## WHEELER ROUTS SHAMROCK, 42-6

The Wheeler Mustangs notched their 9th win of the season Friday night as they beat up on the Shamrock Irish 42-6.

Wheeler clinched a play-off berth with the victory and set up a showdown for the District 1-A Championship against the Memphis Cyclones, next Friday at Memphis.

The Mustangs are ranked 2nd in the state in both the Harris and A.P. polls and Memphis is ranked 7th in the Harris poll.

Both Wheeler and Memphis are 4 and 0 in district play and have soundly

defeated their opponents.

The winner of Friday nights game will most likely meet Nazareth in a Bi-District playoff game. The loser will face Happy in the first round of the playoffs.

Shamrock came to town hoping that the cold, frozen field would prevent the powerful Mustangs from thrashing the hapless Irish but not even a blizzard could have stoped the Mustangs from this romp.

Three plays was all it took to show the Irish that Wheeler could play in any weather.

On the first play of the game, running back Mark Marshall rambled 56 yards all the way to the Shamrock 4 yard line. Two plays later Mark barreled across right tackle for the 1 yd TD.

Ike Finsterwald's kick was good and the Mustangs led 7-0.

The Black Death defense dug into the ice and stopped Shamrock cold on Shamrock's first possession.

The Irish only managed a 19 yd. punt to put Wheeler in great field position at the Shamrock 40.

This time 5 plays was all the Mustangs would need. The Mustang offensive line crushed the Irish defenders while Junior Mark Marshall and Chad Dunnam churned out the yardage.

With 1st and goal from the 10, Mark took off around left end for the T.D. Finsterwald's PAT was good and Wheeler with barely 5 minutes gone from the clock.

Shamrock got some "in your face" defense put on them by the Mustangs and punted again after gaining only 2 yards.

Starting with good field position again at the 45 Travis Cook and the offensive line, ripped open the Irish defense.

On second down from the 44 Mack Marshall took off on a 42 yard burst to the Shamrock 2 yd line.

Mack got the call again and took it in for the 2 yd T.D. Finsterwald's kick was true and the Mustangs led 21-0 with 4 minutes remaining in the 1st quarter.

With the easy lead, the Mustangs gave up the only big play of the game. Shamrock end Darren Biggers hauled in a long pass and raced 84 yards to the Wheeler 1.

It took the Irish four tries from the one yard line, but Lynn Mills finally punched it across for the Irish T.D. Wheeler 21, Shamrock 6.

Brandon Chick returned the Shamrock kick off 38 yards to give the Mustangs field position at the Irish 42 yd line.

The Mustangs wasted no time in putting together their next score. Mack Marshall stepped off 36 yards in 3 carries to the Shamrock 6. But a penalty moved the Mustangs back to

All animals, including steers (which were validated in June) and beef heifers, must be entered by November 9. Exhibitors may receive a refund of entry fees for any animal withdrawn from the show by January 3, 1992.

To be eligible to enter and participate in the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show, the exhibitor must be a member of the Wheeler County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter and attend public or private school in Wheeler County.

### Cow-Calf Clinic Scheduled Nov. 12

Area cattlemen are invited to a cow-calf clinic scheduled for Tuesday, November 12, 1991. This clinic, will focus on the selection and development of replacement heifers.

The first part of the program will be held at the Wheeler County Show Barn beginning at 5:00 p.m. Topics to be covered in this session will be the relationship of pelvic area and calving

ease, health programs for the cow herd and replacement heifers, estrus synchronization in the heifers, the use of implants and bull selection. Speakers will be Dr. Russell Killingsworth from the Shamrock Veterinary Clinic and Drs. Ben Ed and Lee Ann Hillhouse of the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic. They will also demonstrate the use of a pelvic meter and have live animals available for participants to estimate pelvic size.

At 6:30 p.m. the clinic will move to Maxey's Steakhouse for a Dutch treat supper. Following the meal, Dr. Dave Hutchinson, Nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Amarillo, will discuss winter nutrition for the cow herd and nutritional requirements of developing heifers. Also Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist, will talk about external and internal parasite control in beef cattle.

