You may expect puzzles, mazes, book talks, and special guests.

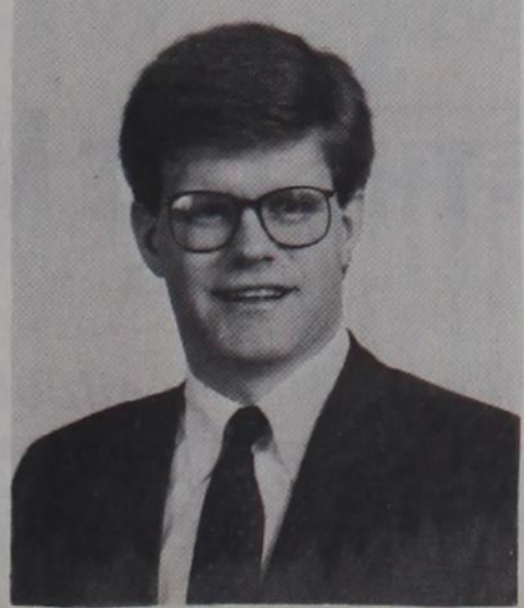

Mrs. Sallie Harris, Charter Member of the Old Mobeetie Association, gave the History of the Mobeetie Post Office from the beginning of mail service to Ft. Elliott in 1878 through present times. She told of the hardships endured by the early day carriers and of the cast of a letter sent from Dodge City, KS to Mobeetie being 50 cents.

She described the first Mobeetie Post Office as being a shack, built of shipping crates from Ft. Elliott and the roof was made of tin cans that had been flattened out. One of Mobeetie's early Postmasters, J. J. Long, was quoted as saying it was very noisy in the Post Office when it rained or hailed.

Guest speaker of the day was our Congressman of the 13th District, the Honorable Bill Sarpalius. The Congressman told of the meaning of our flag. The colors, the stars and the stripes and how great it is to live in a free country. He also spoke of his recent visit to Lithuania and what a great feeling it was to see the people of that country reading their first newspaper that was printed, unedited, by the government.

It was an honor to have Congressman Sarpalius in Mobeetie to share our special day.

The marker was unveiled and the inscription read by Ada Lou Lester.

Eighty-five people attended the ceremony and enjoyed refreshments prepared and served by members of the Old Mobeetie Association and the Mobeetie Post Office employees. Among those attending were 16 postal employees. Twelve of which were Postmasters and their families from the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandle.

The Old Mobeetie Jail Museum was opened following the Dedication Ceremony and several people including, Congressman Bill Sarpalius, and his son, enjoyed touring the museum.

From The Minister's Desk:

"The Times Of My Life" is the title of the autobiography of Betty Ford, the wife of former president Gerald Ford. And in this autobiography, Mrs. Ford candidly discusses her past addiction to drugs and alcohol.

Before she received treatment for her addiction, Mrs. Ford acknowledges that she blamed other people for her addiction. But she finally came to the conclusion that she could only blame herself. She said: "In the end, what it comes down to is that you have to take the responsibility for yourself. Never mind that your wife kept a dirty house or your mother didn't like you or your husband can't remember your wedding anniversary. Everyone has disappointments and anyone can rationalize his actions. But none of that matters. Blaming other people for your condition is a waste of time."

Mrs. Ford is not the first person to blame someone else for a mistake or a sin. Such a response has been popular since Adam attempted to blame Eve for his sin. (Genesis 2:1-12) It is extremely hard to say: "I have sinned." Most people rationalize their actions by saying: "I have sinned, but my sin is not as bad as your sin" or "I have

sinned but your influence made me do it" or "I have sinned, but you would have done much worse under the circumstances." It is hard for people to simply say: "I have sinned."

This confession—"I have sinned"—is found thirteen times in the Bible. It is insincerely made three times. It is non-personally made three times. And it is made five times by people who were confronted by their sins. Yet only David and the younger son in the parable of the Prodigal Son candidly acknowledged their sins. (II Samuel 11-12, Luke 15:11-32)

When David was confronted with his sin, he did not blame Bathsheba or permissive society. He simply acknowledged: "I have sinned against the Lord." (II Samuel 12:13) and the younger son did not try to blame the father or the elder son for his sin. He simply acknowledged: "Father, I have sinned against heaven and in your sight..." (Luke 15:18)

"I have sinned!" This is a hard confession to make, but it is necessary if people sincerely want to have a relationship with God.

FmHA to Begin New Comm. Loan Program

The Farmers Home Administration is extending its guaranteed loans to community program projects, thereby expanding its lending ability. FmHA State Director, Neal Sox Johnson, said today.

Until now, all of FmHA's loans for water and sewer systems, fire stations, health clinics and other community facilities, have been direct loans from the agency to the borrower.

"With the addition of guaranteed loans, we can now assist communities that are able to qualify for commercial loans with the support of an FmHA guarantee," Johnson said.

Under this program, FmHA guarantees a loan made by a bank, savings and loan, insurance company, Federal Land Bank or other qualified lender against a certain percentage of loss. Since the mid-1980's, guarantees have become the major component of FmHA's farm loan program, accounting for more than 50 percent of all farm loans.

