U.I.L. contests for concert bands are actually two separate events. The band is first required to perform three selections of required music. The second event is Sight Reading competition in which the band is required to perform music that has not been previously performed by any band member. In concert competition the band earned

three ratings of EXCELLENT. In Sight-Reading the band earned SUPERIOR ratings from each judge. The SUPERIOR ratings also earned the band a U.I.L. plaque.

Texas A&M To Get George Bush Library

President George Bush announced last Friday that he had chosen Texas A&M University as the site for the George Bush Library and Museum.

Texas A&M was awarded the site after a long two year campaign despite efforts of the University of Houston and Rice University to have the library and museum located in Houston, President Bush's adopted home.

"We at Texas A&M are ecstatic over President Bush's selection of Texas A&M University. It is one of the greatest things to happen to our university and will bring untold prestige of Texas A&M", Ross Margraves, chairman of the Texas A&M Board of Regents, said after receiving President Bush's phone call from aboard Air Force One on Friday.

The library and museum will be located in Research Park on the A&M campus. It is the second presidential facility to be built in Texas. The Lyndon Johnson Library is in Austin on the University of Texas campus.

It is estimated that the cost of the facility will range in the neighborhood of 75 million dollars with funds to be raised from the private sector. Chairman Margraves said that no construction can be started until all funding is complete and anticipates that the necessary funds can be raised over a period of three years.

Texas A&M is now in the beginning of a 500 million dollar capital campaign and Mr. Margraves said that each of these fund raising campaigns should compliment one another.

Baptist Children's Choir To Present Musical

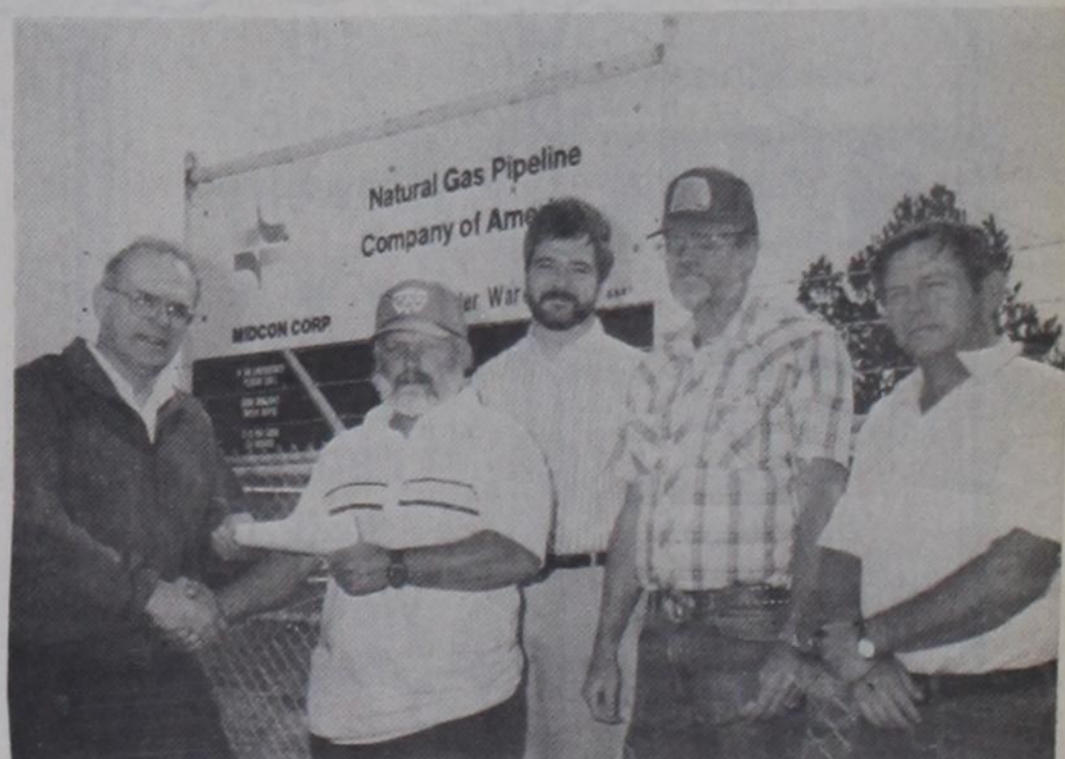

Ain't It The Truth

About eighteen years ago our family lived in Lincoln Co., NM and I was working for a subsidiary of Kinicott Copper Co. Mama was working for the Bureau of Indian Affairs and our son was in school there in Ruidoso and worked on the weekends for a friend in a Service Station. My work carried me way out in the boondocks where there were few roads and many faint trails which we had to traverse back and forth in our employment. A lot of the so to speak roads could be of our family was visiting us we would take them back in the woods and up these roads that I traveled every day.

