I left a "1" out in typing Ginger's discus record last week. It should have read 115'9".

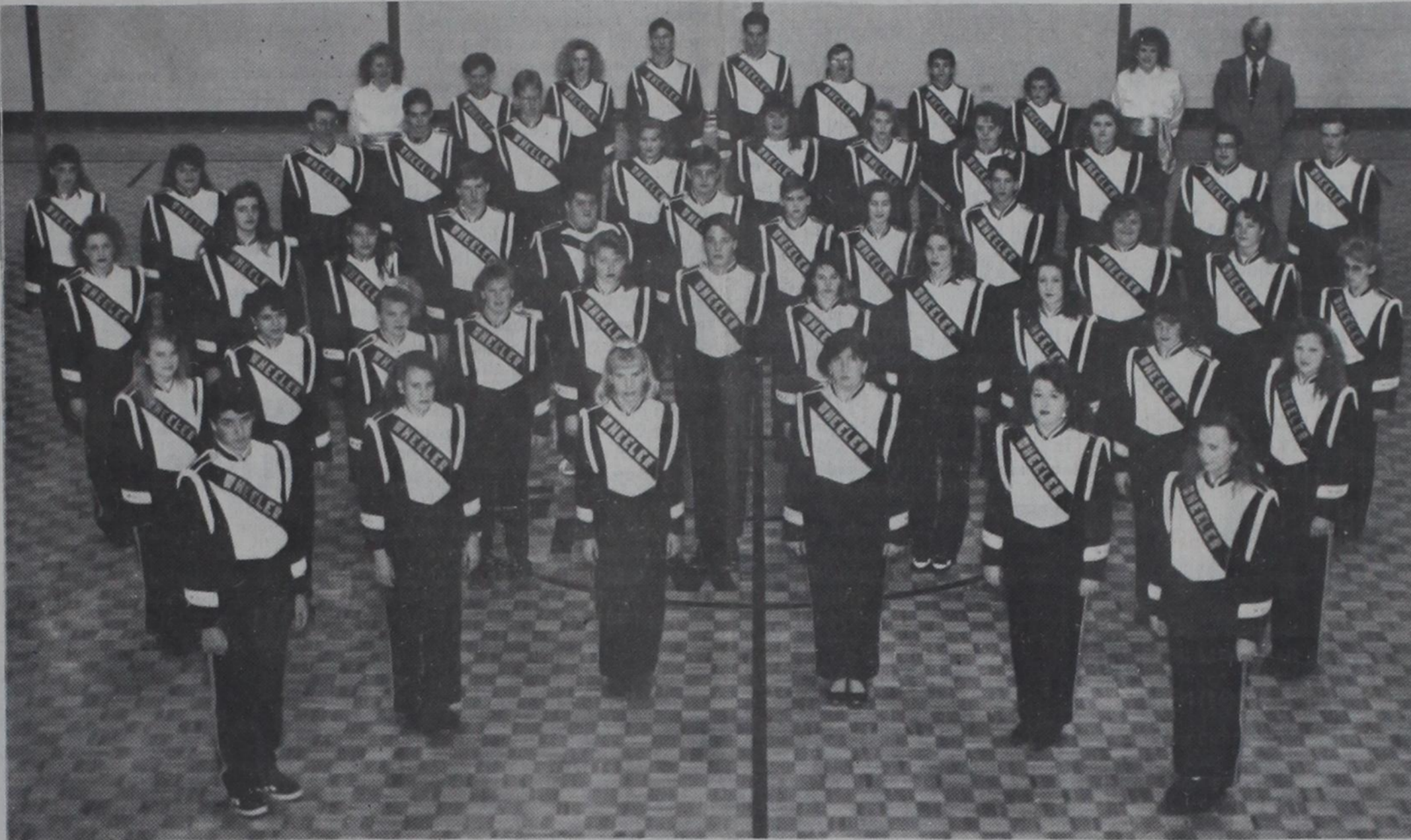

WARNING ISSUED TO CHILDREN & PARENTS

This is a warning to the children and parents of Wheeler County: End of school is here again and our teenagers and young adults are going to be tempted into consuming alcohol, not only small amounts but many times in large quantities in short periods of time on dates.

This last weekend reaffirmed our commitment to educate and enforce laws that are either disobeyed or disregarded. We in law enforcement and the teachers in our school systems can only expose our children to the hazards of alcohol possession and consumption.

Alcohol has been glorified in advertising, but they never show the grief on a family's face and in their hearts when they have to bury a child, or the fear and anguish of not knowing whether or not their child is going to wake with or without permanent brain damage from an alcohol overdose.

