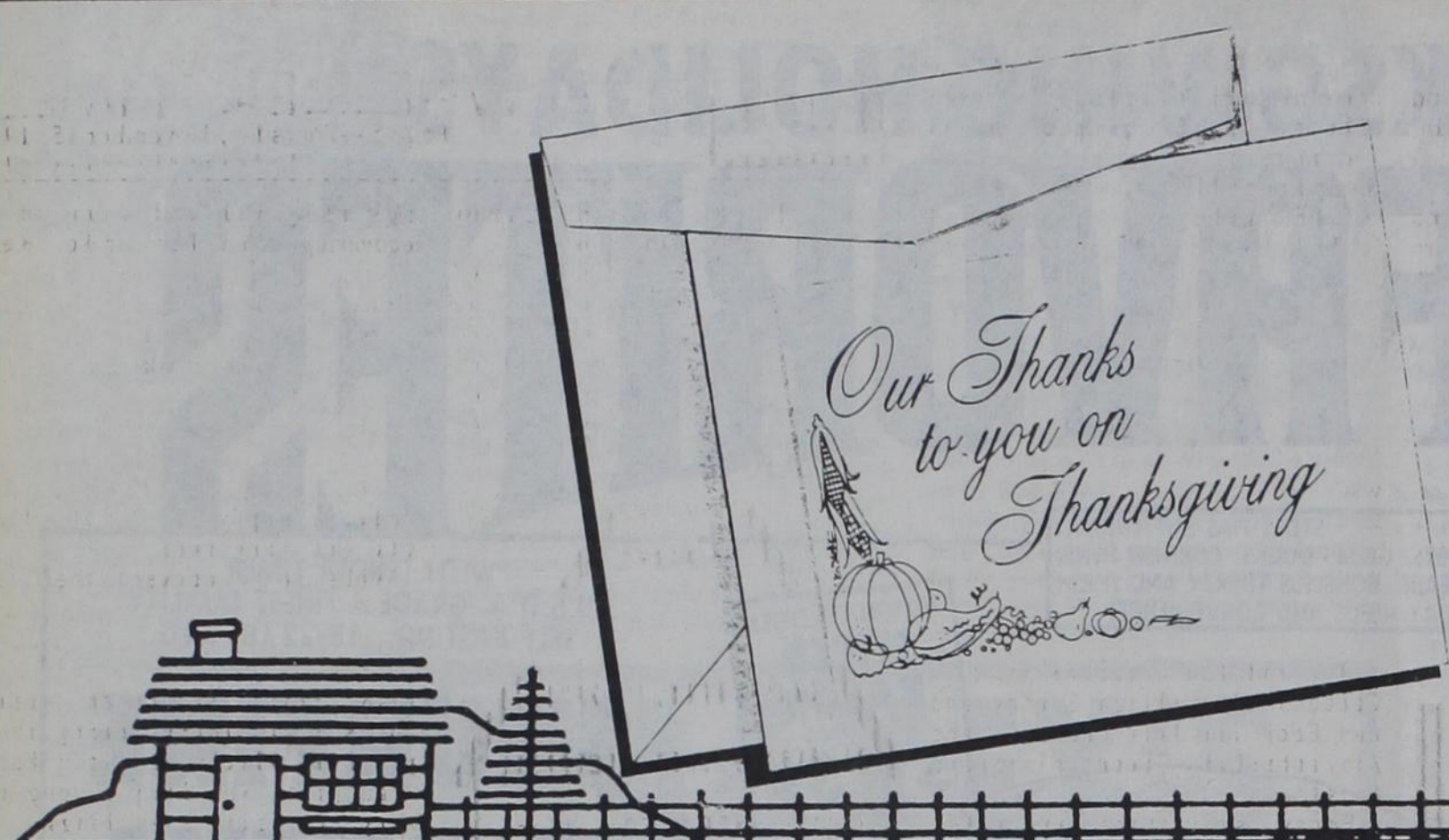

In addition, the product line will include ANI and Automatic Location Information (ALI) display units compatible with, and similar to, those offered by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and other local exchange carriers in Texas. (The ALI feature displays a caller's address on the computer screen.) The rate charged existing 9-1-1 customers may be revised at the expiration of their contracts with GTE-SW if the proposed tariff is approved.

This filing has been assigned Docket No 9667. The hearing on the merits is scheduled for February 25, 1991, at the offices of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The deadline to intervene in this docket is December 31, 1990.

### WINTER HOME FIRE SAFETY CHECK LIST

#### SELECTING A STOVE:

\* It's best to purchase a new stove from an experienced, reliable dealer.

\* Although more expensive, plate steel and cast iron stoves last longer and retain heat for longer periods.

