The history of this store goes back to 1939, when Mrs. Linda Clay, her daughter and son-in-law, Lottie Eva and Cecil Denson, opened a grocery store on the south side of the square in Wheeler. The store was named Clay Food Store. A few years later the store was moved across the street to the corner on the west side of Main Street. Several years later a new store building was constructed at the corner of West Texas and Canadian Streets. There the Densons operated the store successfully until 1971, when they sold to Cliff Prichard. Cliff and his brother, Jerry, operated the store for six years as Prichard's Thriftway. ### A Reminder For CRP Producers

CRP participants who are scheduled to replant their grass this spring, will need to plant grass now. Many of the CRP participants are concerned about the rain aspect. The rain so far has been a system to the Wheeler County area. We are giving the CRP participants the go ahead to plant grass with or without a rain. According to rules and regulation the CRP grass which is set up to be replanted this spring, will need to be planted if cost-share is involved. The weather condition is a big concern with us also. Planting grass takes a lot of luck, a lot of patience and a lot of rain.

There are about 110 CRP contracts set-up to be re-done this spring. The actual numbers of CRP contracts that has been seeded to this point are ten contracts. This number is really alarming to us. The reason is their are still a lot of CRP contracts to be seeded, in short length of time to do it in. The deadline to seed your grass will be June 1. Many of the producers are going to have a difficult time in locating seed and custom seeder. It would be to the CRP producers advantage to arrange time to get their seed located as quick as possible. The deadline to plant your grass grows very near. Deadline to sow grass is June 1!



**From The Minister's Desk:**

In 1829, a man, who was named George Wilson, was convicted in Pennsylvania of murder and was sentenced to death by hanging. Yet when President Andrew Jackson reviewed the case, he granted a Presidential pardon to Wilson. But the pardon was refused by Wilson.

Confusion then reigned in the courts. What could be done with a man who was under a sentence of death, but who refused to accept a pardon? The case was finally reviewed by the Supreme Court and Chief Justice John Marshall ruled:

"A pardon is a paper, the value of which depends upon its acceptance by the parties implicated. It is hardly to be supposed that one under the sentence of death would refuse to accept a pardon. But if it is refused, it is no pardon. George Wilson must hang."

And shortly after this decision by the Supreme Court, George Wilson was hung. He did not have to die, but George Wilson refused the pardon that was offered to him.

This story reminds me of the people who refuse to accept the pardon of their sins. Jesus Christ came into the world to pardon the sins of mankind, giving His life upon the cross of Calvary.

The Hebrew writer emphasized this pardon when he wrote: "For the law, since it has only a shadow of the good things to come and not the very form of things, can never by the same sacrifices year by year, which they offer continually, make perfect those who draw near. Otherwise, would they not have ceased to be offered, because the worshippers, having once been cleansed, would no longer have had consciousness of sins?" (Hebrews 10:1-2)

And then he added: "—He takes away the first in order to establish the second. By this will, we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all. And every priest stands daily ministering and offering time after time the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins; but He, having offered one sacrifice for sins for all time, sat down at the right hand of God—" (Hebrews 10:9-12)

When Jesus died on the cross, the New Testament says that the "—veil of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom—" suggesting that "—whoever will—" can receive the forgiveness of their sins. There is no longer any need for the yearly offering of the blood of animals by the priests because Jesus made provision for our sins by the sacrifice of Himself. (I Peter 2:24)

Yet there are many people who are making a mistake like George Wilson. These people are not guilty of murder, but they are guilty of sin. And they are rejecting the pardon of sin which is provided by the death of Jesus.

Remember that Chief Justice Marshall said that the value of a pardon "—depends upon its acceptance by the parties implicated. It is hardly to be supposed that one under sentence of death would refuse to accept a pardon. But if it is refused, it is no pardon." 



## Lifeline Program

The Emergency Response System/Lifeline program of Northwest Texas Hospital is a personal emergency response system which allows the elderly, handicapped and convalescing patient to live independently in their own homes and yet have the capability of seeking help with the push of a button. ERS involves the use of electronic equipment, a 24-hour monitoring system by trained medical staff, and community based volunteers who act as responders when an emergency occurs.

