Cross Country Team Enters Dumas Meet

The Wheeler girls cross country team traveled to Dumas last week to compete in the Cow Patty Classic Cross Country Meet. All classifications, 1A-5A, ran together in the Dumas meet. The varsity girls division had 150 contestants from 26 teams.

The Wheeler girls made a strong showing finishing 10th overall. They defeated several strong teams from larger classifications. After falling shortly after the start of the race, Rochelle Rives recovered to place 13th in 13:05. This was the fastest time recorded by any class IA contestant. Melissa Chapman and Amanda Rives ran a very competitive race, passing several other contestants in the last part of the race. Melissa and Amanda finished 58th and 59th with both finishing in 14:41. Nissa Boedeker ran her strongest race of the year placing 78th in 15:04. Nissa showed a lot of competitiveness at the end of the race by outrunning several other contestants to the finish line. Liz Lovell also ran her best race of the year placing 110th in 16:16. Liz also had a strong finish.

The girls will be open this week and travel to Spearman on October 19th for their last warm up before the district meet.

Wheeler High School Six Weeks Report

Wheeler High School ended the 1st six weeks on Sept. 27th and reports 48 students on honor rolls. Eight (8) students received "A's" in all subjects and 40 student recieved "A's" and "B's" in all subject areas. Mr. Clayton Neal, Wheeler High School Principal, stated "We are very proud of all these students, but especially proud of the all "A" Students. A tremendous amount of time and effort is required to achieve an all "A" report card."

The Wheeler Mustang Football team has eleven (11) members on the A and B roll. The team posted an overall average of 89.

"The stereotype of the big, dumb football player no longer holds true in the modern game of football" says, Ronnie Karcher, Wheeler Athletic Director and Head Football Coach. "The game requires that you not only use physical strength but you must be able to think. Physical and mental ability go hand in hand. The Wheeler Mustangs flexed their muscle again Friday night as they hammered the Vega Longhorns 69-6. The states 3rd ranked team dominated the weaker Longhorns and extended their winning streak to five wins with no losses.

The only casualty of Friday nights game was the Mustangs streak of three straight shut-outs.

Vega scored on a kick-off return for a touchdown, but the Black Death defense managed to keep its streak of 17 straight quarters without giving up a point.

The Longhorns found out early that they were in for a rough night. On their first possession, the Longhorns lost 3 yards in three plays. Brandon Chick and Joe Dan Ledbetter each dropped Vega runners for losses and the Longhorns were forced to punt.

Playing without the services of full-back Mack Marshall, who was resting a sprained ankle, the Black Machine offense went to work.

Four plays and 39 yards later the Mustangs were on the scoreboard as Nathan Willeford scored on a five yard T.D. run. The Ike Finsterwald kick was wide and Wheeler led 6-0.

Vega started their next possession at their own 26 yard line. After a yard loss and a 5 yard penalty. Linebacker Brandon Chick picked off a Codi Cleavinger pass and the Mustangs were in business at the Vega 9yd line.

Quarterback Jason Beers found Chick alone in the end zone on first and goal from the 9 yd line. The Finsterwald kick was good. Wheeler had jumped on top 13-0 with 7:31 remaining in the 1st quarter.

Genero Meraz kicked off to Vega's Jason Henderson who coughed up the ball at the Vega 29 yd. line.

A five yard penalty and a three yard run by Willeford left the Mustangs with 3rd and long at the Vega 31 yd. line.

Quarterback Jason Beers took the ball on a keeper around right end for 31 yards and paydirt. Finsterwald added the P.A.T. and Wheeler led 20-0, still in the 1st quarter.

Genera Meraz kicked the ball into the end zone for a touchdown. The Longhorns ran into the brick wall of Mustang defenders and were forced to punt again.

Wheeler took over at the Vega 40 yd. line, but Vega was able to stop the Mustangs. When QB Jason Beers was sacked on 4th down.

Vega took over at their own 44. Isidro Salas and Joe Dan Ledbetter dropped Henderson for a 1 yard loss. After an incomplete pass and another 4 yd. loss, Vega was forced to punt.