\* Check stoves for sources of certification or listings such as Underwriters Laboratory (UL). It's an indication of successful testing of the stove.

\* If you purchase a used stove, inspect it thoroughly for cracks and similar defects. Also check legs, hinges, door seals and draft louvers.

#### WHEN TO CLEAN A STOVE OR FIREPLACE CHIMNEY:

\* Best rule of thumb, whenever 1/4" of creosote has built up anywhere in the total chimney system, the chimney should be cleaned.

\* Chimneys must be inspected frequently. Creosote buildup varies greatly, depending on such things as frequency of usage, type of fires, stove model and wood variety.

\* The best cleaning program is to have a professional chimney sweep do it.

\* Chemical chimney cleaners are not always effective. The only way to maintain a clean chimney is by frequent inspection and cleaning.

#### PORTABLE ELECTRIC HEATERS:

Install and use according to manufacturer's instructions and/or guidance from local fire department or electrical inspector's office. Place away from stairwells and doorways. Keep heater away from combustibles-bedding, drapes, furniture, etc. Keep people away too, especially children and persons wearing loose clothing. Warn children never to insert fingers or objects through the protective guard.

Heaters, like air conditioners, require separate circuits because of high wattage (1,000 or more watts). Have an electrician determine circuit capacity and make necessary installations before you plug in the heater. Do not use extension cords.

#### PORTABLE FUEL-OIL HEATERS:

Unvented fuel-oil heaters (kerosene, etc.) and gas heaters require a constant supply of fresh air for safe operation. They should be listed by a testing agency, and placed away from combustibles and exitways. When filling fuel-heater reservoir, leave room for expansion of the liquid when it is heated. Clean up

### Buckingham To Receive Silver Scholarship

A group of Texas Tech University agricultural sciences students will be recognized as Dean's Scholars at a reception Monday (Oct. 29) in the University Center Courtyard.

University faculty members, administrators and students parents will honor the academic achievements of the students.

Each of the Dean's Scholars will be awarded either a Gold or Silver Scholarship. Gold Scholarship recipients will receive \$2,500 per year for four years, and recipients of the Silver Scholarships will receive \$1,250 per year for four years, as long as the students fulfill the requirements of the program.

To qualify for a Gold Scholarship, students must graduate in the upper 10 percent of their high school class and/or have a combined Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score of 1,300 or higher or score a composite grade of 30 or higher on the American College Test (ACT). Silver Scholarship recipients also must graduate in the upper 10 percent of their high school class and/or have a combined SAT score of 1,200 or higher or score a composite grade of 28 or higher on the ACT.

To retain the scholarship each year, the student receiving the Silver award must sustain a 3.2 average for a minimum of 30 credit hours. Silver Scholarship winners are: **Brett Buckingham**, sophomore agricultural economics major from Wheeler.



**From The Minister Desk:**  
In the book, "None Of These Diseases", the author, Dr. S.I. McMillen, uses a story from a book by Dale Carnegie to illustrate the danger of revenge.

According to this book, Mr. Carnegie was on a tour of Yellowstone National Park when he was taken with the other tourists to the place where the grizzly bears were fed. As they watched the bears eat, a guide told them that a grizzly bear can kill almost any animal on the North American Continent. But Mr. Carnegie noticed that there was an animal that the grizzly bears were allowing to eat with them—a skunk.

One of these grizzly bears could have easily lived up to their reputation and killed this two-toned intruder. But none did! Why? These bears apparently realized the results that would come from such an action.

Smart bears! Much smarter than the many people who spend weary days and sleepless nights thinking about wrongs done to them, fostering resentment and planning revenge. These people do not apparently realize the tragic results of such attitudes.

Do you? What do you do when you are mistreated? For example, what would you do if—

Your boss promises to recommend you for a promotion, but instead belittles your performance?  
Your mate who pledged to

leave you for better or worse leaves you when life becomes worse?  
Your dearest friend gossips about the secrets of your life? Such experiences are unjust and unfair. But what should your response be? Should it be a response of revenge or forgiveness?

Perhaps the proper response is given in Ephesians 4:31-32 which says: "Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. And be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving each other, just as God in Christ also has forgiven you." The proper response then is to forgive those people who mistreat you. And this response is motivated by the forgiveness that you have received from God. Notice that the Apostle Paul said: "...Just as God in Christ also has forgiven you." (verse 32)

When it is hard for you to forgive some one who has mistreated you, focus on the forgiveness that you have received from God. Ponder on the sins that He graciously forgave. And remember that this forgiveness is not the results of what you did; it is the results of what Jesus did. (Ephesians 2:4-10)

To freely forgive people is to be like God. And it makes you as smart as a grizzly bear.