Onetime one of the daughters from the Panhandle of Texas was visiting and wanted to see where I worked. We packed a lunch and all of the kids got in the back of the pickup and Mama rode up front with me. We had started up one of the trails and at one point I had to back up so I could make the turn. Some months before I had placed a large rock at the edge of the cliff so I wouldn't back too far. I called back to the daughter and said "Sister don't let me go back too far". She looked behind the truck and it was about 500 ft. straight down. Sister screamed so loud it's a wonder if all the varmints didn't leave the forest. I had to continue all the way to the top of the road with no place to turn around. We had Sister in between us still about to faint and believe you me, I was happy to get back down off the treacherous road er trail. I think she was glad to get back to the Texas Panhandle where it wuz safe. The next week I traveled those treacherous roads and enjoyed seeing all the game that had returned after the horrible screams they had encountered a few days before.

I loved those rugged mountains and all the scenery that abounds there and the game of all kinds. There was bear, deer, lions, bobcats and the rest of the little mountain critters that lived there. We had a few elk that would venture off the reservation we could see but not often. Sometimes when I started up the mountain I would stop at certain places and let the turkey cross the trail in front of me. They had gotten used to me and acted like it was a street crossing with them having all the privileges.

I have seen bobcats hiding behind a small twigg just like he was in a camouflaged suit. He would lay there and feel completely safe and honestly he was. I only carried a gun as the matter of course, not to destroy the game.

One time our son Terry was with me and we were gettin back into civilization and just ahead very near the paved road a group of pilgrims, as we called them, were taking pictures of a mother bear and were getting so close to her she had begun her little dance sort of saying you Pilgrims better shove off. I asked Terry to get out and scare the bear away before someone got seriously hurt. These visitors were very unhappy not realizing the mama bear could break their neck with one swipe or chew an arm off before they realized what was happening. I've had to chase bear of many times from cabins and even off the hood of a car that he had caved in by bouncing up and down. All wind game will sort of tolerate you but when crowded most of them will let you know rite quick they are on their own grounds and you are just a visitor.

I worked on a land development on the county line just across the fence of the Mescalero Indian reservation (they had a half million acres in the reservation). On the property I worked on we had a mother mountain lion

From the Minister's Desk:

-Have you heard about the middle-aged bachelor who proposed to the middle-aged spinster? As he began his proposal, he said: "I've good news for you. I want to marry you." "Her pointed reply was: " Good news? Why I've already got a cat that stays out late and a dog that growls at me, why do I need a husband?"

An important truth is illustrated by this little story. This truth is that whether news is good or bad often depends upon the circumstances of the people who hear it. But let me tell you some news that does not depend upon the circumstances of the people who hear it. This news is always good news.

This good news is composed of three facts. These facts are:—

1. You are loved by God. This love has been clearly demonstrated by the sacrificial death of His Son, Jesus Christ. The Apostle Paul wrote: "While we were still helpless, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will hardly die for a righteous man; through perhaps for the good man someone would dare even to die. But God demonstrates His own love toward us in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:6-8)

2. You can be a changed person. One of the greatest truths of Christianity is that people can change. Perhaps the Apostle John is the best illustration of this change. He is also described as the apostle of love because he repeatedly emphasized love in the New Testaments letters that he wrote. He is also described in his latter years by early church historians as the gentlest man who repeatedly encouraged first century Christians to "love one another."