Each lifeline subscriber has a Lifeline Home Communicator at home and a Personal Help Button worn around his or her neck or wrist. At the first sign of trouble, the subscriber can push the Personal Help Button. An electronic message is sent via telephone to the Lifeline Emergency Response Center where trained personnel arrange for help. Lifeline has the ability to aid even an unconscious subscriber through a timing mechanism which can activate an electronic message.

At the Lifeline Emergency Response Center, the subscriber's information file lists his or her name, address, telephone number, medical conditions and name of person (called Responders) who are to be notified in an emergency. The subscriber selects the Responders, usually family, friends, or neighbors. Community service providers, such as police, fire, ambulance, and visiting nurses, may also be contacted.

The Communication Technicians (Monitor) on duty at the Emergency Response Center immediately calls the subscriber once an emergency signal is received. If the subscriber answers the telephone, the monitor evaluates what help may be needed based on established emergency protocol. If the subscriber is unable to respond, the monitor contacts a Responder who can reach the home quickly and be able to advise on the subscriber's condition.

The objectives of the non-profit program, sponsored by Northwest Texas Hospital, includes providing emergency assistance as quickly as possible, and reduction in long-term care costs for the elderly and handicapped.

The equipment for the ERS program is purchased from Lifeline Systems, Inc., Boston, Massachusetts. Lifelong programs now exist in over 2,000 locations in the U.S. and there are over 150 Lifeline programs in Texas.

The Northwest Texas Hospital ERS/Lifeline program began in March, 1981, as a regional program for the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle. Currently there are nearly 650 units located in 42 locations in the Texas Panhandle. The first satellite program with Boise City, Oklahoma, was begun June, 1990.

Lifeline is available on a private basis for \$25 per month plus a one time initiation fee of \$25. Lifeline is also available free for persons who qualify through the Texas Department of Human Services. Individuals wanting to know more about the program, should call 806/353-4022.

Mr. Teague will be guest speaker Sun., April 28, 11:00 A.M. at the Briscoe Assembly of God, Briscoe, TX, the Reverend B.A. Hyatt, pastor, has announced.

Mr. Teague and his wife, Jerlene, worked in Ivory Coast from 1972, following a year in Lausanne, Switzerland, where they studied the French language, until 1985 when they were transferred to Lome, Togo, to lead the regional leadership training program. They have been involved in evangelistic ministry, the establishing of new churches and founded the Bible Institute for training national leaders in Ivory Coast. Mr. Teague was Chairman of the Board of Governors of the West Africa Advanced School of Theology in Lome, Togo, from 1976 to 1982, and served as the Chairman of the Accrediting Council for the Bible schools and institutes of West and Central Africa. He was also the superintendent of the Western and Central District of the Assemblies of God in Ivory Coast from 1976 to 1980.

About their work in West and Central Africa, Mr. Teague says, "With the presence of more than 6,000 independent church movements in Africa where evangelism was carried out without follow-up in Bible teaching and leadership training, and with the realization that many of these movements are now a syncretistic mixture of witchcraft and Christianity. We must make every effort to establish the leaders in the truths of the Word in this time of phenomenal church growth."

Prior to missionary appointment the Teagues pastored in Haldton, Oklahoma and also traveled in evangelistic ministry in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Mr. Teague holds a B.S. degree from Southwest A/G College in Waxahachie, Texas, the M.A. degree in Biblical Studies from the Assemblies of God Graduate School and the M. Div. degree from the Assemblies of God Theological Seminary. He has also studied at the Brite Divinity School of Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth, Texas, and the Phillips University Graduate School in Enid, Oklahoma. He is a graduate of Lumania College in French studies in Lausanne, Switzerland.

On returning to Africa, the Teagues' primary work will be the directing of the West Africa Advanced School of Theology in Lome, Togo, where Mr. Teague will continue to serve as president and teacher. This includes training programs on extension campuses in Zaire, Burkina Faso and Ghana. The school also plans to develop a new department for the training of African national evangelists and missionaries.

Pastor Hyatt invites the public to attend this special missions service.

We are getting private telephone lines all over this country, sure is quicker for one thing, I just dialed Wheeler hospital a lady said Wheeler hospital I was expecting her to say your number. Ha

Don't know what happened to my news last week, I had a blood clot in my right wrist, and turpentine all over.

I would not like to live those 1930 days over they say in the good old days. I would not like to live Dad and mothers days or grandad and grandmothers days over. I don't care for antiques, ha Have had enough of them guess, still have to many antiques.