The 1990 fiscal year appropriations bill authorizes \$74.5 million in guaranteed loans for water and waste disposal loans and \$23.9 million for other community facilities on a national basis. 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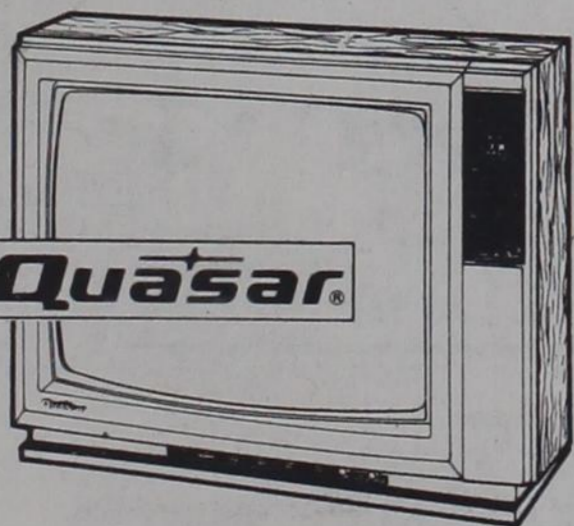
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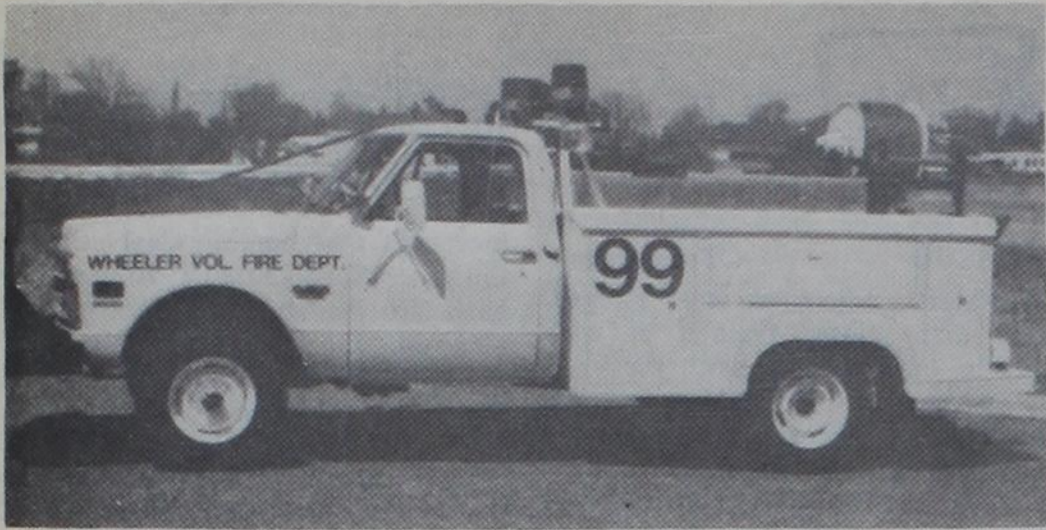


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WHEELER VOL. FIRE DEPT.

Modification of Unit 99

The members of the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department recently finished an "Upgrade and Modification" to Unit 99. This unit is a first responder to all alarms. A 1970 model Chevrolet, Unit 99, has only 16,000 actual miles.

This upgrade was made possible through the efforts of area and local donors and volunteers. Cabot Gas Company donated a used "Tool Box Bed" and Bob McCain donated preparation and painting. A custom aluminum tank was prepared in Amarillo and members of the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department worked approximately 450 manhours for assembly, modification and installation of the various systems.

The total cost for this upgrade is around \$5,000.00, where previous units have cost as much as \$13,000.00 for similar equipment.

Mona Jennings, Ex-Wheeler Golfer, Reaching Potential In Tournaments

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was taken from the June 24, 1990 Amarillo Sunday News-Globe. Written by Sports Writer Trent Tyler).

Mona Jennings put Wheeler High School golf on the map when she became the Mustangs' first top medalist at the state tournament and was named Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame Golfer of the year in 1983.

Mona's dad, Larry, saw his daughter's potential and convinced the superintendent to create a golf program in Wheeler.

"My dad said by the time I was a senior, I would win state," said Jennings, whose hometown squad has carried on the tradition quite well, coming within one stroke of the Texas high school state team title last season.

But after an up-and-down career at Texas Tech where she was ranked as high as 59th in the nation, Jennings was less than enthused.

"My best finish was an eighth place at Lamar and I finished somewhere in the middle of the field at the Southwest Conference tournament," said Jennings, who graduated in December.

Last week, though, at Lubbock's LakeRidge Country Club, Jennings was far from the middle of the field as she won the Women's West Texas Gold Association championship tournament.

"It is most definitely the biggest win of my career," said Jennings, 25,

who was runner-up in 1987.

Jennings won the first three holes and three of the last four to down Lubbock's Marian Barker, 5 and 4, in the championship flight final.

"She (Barker) is a tough competitor and we are pretty good friends," said Jennings, who teamed with Barker to take second place in last year's Amarillo Country Club Partnership.

Does Jennings have her sights set on the pro tour?

"That's kinda like asking a balloon if it would like some air," she said. "I would definitely go if the opportunity came along. That's why I wanted to go somewhere south so I can play year around and keep my game in tune."

"Maybe now that I have a job I can relax and get down to business."

Jennings accepted a teaching and coaching position at Goddard Junior High of Midland on Friday where she will teach health and physical education and coach basketball, volleyball and track. She is scheduled to report to work in early August.

With her recent success, Jennings said it's not hard to be brought back to earth.

"I have a job at the McLean Cattle Co. driving a feed truck," she said. "That cools my jets pretty fast. To get that big win and come back and feed cattle kind of sets me straight. My dad is loving it. At least I'm learning to be an early riser. I still play every day and when I get off that feed truck I'm hitting the ball."