We need the help of every parent who has children regardless of age to discourage ANY alcohol use now or ever. We in Law Enforcement will make every effort to see that minors in possession of alcohol will be handled fairly and evenly throughout Wheeler County. We will also notify every parent of each minor that is in violation, that our office handles.

I am not saying each one or any will have to pay a fine, we will however work them on a case by case basis. I hope to have the cooperation of all the parents of Wheeler County. If we can discourage open possession and the beer busts that seem to always turn into more serious problems, maybe we can avoid tragedy. We need help from the parents, older sisters/brothers and anyone who has influence with our children to openly discourage alcohol use. We in Law Enforcement thank you.

It took me awhile to figer out why the old wheelbarrow had so much importance to Pablo but over the weeks I found it was not only a toy to him but a means of transportation for the Chu family, to the garden, to the market and also the most important thing the little round faced Chinaman owned.

As I got acquainted with the folks there in Tanawan I realized it was a little town sort of like the one I grew up in and the folks were sort of like my own. Just folks trying to survive the terrible war. Many of the folks lived in the Mission. One family had a church pew and all their belongings were under the seat and then another family and another. There wuz one bird that seemed to be the ramrod of this Ramada Inn or what ever they called it. I looked this character over and figered who ever it was must have been older than Mathousalam cause even the wrinkles had wrinkles and the person couldn't have weighed more than a hundred pounds. Found out this person wuz a she and had gone with some American captain in the Spanish American War and Recon that gave her a right to be in charge. She even took me under her wing. Yep she would make me bring my washin by and she would take all the duds to the creek and beat all the dirt she could out of them and have them ready when I got back in town from where ever I had been. She found out, don't know how, that I had malaria and disenteray purty bad. She put me on a diet of young green coconut, raw sugar and canned milk. She made a paste out of it and wrapped it in a banana leaf. She took a couple of hitches in the seat of my fatigues so they wouldn't fall off. She smoked the blackest cigars I have ever seen and offered me one of them. I never could learn to enjoy them durn things. I bought a hundred kilos of rice to distribute among all the people and durned if she didn't try to sell it instead of giving it away. She wouldn't let me pay her for all the washing or the medication and I knew they all were in poverty but had such pride.

I found another little boy that had no parents and he seemed to get along with me and would go everywhere I went and many times it was dangerous but I found he had survived in such conditions. His name was Martin and I needed some type of clearance to show he wasn't a Jap sympathizer. I got the papers and found I had sort of got permission to adopt him. I couldn't cause we would soon leave for some other operation.

When we got ready to leave the Island Martin just knew I would find some way to take him with us, but we had found our next job would be very tough and I decided he had had enough war for a little 12 year old boy. We were loading all of our gear, ammo and all and I was driving a DWK (amphibian truck) and as we would load the ship the friends would be at the beach watching and I had given a friend 200 bucks, one for Martin and one for Mamacita and as we closed the doors on the big landing craft I waded to this friend to give Martin and Mamacita each a hundred bucks. As she gave it to them each would have have wrung my neck. They did what they did for love.

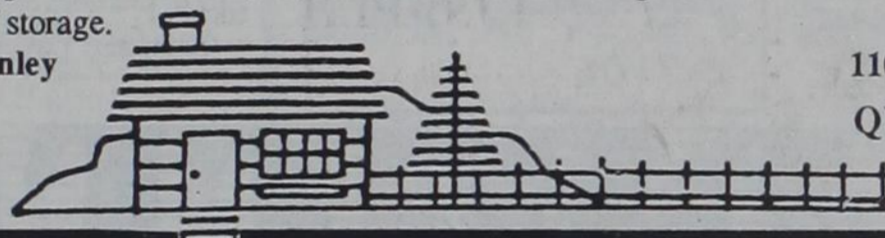

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following story was taken from the May 1991 issue of Oklahoma Big Idea, story written by Janice Smith.)

"Boy, I wouldn't have that job for anything," is one of the many comments that Crystal Bradstreet hears as she does her job as a driver in the Oklahoma feeder department. Crystal has now qualified to operate triple trailers which to our knowledge makes her the first female in the company to qualify for the tandem of trailers.

Crystal started with UPS in February 1981 as a delivery driver in the Norman center. She recalled she didn't even know where Norman was at the time. After she finished her last pickup stop in Norman she had to ask a man at that business which was the fastest way back to the UPS building. She said, "I couldn't tell him I didn't know how to get back to the building." That can be used as a reference point as to where Crystal began her career and to the extent that she has progressed.