Wheeler started from their own 31 yd. line. Behind guard Jimmy Winters block, Ledbetter rambled 22 yds. for a 1st down at the Vega 43. A five yard penalty moved the ball back to the 48. A clipping penalty and a holding penalty move the Mustangs back to their own 39.

Quarterback Jason Beers hit Chick on a 20 yard pass play over the middle. On third down Nathan Willeford ran fourteen yards for a 1st down at the

Beers faded back to pass and found Ledbetter for a 36 yard pass down to the 1 yard line. Mark Marshall took it in from there and Finsterwalds kick was good. Wheeler led 27 Vega 0.

Vega went to the air their next possession but was unsuccessful.

Brandon Chick returned the Vega punt 32 yards to the Vega 47 yard line.

The Mustangs only managed 5 yards in three plays. With 4th and 5 yards to go. Beers found Ike Finsterwald for 9 yards over the middle for a 1st down.

Mark Marshall run for a 4, 12 and 7 yards down to the Vega 10 yard line.

Beers got the call and ran the ball in the end zone, but the score was nullified because of clipping.

On second and long from the 24 Beers connected with Mark Marshall for the 24 yd. T.D. pass. Finsterwalds kick was true. Wheeler as 34, Vega 0.

Vega took the ensuing kick-off out to their own 25 yard line. But Ike Finsterwald, Genera Meraz, and Chad Harrison combined to sack the Vega QB and force a punt.

Brandon Chick had another good punt return called back by a clip and the Mustangs took over from their own 29 yd. line.

On the first play from scrimmage Senior Nathan Willeford said "adios" and raced 71 yards for the T.D. The kick was good and Wheeler led 41-0.

Vega's Shannon Tanck took the Mustangs kick-off back 80 yards for a Vega T.D. The 2 point conversion run was no-good and the score was Wheeler 41 Vega 6.

to protect the environment and ground water.

Prior to the dumping of any trash in a land fill, the land must be prepared. The pit must be dug, 3' of clay must be compacted to line the pit or plastic may be used as a liner. The trash must be kept covered with a thick layer of dirt and the area must be monitored for development of any gas, runoff of pollution of ground water.

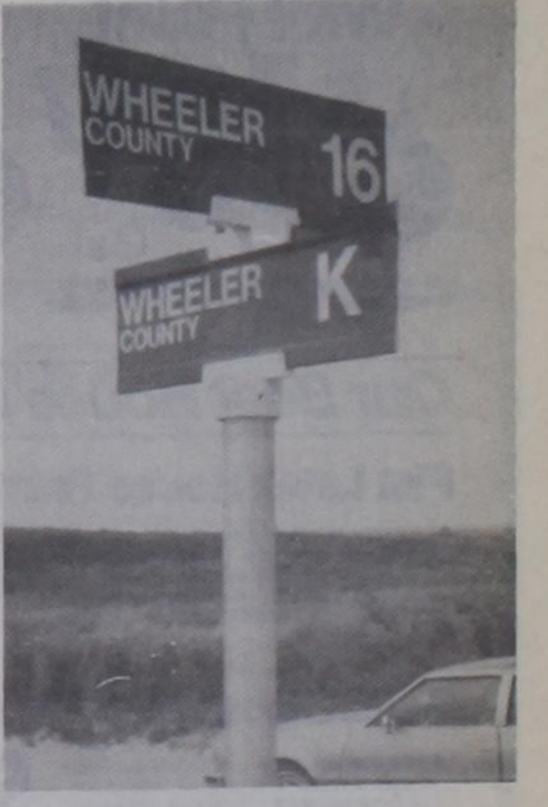
The monitoring of ground water alone would require the drilling of a minimum of four wells.

To operate our own land fill, it was estimated by Lane that the cost would be in the neighborhood of \$50 per household.

Wheeler's trash will be taken to Pampa, a regional land fill, along with that of several other area communities.

