An active lecturer and writer, Taylor has spoken to corporate service and student groups throughout the U.S. He authors the weekly column, "Minding Your Own Business," which is carried by the "Amarillo Sunday News-Globe" and more than 20 Newspapers in a six-state area.

Taylor is a graduate of Wayland Baptist University in Plainview, Texas, with a Bachelor's Degree in Marketing and Communications. He has done graduate work at West Texas State University.

The Wheeler Mustangs got back to their winning ways last Friday night as they beat the Quanah Indians 14-7 on Nicholson Field.

Putting the Wellington loss on the back burner, the Mustangs parlayed an ever improving defense and the stout running of Mack and Mark Marshall to earn their first victory over the Indians in the short three year series. It was the Indians that last year pulled out a victory on the game's last play but it wasn't to be this year.

Falling behind 7-0 in the first quarter, the Mustangs tied the game in the second period on a 10 yard run by fullback Mack Marshall and went ahead for good midway of the third quarter.

Starting on their own 35 on their second possession of the pigskin in the game, the Indians were stopped on the 43 and forced to punt but Nathan Willeford lost the handle on the kick at the Wheeler 25 and Quanah was in the end zone five plays later. The touchdown came on a 6 yard pass from quarterback Gaby Newsum to Craig Brinkerhoff. Toby Wilson booted the extra point with 3:15 to

play in the first quarter.

Trailing by seven and not having a first down, the Mustangs relied on their defense to put them in shape to tie. Forcing Quanah to punt from their end zone on the second play of the second stanza, the Mustangs Brandon Chick returned the boot 8 yards to the Indian 32. Mack Marshall carried three times for a first down on the 14 and then Willeford added 4 more to the 10 and then Marshall got his first TD at 9:10 on the clock. The touchdown run was only the second first down the Mustangs had made. Alamo Altamirano booted the Mustangs into the tie and the score remained 7-7 at the half.

The quicker Mustangs throttled the much heavier Indians running game and although the Indians did complete 11 passes for 100 yards, the Mustangs picked off three aeriels to stymie that part of the Indians offense. Quanah got across midfield only twice in the second half and were stopped at the Mustangs 36 and 34 and one of those possessions came as a result of a Mustang fumble, which they had four and lost all four for the game.

A short 19 yard kick after the Indians had received the second half

kickoff set the Mustangs up at the Wheeler 46 and nine plays later Mack Marshall got the game's final touchdown on a five yard run. Mark Marshall had led the drive with five straight runs totaling 56 yards to get the ball to the 4. Altamirano booted the Mustangs to their third win of the year with 6:39 to play in the third quarter.

Travis Hughes, Jason Beers and Brandon Chick all had thefts of Indian passes to quell any hopes of making a comeback the Indians might have after their running game couldn't get untracked.

Mark Marshall led Mustang ball carriers with 114 yards on 14 carries.

Way to go, MUSTANGS. Treat Vega the same way this week.

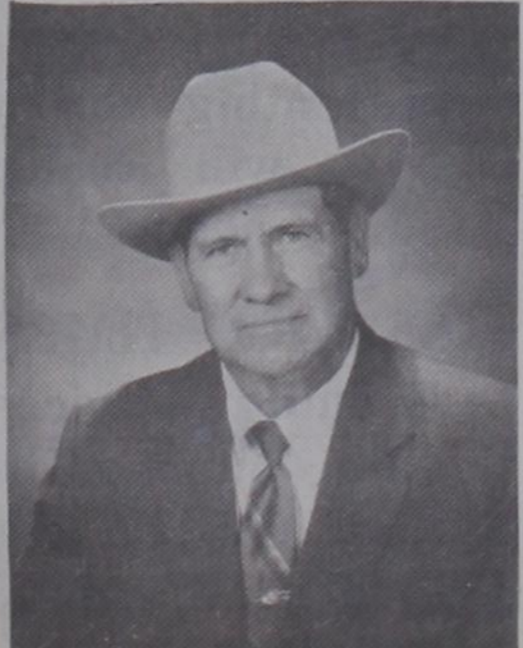

From The Minister's Desk:

In his play, *Murder In The Cathedral*, T. S. Eliot warned about hypocrisy, saying: "The last temptation is the greatest treason—To do the right deed for the very wrong reason".

Mr. Eliot was not the first person to warn about hypocrisy. Throughout His ministry, Jesus constantly warned about hypocrisy, condemning

severely those people who were hypocritical. (Matthew 23)

But what exactly is hypocrisy? The dictionary defines hypocrisy as "a semblance of having desirable or publicly approved attitudes, beliefs and principles that one does not actually possess." From this definition, two important observations can be made. These observations are:

1. There is a difference between Christians who sin and Christians who are hypocritical. And this difference is sincerity not sinless perfection.

Jesus did say: "...You are to be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:48) But the Greek word for perfect is *teleos* which means, "Of full stature, of full age, of full growth or of full development." It is this maturity that Christians are sincerely striving to achieve. And as they strive to achieve this maturity, their progress will be characterized by mistakes, errors and sins. Such Christians are not hypocrites because as long as Christians

In the flesh there will be a difference between the "is" and the "should" of their lives. (1 John 1:8-10)

The evidence of hypocrisy is insincerity not imperfection.

2. Hypocrisy is rapidly becoming extinct. With such attitudes as, "Tell it like it is", and "do your own thing", hypocrisy is becoming harder and harder to find. But its extinction should provoke regret not pride.

Hypocrisy is said to be the homage that vice pays to virtue. Where there is no hypocrisy, where vice ceases to shroud or veil itself, a serious condition of wickedness exists. And there is much evidence that shows such a condition presently exists.

For example, women confess their abortions and urge other women to have one. Homosexuals boast of their lifestyle on television talk shows. Marriage is considered old fashioned and "living in a relationship" is acceptable. Pornography is openly available to children. Profanity is used by men and women in every aspect of a bluish society.

The extinction of hypocrisy is tragic. And with its extinction, sin is openly advocated and practiced.

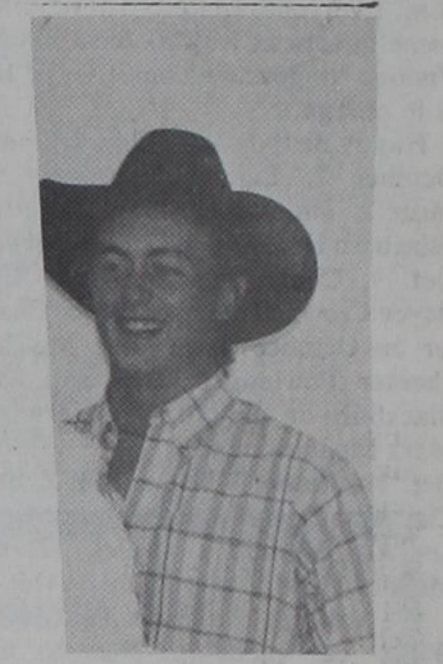

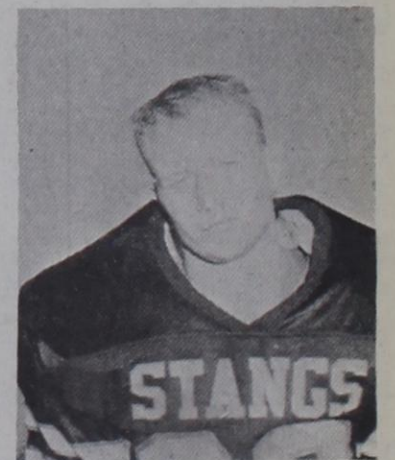
