

Posting an impressive record of 30 wins and only 8 losses over the last 3 years, this Mustangs team (especially the seniors) has plenty to be proud of and has continued the long, winning tradition of Wheeler football.

Rankin held Wheeler to only 149 yards total offense but turnovers and penalties kept the Mustangs from winning this game.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Red Devils mounted a 10 play 80 yard scoring drive. Facing fourth down and long from the Wheeler 43 Rankin QB Kirk Kennedy found Louis Gonzales for a 24 yard pass for a key first down to the Wheeler 22 yard line.







"This is not a rich against poor issue.

Anyway you cut it the burden falls on local taxpayers whether they reside in a poor district or a rich district," said James Pennington. Senate Bill 351 took money from districts with higher than average

property wealth that forced increases in local taxes and/or cuts in education programs. About 50 of these districts have banded together in a group called the "Robin Hood Forum" to make their stand on the school finance issue. Allison ISD is a member of this group. Research being conducted by the

Robin Hood Forum indicates that while

the new law has hurt programs in the

wealthier districts it has not significantly helped the poorer districts. "The bottom line is that the state of Texas is once again neglecting it responsibility to adequately fund quality education," said Bill Reaves, superintendent in Palacios ISD. "Nobody is really a winner under this plan because it still fails to deliver a sufficient amount of money to poorer school districts so they can truly make a difference. At the same time, it simply levels down higher spending schools to a state-imposed

Iflew a lot with another pilot that would go anywhere any time and we had been in lots of bad weather and ice and snow but somehow we always got home. This guy would do



Ron Conatser officiated at the private outdoor ceremony. A location under the branches of an oak tree on the Gillette Ranch overlooking a valley was chosen as the site for the ceremony.

Doris Gillette of Yonkers, With the sun breaking through a formerly overcast sky, Mother Nature provided the decorations for the "1880's" ceremony. A bible belonging to the paternal great great grandfather of the groom was used by the minister. The engagement and wedding ring set were engraved Nov. 7, 1889; having been worn by the paternal great grandmother of the groom.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was attired in an ankle-length two piece dress created by the bride, her father and the mother of the groom. The material for the dress was an ivory colored damask found in a trunk that had belonged to the groom's late paternal grandmother. The bride also wore a hat adorned with lace, pearls, and a veil; and a parasol completed the ensemble. She carried a country-style bouquet of Hybrid Delphiniums and Queen Anne's Lace.

Worn by the bride for "something Old" was the fabric for the dress; "something new", pearl earrings, a gift from the mother and father of the groom; "something borrowed", a handkerchief that belonged to the late maternal grandmother of the groom and borrowed from the mother of the groom; and "something blue" an ivory-colored lace garter decorated with sequins, pearls, and a small blue bow which was created by Mrs. Wayne Mason of Wichita, Kansas, aunt of the bride.

The groom chose a gray flannel frock coat, vest, white

Continuing with the 1880's motif, family, friends and neighbors of the bride and groom attended a "Gathering at the Chuckwagon". The wagon, built in the 1880's was purchased by the Gillettes in 1988. The menu consisted of stew, red beans, and sourdough biscuits cooked in dutch ovens; and a gooseneck round roast cooked slowly over a bed of coals. For dessert, the guests had access to a basket of cookies made from the bride's recipe.

A seven-peice band consisting of fiddles and guitars provided country and western music during the afternoon.



Fire Marshall Recommends Safety Precautions

The State Fire Marshall's Office recommends these safety precautions when operating heating equipment:

1. Keep all heaters at least THREE FEET away from combustible objects, such as walls, curtains, drapes and furniture, especially beds. Use a yardstick or meter stick to measure the distance.

2. Use only heating equipment that is in good operating condition. Watch for worn electrical cords, gas leaks or faulty switches. Keep your heating equipment (including ducting)

3. Have your heating equipment, both central systems and portable equipment, serviced by a qualified expert at least once a year. Have your fireplace, wood-burning stove and chimney inspected and cleaned at least once a year.

4. Test your smoke alarms each week. Install a smoke alarm if you don't have one. Contact your local fire department if you can't afford one or install one yourself. Replace the battery if it has not been changed in the


5. If your heating equipment is not safe, ASK FOR HELP. Contact local authorities for help in improving your heating equipment or for locations of shelters in extremely cold weather.


6. If you know someone who does not have safe, adequate heating equipment, offer help or ask a local social service agency to help.

7. Be sure all heaters, stoves, fireplaces and chimneys are installed and insulated properly. Check for heating of adjacent floors and walls, which can be very hazard-

8. Use only approved heaters and fuels. Check for UL or Factory Mutual labels. Because portable heaters are illegal in some jurisdictions, check with local fire authorities to be sure that portable heaters are allowed in your

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious British Journal of Nutrition. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear. In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.