The council is still in the process of working out the answer to the situation. The dumpsters will remain and the trash will be picked up as has been done for the past several years. A "Roll Off" will be placed at the city

Fire Prevention Week is October 6-12

"Fire Won't Wait-Plan Your Escape"

*Fire kills every 100 minutes. More than 5,000 civilians died in fires in 1990. Nearly 80% of all civilian fire deaths occur in home fires. Smoking materials are the number one cause of home fire fatalities.

*Having a smoke detector in your home cuts your risk of dying in a home fire in half.

*Automatic sprinklers save lives. NFPA has no record of a fire killing more than two people in a completely sprinklered public assembly, educational, institutional, or residential building where the system was properly operating.

*Preschool children (age 5 or under) have a fire death rate more than twice the national average.

*Older adults also have the highest fire death rates in U.S. home fires - twice the national average for those age 65 and older; three times the national average for those 75 and older; and four times the national average for those 85 and older.

*Fire causes injury every 18 minutes. Cooking equipment is the number one cause of home fire injuries.

*A fire is reported to fire departments in the U.S. every 16 seconds. Heating equipment is the number one cause of home fires.

*Households can expect to average two fires serious enough to alert the fire department in an average person's lifetime, if you include fires at home, work, or play, on the road, or outdoors.

*Most home fires (nearly two-thirds) begin in kitchens, chimneys, bedrooms, or living room.

*The peak period for home fires is 6:00 - 7:00 p.m.; the peak period for home fire deaths is 2:00 - 3:00 a.m. Both home fires and home fire deaths peak in the cold weather months.

Would you know how to escape if a fire started at school? At Work? While on vacation?

No matter where you are, take a few moments to look around you and plan how you would get out if a fire started.

For example, if you're in an unfamiliar building, locate the exit doors nearest you and make sure your exit

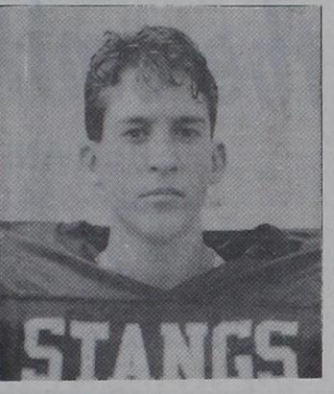

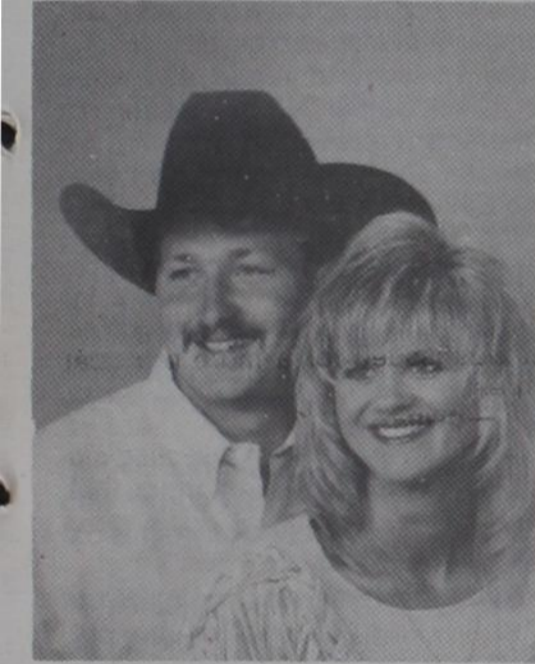
When the "rehearsal dinner" concluded, the bride and groom, following tradition, were not allowed to see each other after midnight.

Fire Prevention Week October 6-12

County Judge Wendell Morgan has proclaimed the week of October 6-12, 1991 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Wheeler County.

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the county are working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

Fire Prevention Week is always the Sunday-through-Saturday period in which falls October 9, date of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings.

In his proclamation, Judge Morgan has called upon the citizens of Wheeler County to participate in Fire Prevention Week activities such as locating and eliminating fire hazards; checking smoke detectors and developing a home escape plan; as the 1991 theme suggests....."FIRE WON'T WAIT...PLAN YOUR ESCAPE!"