But John was not always such a man. When Jesus selected him and

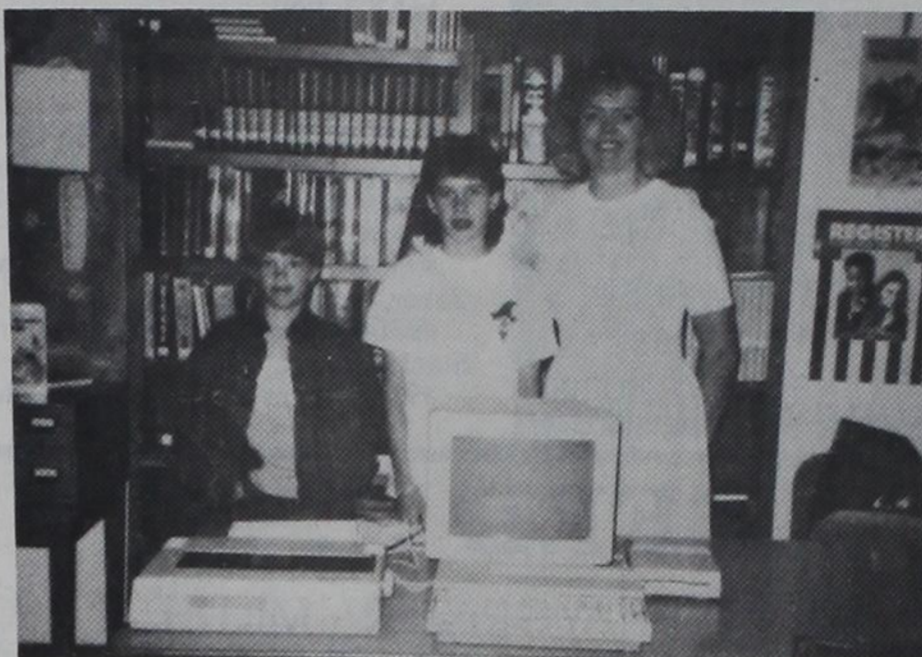

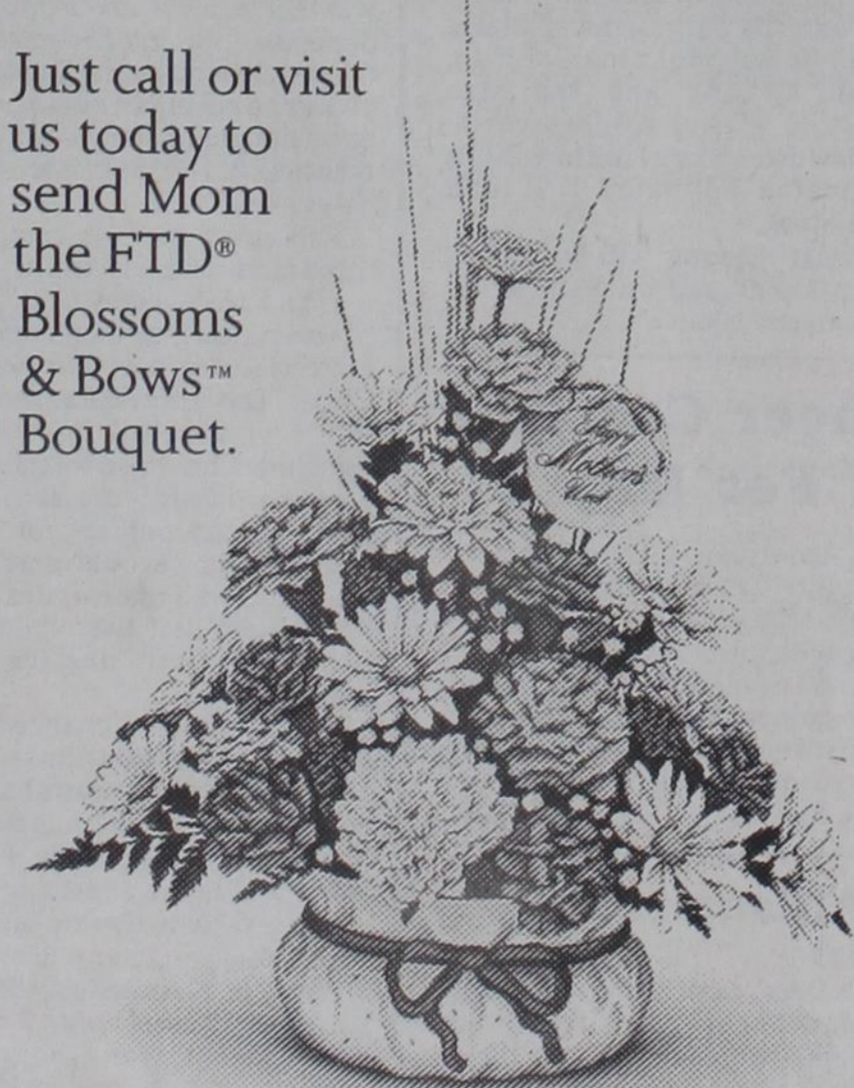

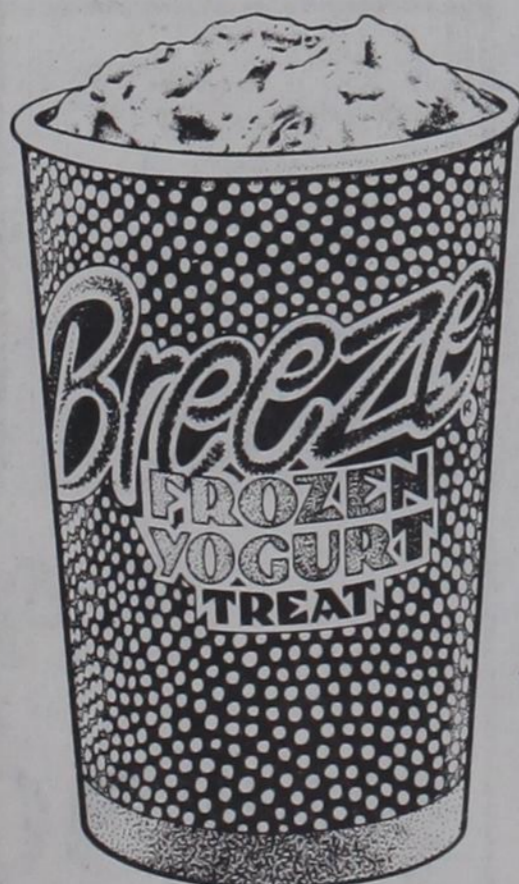