After driving for 3 1/2 years in the Norman center she came to OKC West center as a coverage driver. She was Driver of the Month with Sandy Brown as her supervisor. Sandy says, "Crystal gave 110 percent everyday. She had excellent delivery records and maintained good performance." Her efforts in the center helped to make the center one of the best.

As Crystal progressed with her career at UPS she decided to bid on the tractor/trailer job opening. Her seniority put her in a position where she was selected to train for the position. Of course training for tractor/trailer jobs is done on Saturday and Sunday and are

normally 12-hour days. No problem for Crystal. She worked her normal job as a delivery driver during the week and worked to qualify for tractor/trailers on the weekend—all weekend.

Her First Run
During the peak season of 1989, Crystal went to the feeder department and made her first run to Tulsa. She said that she really enjoyed the job because she felt that she had received excellent training and there were no hitches. During her first week as a tractor/trailer driver she had a supervisor with her every mile of the way.

In November 1990, back in the feeder department, Crystal had the opportunity to qualify to pull triple trailers. She never gave it a second thought. She qualified with no problems.

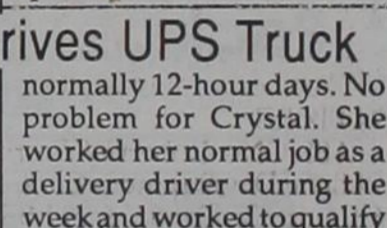
Laugh Them Off

Thomas Competes SWOSU Rodeo

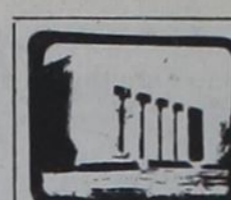

From The Minister's Desk:

This editorial is entitled, "A Tale of Two Schools" and should not be confused with Charles Dickens' Novel, "A Tale of Two Cities". While there are probably several obvious differences between Dickens' novel and this editorial, the primary difference is the subject. In Dickens' novel, the subject is the French Revolution which occurred in the 1500's. But in this editorial, the subject is two high schools that were described in recent issues of *Texas Monthly*.

One of these schools is Carter High School which is located on the southwest fringe of Dallas in one of that city's most prosperous minority neighborhoods. While most of the students at Carter High are black, they come from solid middle-class homes. Few of these students experience any genuine material deprivation.

Carter High School is a high school football power that is consistently ranked among the top teams in the state. And in 1988, the Carter High Cowboys won the state championship. Yet this championship was tainted by a controversy over one of the team's star players. This controversy began in the first week of the 1988 state play-offs when the University Interscholastic League got an anonymous tip that the player had received a failing grade during the first six weeks. After an investigation by the University Interscholastic League, the player was declared ineligible. And because the player had played in three regular-season games while he was ineligible, the University Interscholastic League disqualified the Cowboys from the state play-offs.

Following this ruling by the University Interscholastic League, a state district judge issued a temporary restraining order that allowed the Carter Cowboys to remain in the play-offs. After several weeks of legal battles between the University Interscholastic League and Carter High, it was determined that the player was eligible to play and the Cowboys eventually won the state championship, compiling a 14-0-1 season.

But the glory of this championship season was short-lived. In June of 1988, fifteen players were arrested and were charged with committing twenty-one armed robberies. Ten of the fifteen were found guilty and were sentenced to long prison terms. When these players were sentenced, the judge offered a partial explanation for their crimes, saying: "Although it sometimes may not seem so, the criminal justice system really doesn't care who you are. The typical American male lives vicariously on Sunday afternoons in the fall and winter through the lives of football heroes. However, when it comes to violating the law, at the courthouse it simply doesn't matter that you can run the football."

The other school is Cathedral High School which is an all male, Catholic school that is located in a Hispanic Neighborhood in El Paso. Because of its location and its seventy-seven percent Hispanic student body, it would be easy to think that Cathedral High is an inner city school that is characterized by a high dropout rate, low test scores, and lax discipline. But Cathedral High is not such a school.

In 1989 Cathedral High's eighty-two graduates were accepted by colleges and won fifty-five scholarships. And the 1989 class was not an extraordinary class. Ninety-eight percent of Cathedral High's graduates go to college.

Cathedral high does not have a

football team, a basketball team, a track team, or a band. But it does have a swimming team that has repeatedly won the state championship.

Discipline problems are almost non-existent at Cathedral high. It has strict rules about dress code and conduct. The students who violate these rules are firmly, but reasonably disciplined.