Paul Macina, President of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau said, "Fire is both friend and foe. We can't live without it, but its destructive power is a threat we must control."

Protect yourself by keeping fire a friend:

- *Regularly inspect your house and out-buildings for fire hazards. Check the electrical system, electrical appliances and equipment, fuel storage, heaters and heating system. Make needed repairs or replacements without delay. Don't overload circuits or bypass fusing.
- *Remove trash, stacks of papers and other unneeded combustibles that could feed a fire.
- *Read and follow instructions with portable heaters. Place them where they won't ignite combustibles or be tipped over. Never use gasoline in a kerosene heater, and make certain gasoline and kerosene containers are clearly marked to avoid a mix-up.

Never use a kerosene or gas-fired heater in a closed area—have ample ventilation.

- *Check your heating system prior to the heating season. Install and use wood-burning stoves as directed in the manuals or other literature. Screen fireplaces. Keep chimneys and flues free of obstructions and creosote buildup.
- *Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach.
- *Don't smoke in bed nor when drowsy. Don't smoke when using flammable materials nor in places that

have readily combustible materials such as hay, straw, dry weeds, grain dust, etc. Store flammable liquids in well-marked, closed containers. Make sure your cigarette or match is "out" before discarding.

- *Install approved lightning protection systems on main buildings. Inspect them annually to make sure they are properly grounded.
- *Be prepared for fire should it strike. Have operating smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. Develop and practice a home fire escape plan. Teach children how to call for help. Have a

water supply available to fight fire. Choose and regularly inspect fire extinguishers that are the right size

and type for the fires that might occur. *Consider installing a sprinkler system in all new construction.

E.L. and Wilma Fowler recently attended the National POW convention at Tulsa. E.L. didn't find any of his old buddies.

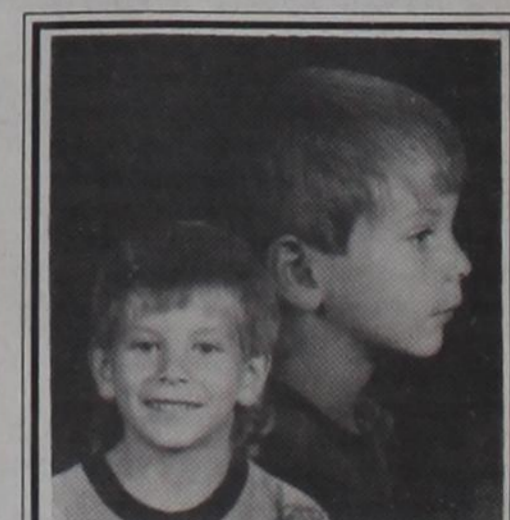

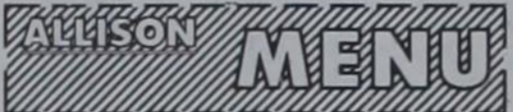

TAB Releases Report On Texas Schools

Texas Association of Business (TAB) has released a comprehensive report on Texas public schools which includes six recommendations for improving the quality of public education.

The recommendations are:
1. Increase instruction time through year-round school schedules and longer school terms;

2. Modify current testing procedures to identify learning disabilities which contribute to poor academic performance;

3. Increase local control of schools within established standards;

4. Increase parental and community involvement;

5. Increase quality of instruction and accountability of teachers through testing and incentives;

6. Restore legislative authority for establishing public education policy.

Titled *Promised for Tomorrow*, the report was developed by the TAB Education Committee from information obtained through a series of public forums and research spanning more than one year.

Roger Minard, president of Austin Semiconductor and chairman of the TAB Education Committee, said the report is intended to emphasize the complex nature of public education and the need for consistent, long-term commitment from the public in order to enhance the quality of public schools.

"Any successful effort in improving the quality of Texas public schools must involve business and community leaders, as well as parents and educators," Minard declared. "And it must also be a sustained commitment since quality can only be achieved over time," he added.

