BI-DISTRICT GAME: Kelton Lady Lions and Chillicothe will be playing their Bi-District Volleyball game at Chillicothe on Thursday, Nov. 1 at 7:00 p.m. Kelton's record is 19-0.

Facing a must win situation and in what has been hostile country in the past, the Wheeler Mustangs continued their undefeated ways in district play last Friday night in Booker as they thoroughly whipped the upstart Kiowas 22-6.

The Kiowas were coming off a big upset of the Shamrock Irish the week before and could have just about wrapped up the 1-1A crown with a victory but the Black Machine quickly dispelled these hopes as they dominated play from the opening kickoff.

Scoring on their first possession of the ball, the Mustangs could have easily put the Kiowas away in the first quarter but a fumble lost at the Booker 7 and a big 15 yard penalty from the Kiowa 6 cost the Mustangs a great chance to be up by three touchdowns after having the ball just three times in the game.

Ike Finsterwald, who later received a season ending knee injury that required surgery Wednesday, got the visiting Mustangs on the scoreboard at 8:13 of the first period when he capped a 40 yard Wheeler drive with a 1 yard run for the touchdown.

A short 12 yard kick gave Wheeler a golden opportunity at the Kiowa 33 right after Finsterwald had scored but the opportunity was squandered at the 7 as Jason Beers lost the handle and Booker recovered.

Once more the Mustangs unrelenting defense slammed the Kiowas offense to the ground and recovered a Booker fumble at the Kiowa 24 but this chance also went by the way, this time with a penalty being the culprit.

CROWN AT STAKE AS WHEELER PLAYS SHAMROCK

What could be better than old arch rivals, the Wheeler Mustangs and the Shamrock Irish, squaring off in the game that will have a lot of bearing on the playoff seeding.



It's real simple for the Mustangs, win Friday night and they will be the District 1-1A top seed no matter what happens in the season's final games next week. A loss complicates things somewhat for the Mustangs as a three way tie would possibly be in the offing for the championship and a UIL scoring formula would be used to determine the district's playoff teams.

A district championship has eluded the Mustangs the last two years but this can be erased with a win over the Irish. A victory would also salve the Mustangs feelings from last year when the Irish came from behind and

nipped the Mustangs to break the Mustangs strangle hold over the Irish in the win column.

Friday night's battle in Shamrock will be the first time in years that the two old foes will be playing each other in district play and it promises to be a head knocker from the opening kickoff.

The Booker Kiowas upset the Irish two weeks ago and the Mustangs win at Booker last week left the Mustangs in sole possession of first place in the standings with a 3-0 record and Shamrock and Booker are tied for second with identical 2-1 marks. A win by Wheeler would put the Irish out of the running for the championship.

"We've thought all year that this game would go a long way as to determining our district's champion and sure enough, it is," coach Ronnie Karcher said this week and he added

Staying on the ground, the Mustangs powered their way to the Kiowa 15 from where they went to the airways for their 1st completion of the game and it was a 14 yarder to the Booker 1 to Chick from Beers. The Mustangs were fined 5 back to the 6 and then Mark Marshall got a couple to the 4 before Beers got the six pointer on a 4 yard keeper. With 3:55 to play in the third quarter, Altamirino kicked the Mustangs into a 16-0 lead. The drive consumed more than five minutes of the clock.

Less than ten minutes remained in the game when the Mustangs ate up nearly six minutes by their final touchdown drive that covered 40 yards following another weak Kiowa kick.

Wheeler pounded the Kiowas on the ground to the 3 for a first and goal. Here the Booker defense stiffened for a couple of plays as they pushed the Mustangs back to the 10 but on third down, Beers threw complete to Chick for the touchdown and the Black Machine could start looking forward to the showdown with rival Shamrock.

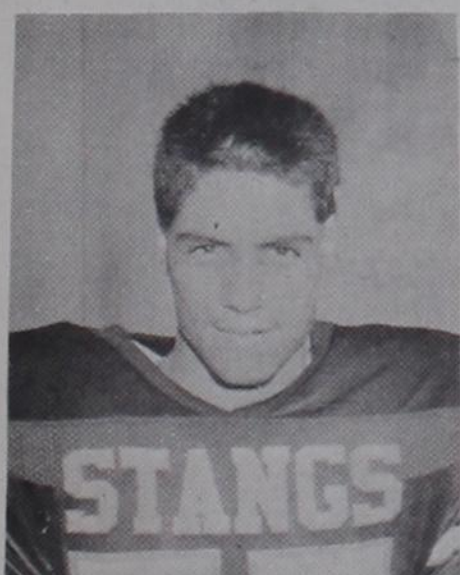

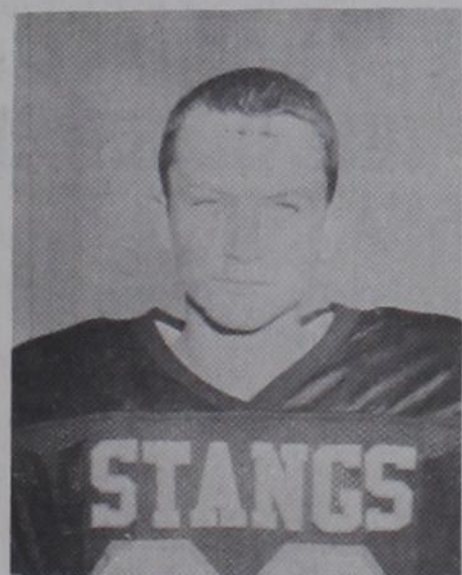

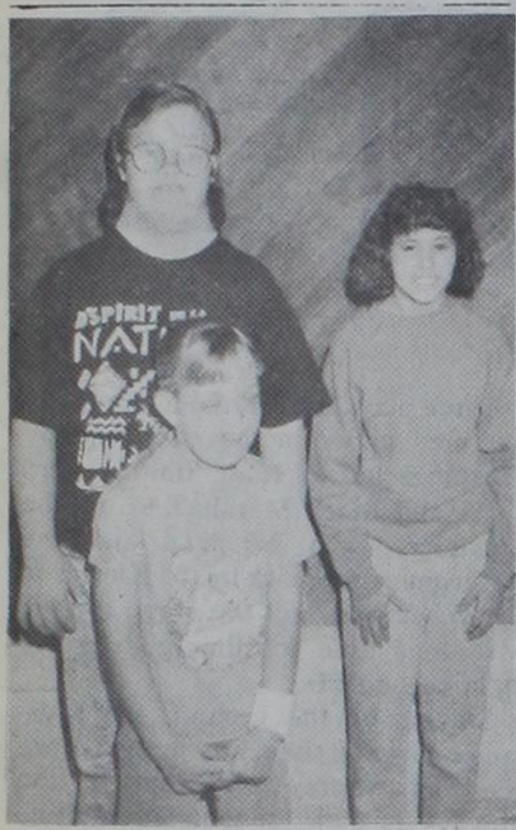