Most of the students who attend Cathedral High have middle-class, working parents that financially sacrifice so their children can attend Cathedral High. But these parents apparently recognize that Cathedral High makes an impressive commitment to their children. This commitment is: "Follow the rules for four years and you will leave here with not just a diploma, but a destiny."

While Carter High is a public school and Cathedral High is a private school, I think that two observations can be made from the descriptions of these schools which will be beneficial to the education of our children. These observations are:—

1. Schools must maintain a balance between athletics and academics. Carter High apparently did not maintain this balance. While Carter was becoming a perennial power in Texas high school football, its standardized test scores were among the lowest in the Dallas Independent School District.

A choice does not have to be made between athletics and academics. It is not a matter of either-or. The Constitution and Contest Rules of the University Interscholastic League says that "—Athletics is an integral part of the educational program."

Athletics are a "—part of the educational program" not the only part or the most essential part. And if children are to be properly educated, schools must maintain a balance between this part of the educational program and the other part which is academics.

2. Schools must be allowed to firmly, but reasonably discipline their students. Such discipline is one of the prominent characteristics of Cathedral High which is clearly seen by its dress code. According to this dress code, students must wear slacks (no jeans), shirts with collars (no T-shirts), and dress shoes (no sandals or tennis shoes). This dress code also says that students must wear their hair above the top of the collar of their shirts and it must be neat—not too bushy—and maintained in its natural color.

Dress styles and hair styles are usually momentary fads that are not worthy of much concern. But adherence to a standard is an important element of discipline. For this reason, it is extremely important that children learn that they must adhere to a standard of conduct. It is wrong to believe that children can learn self-control in an environment that does not require them to adhere to a standard.

It is imperative that schools be allowed to practice firm, but reasonable discipline.

I am not Charles Dickens. But I am a parent that wants his children to receive the best education that they can. I want them to receive not only a diploma, but a destiny.

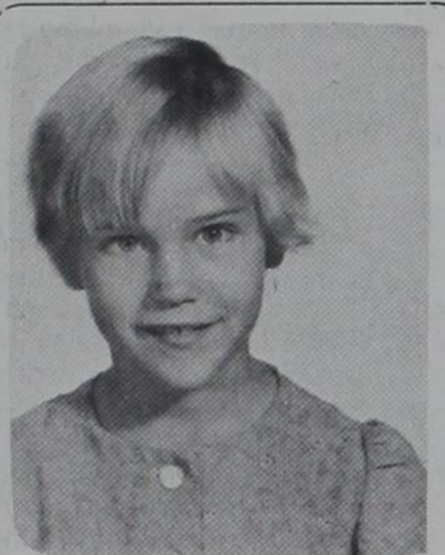

Bushland Wheat Field Day Thursday

Agricultural producers will have an opportunity to obtain three Continuing Education Units (CEU's) during the annual Bushland Wheat Field Day Thursday, May 23.

The morning session, which is good for three CEU's will be in the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center and will run from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

Public tours of the wheat research being done at Bushland will begin at 1:00 p.m. at the Bushland headquarters. During the tour, various Texas A&M University and USDA researchers will discuss the purpose and results of their work.

Producers who hold a Private Pesticide Applicators license should remember that they are required to obtain 15 CEU's in 5 years to maintain that license. For those who have gotten their license since January 1, 1990 have five years from the date the license was issued. Those who got their license prior to January 10, 1989 and came in to the new system as certified applicators, have until December 31, 1994 to get 15 CEU's.

There will be a Pesticide Applicator's License training and testing program in Miami on Monday, May 20. Anyone who needs a license and was unable to attend the training in Wheeler County last month will be welcome to attend the meeting in Miami. Also two CEU's may be obtained at the Roberts County Wheat Field Day on Tuesday, May 21. For more information on these meetings, call the Roberts County Extension office at 868-3191.

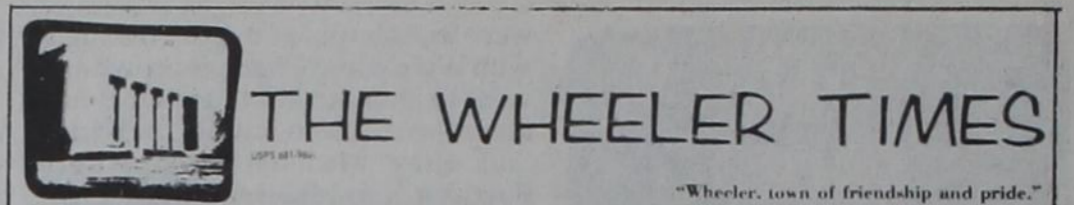