TAB State Chairman Paul Kerr, president of American Desk Manufacturing Company in Temple, called the report a significant effort, and that combined with other ongoing initiatives it can change the face of public education in Texas.

"Involvement of educators, along with parents, business and community leaders in the development of this report is an example of the strong interest at all levels in providing the opportunity for a quality education for all Texas public school students," Kerr explained.

He pledged the continued cooperation and support of TAB members in working with other business and education leaders to achieve this goal.

office for the dumping of larger trash items; the roll-off truck is to be delivered today, Oct. 10. Groom has been using a roll-off truck for the past 2 years.

Increased cost to the city for the trash is estimated to be \$3,000 per month; this is figured on the present four loads of trash per week. If the amount of trash can be brought down through recycling, the cost to the city will be reduced. The present cost to the city per month for trash is \$9,000.

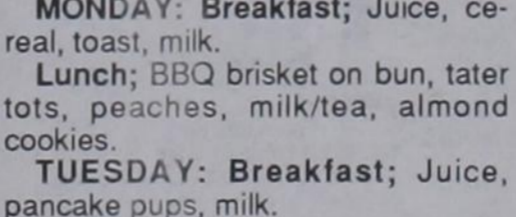
Most likely the future will involve the separation of trash for recycling. This is being done across the nation with success. Bins will be placed at the city office for the placing of plastics, No. 1—Milk Bottles & 2—Clorox Bleach (the numbers are on the bottles), tin cans (one end removed and rinsed), and possibly appliances.

City residents can expect a city ordinance prohibiting the dumping of grass clippings into the dumpsters. The clippings will have to be recycled.

The rural residents can contact the city and pay a monthly fee to dump their trash; this is presently being done by some of our rural citizens. Individuals in the country can dump their trash on their property, but cannot allow anyone else to use the area.

Individuals caught dumping their trash illegally will be prosecuted. These illegal dumps are being spotted through aerial surveillance; Lane flies the plane.

The council will keep the citizens informed as additional information becomes available.

Ambulance Service To Offer E.C.A. Course

The Wheeler County Ambulance Service of Shamrock and Wheeler are looking people to take an (E.C.A.) Emergency Care Attendant Course to be held this fall or winter.

"This course is a good one for anyone to take. Even someone who does not plan to be an Ambulance Volunteer, such as mothers and fathers of children, business people who might need the training with customers or employees and many others working around people who might need help at any time," said George Hooten of the South Wheeler County Ambulance Service.

The course will teach people how to save lives and is open to anyone who meets state requirements, male or female.

"Our volunteers perform a valuable service for the community. This fact was brought home to all of us recently when an out of town paid personnel type service was needed to make a couple of trips from our hospital to Amarillo and provide a higher level of care required to transport those patients and the costs were in the neighborhood of \$1,000.00 each for a

trip we normally make for less than a fourth of that cost," said Hooten.

Hooten stated that local calls are approximately \$50.00 and said that if people didn't think that cost was a bargain they needed to check with some of the larger towns in our area with paid services.

"We plan to start planning our dates and times as soon as we can line up about 20 people to take the course," said Hooten.

The class will be approximately a 50 clock hour course, possible held 2 nights a week at 4 hours per night, until completed in about 6 weeks.

The cost will be approximately \$110.00 for books and tuition payable at the start of the class. These costs will be refunded for the ones who become Ambulance Service Volunteers.

The course will be taught by Marshal Peters of Wellington and Mary K. Christner of Wheeler.

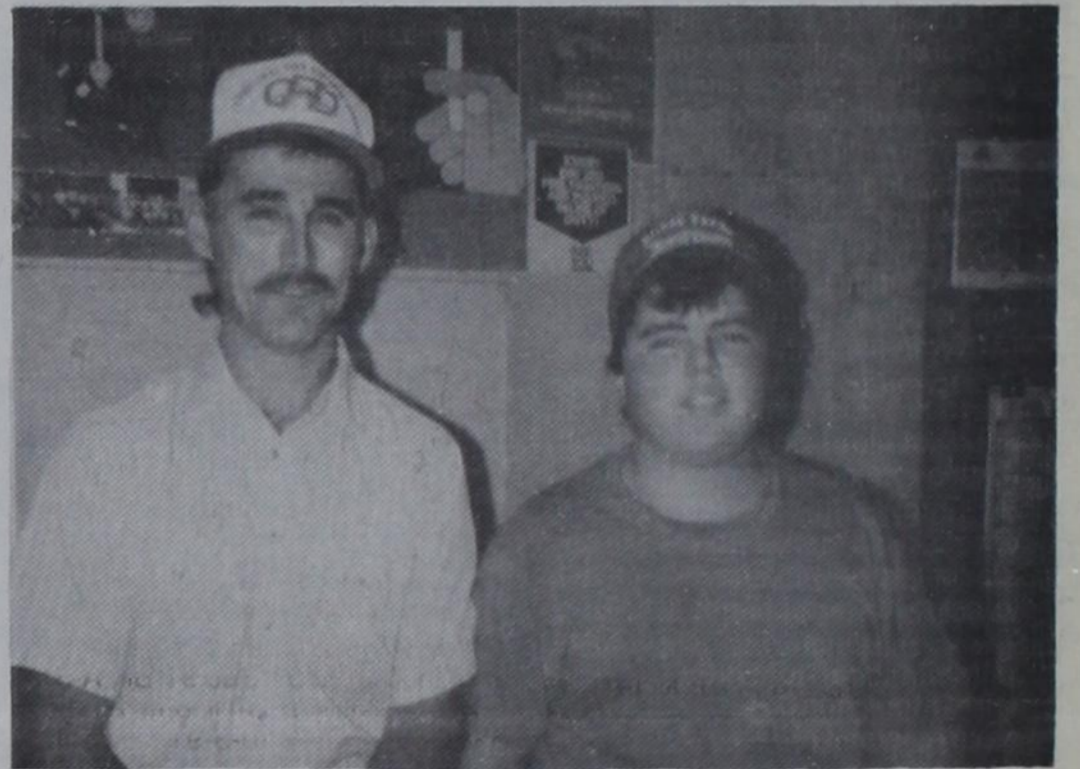

From The Minister's Desk:

One of the first heresies to confront the first century church was perpetrated by some false teachers who were known as the Gnostics. These false teachers did not openly challenge the inspired teaching of the apostles. Rather they simply claimed that they had privately received additional knowledge from God which superseded the inspired teaching of the apostles.

In my opinion, this same heresy is confronting the twentieth century church. The perpetrators of this heresy are not the Gnostics, but some televangelists. For example, I recently heard one of these televangelists preach a sermon that urged people to "stay with the Word". Then at the conclusion of his sermon, he announced that he had received from God a—"word of knowledge"—informing him that he was to evangelize South America through his television ministry. Following this announcement, this televangelist tearfully pleaded for financial contributions for this television ministry so he could obey this divine mandate.

If I could respond to this televangelist, I would politely suggest that he practice what he had preached in his sermon. I would suggest that he "stay with the Word." And if he would, he would learn two important Biblical truths. These two

truths are:—

1. The—"word of knowledge—" was one of the spiritual gifts that was given to some Christians in the first century. (I Corinthians 12: 4-11) Like the other spiritual gifts, this gift was given to these Christians by the apostles. (Acts 19: 1-7). And its purpose was to instruct and to edify the first century church.

2. The—"word of knowledge—" has ceased. When the will of God was completely revealed by the inspired writings of the Biblical writers, this gift ceased. With the written Bible, this gift was no longer needed. The Apostle Paul clearly emphasized the sufficiency of the written Bible when he wrote: "All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work." (II Timothy 3: 16-17)

The only standard for the faith and the practice of the church is the Word. For this reason, the church should "stay with the Word", rejecting any preacher who claims to have received knowledge that supersedes the inspired teaching of the Bible.

I, Wendell Morgan, County Judge of Wheeler County, do hereby declare the week of October 6-12, 1991 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Wheeler County for the following reasons.

WHEREAS, FIRE PREVENTION WEEK was inspired by one of the worst fires in the history of our nation: The Great Chicago Fire of 1871. On October 9th of that year, 250 people died and 17,430 buildings were destroyed. In 1911 the Fire Marshalls Association fire designed the anniversary of this tragedy Fire Prevention Day, dedicated to encouraging fire safety. In 1922, President Warren G. Harding proclaimed National Fire Prevention Week. Since then, the National Fire Protection Association has been the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week, leading the nation to practice life-saving fire safety; and

WHEREAS, each year, roughly 5,000 Americans die in home fires.

And four fifths of those people died in their own houses or apartments. During Fire Prevention Week, the NFPA is spotlighting the causes of these tragic home fire deaths and the simple steps you can take to protect yourself and your family.

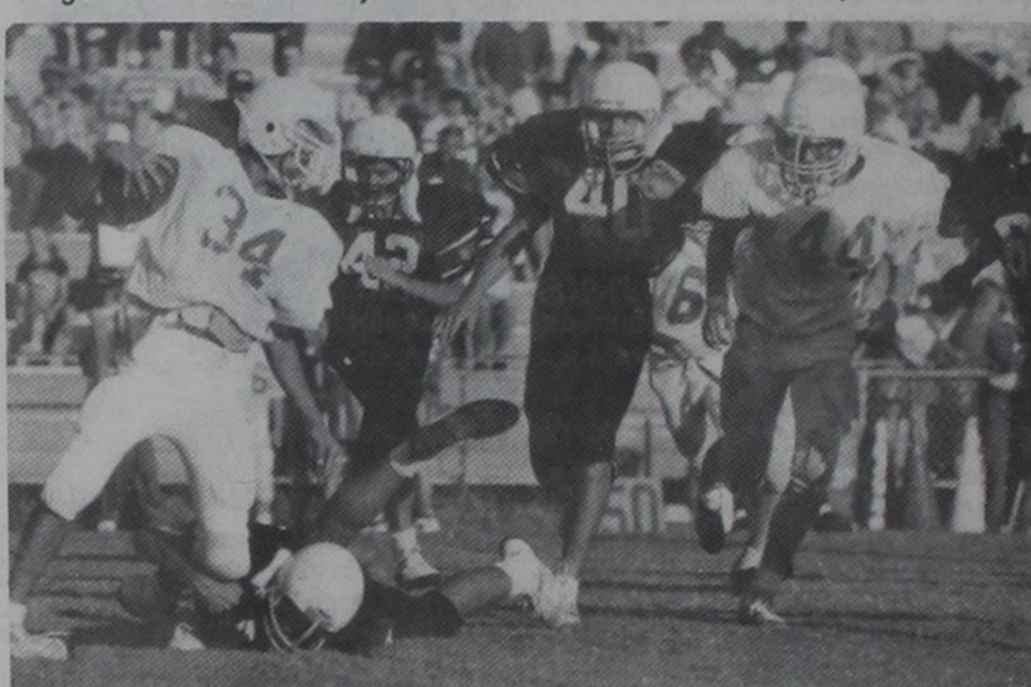

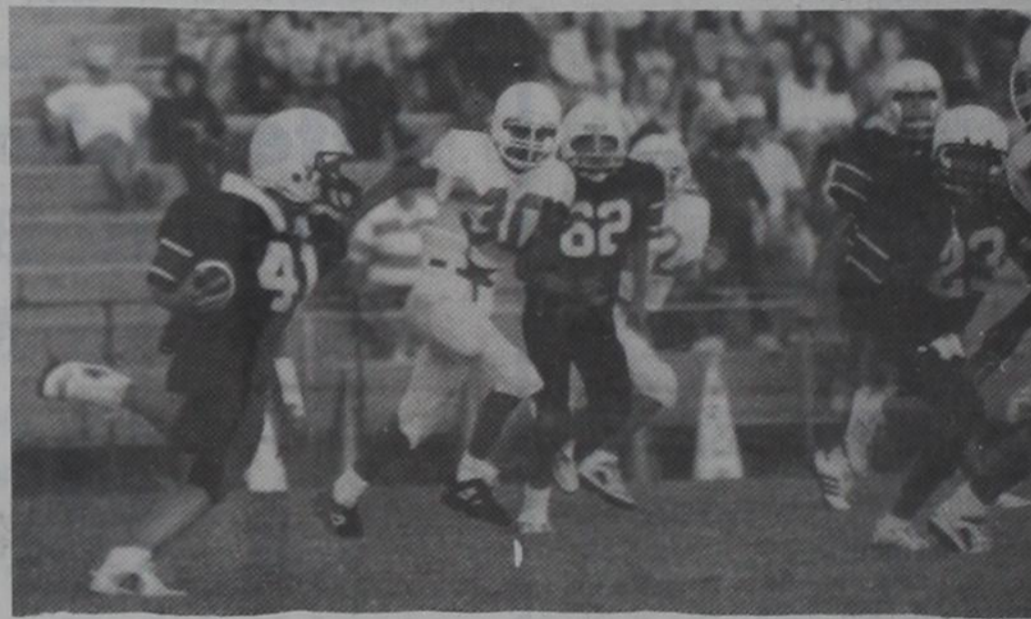

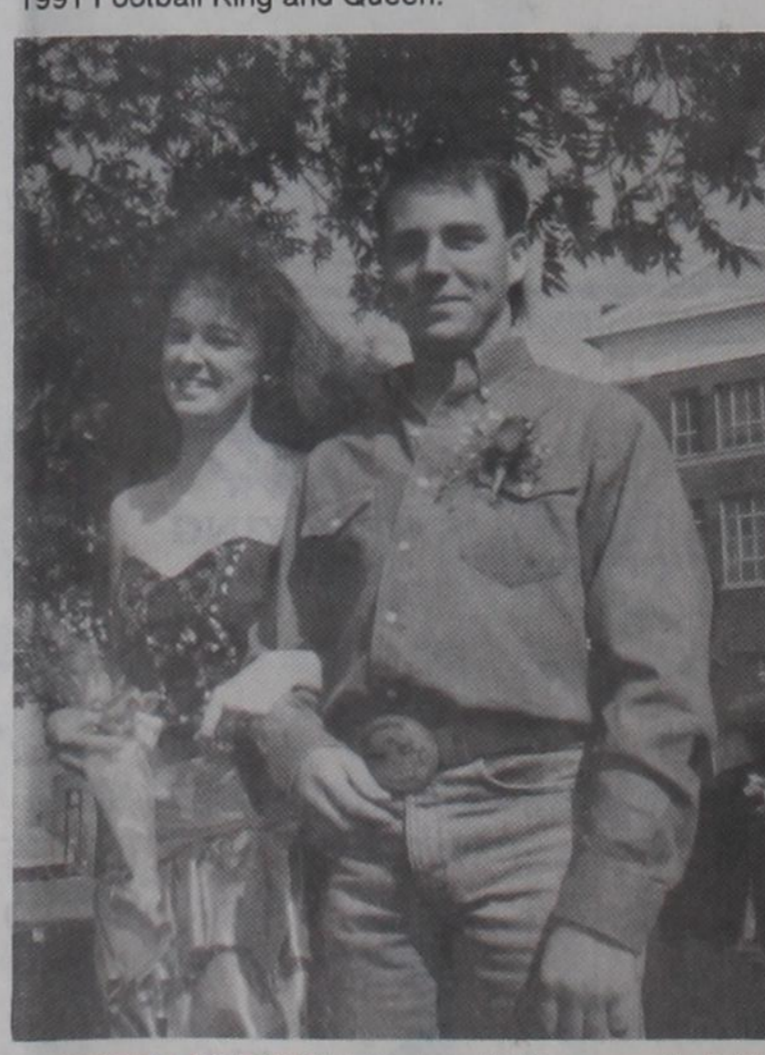