Attendance at the clinic will qualify producers who have a Private Pesticide Applicators License two continuing educational units toward the renewal of that license.

There is no charge for the clinic which is being sponsored by the Wheeler County Agriculture Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap, or national origin.

Defensive back Jason Beers put the Mustangs in scoring position to start the 3rd quarter as he picked off an Irish pass and returned it to the

Shamrock 34.

The Mustang offensive line dished out more punishment to the Irishmen as Wheeler mounted its final scoring drive.

Mark Marshall capped the 8 play 34 yd drive with a 7 yd. T.D. run. Finsterwald's kick was good and the final score was Wheeler 42, Shamrock 6.

### Jerry Hefley Announces As Candidate For Office

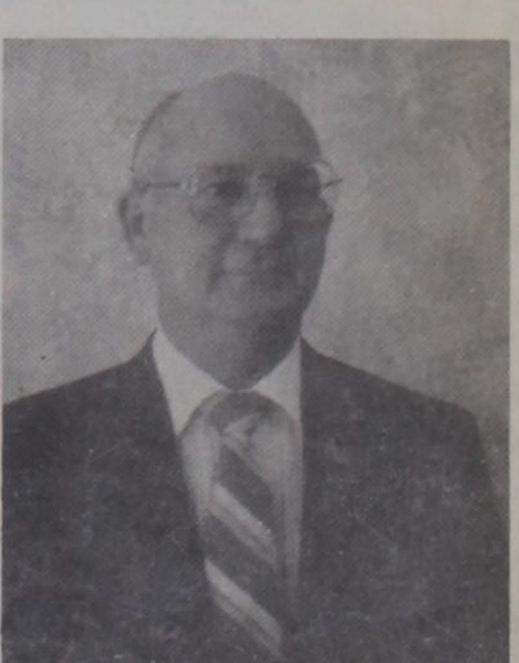
Jerry Dan Hefley announces this week he will be a candidate for reelection to the office of Tax Assessor-Collector of Wheeler County.

Got to talking to some friends down at the Cafe at Freedom the other day and we got to talking about mules, burros and the such and Cleve asked if I knew anything about burros and such. Well, I have had the privilege uv feedin them, being nipped by them and even pitched off of them, forgot that they even kick too. Small feet and they kick very hard. These little beast were a baseball team, sort of. You would bat the ball and to run the bases you did it on the back of these little cute creatures. Me and Tater Ray would help you on the mule and unknown to you we would sort uv nudge your mount with a little tack that was in the end of a small stick. All of the mounts didn't like to be goosed by these small tacks and would pitch and snort and run, not for first base mind you but just run. We had a lot of good hitters but very few of these athletes ever got a home run. These critters would duck their heads and when they did you would bite the dust. Donkeys don't have much withers er whatever you call the hump up front. Our friend A.Z. was raised in Kentucky and knows mules from one end to the other. His dad didn't have any horsepower but plenty of mule power. A.Z. knows a lot about these animals and had used them in farming, logging and goin on a cruise with your best girl in the buggy, drawn by mules.

My brother in law Roy had a pair of mules named Red and Rodie and they were fine mules and worked to a wagon fine till you finally felt comfortable with them and then either Red or Rodie would put a wee bit of spice in your day. With no help one or the other would make a right er left turn and that front wheel of the wagon would go under the wagon bed and flip it over, usually with a lode of grain on it. Roy somehow would get Red and Rodie back to the wagon, turn it back on the wheels and load the grain and go on with what he intended to do, getting the grain to the grainery. I think Roy sort of enjoyed the challenge them mules gave him.

Cleve asked how you would breed to get a white mule and this and that and A.Z. would explain the way and how you would get the big 16 hand high mules by breeding to the Tennessee walkers and all that and we talked about burros and how they were used in mining and to help gentle young colts and such and I wish I had a tape recorder with me as it was very interesting to hear all these things.

One time I had worked for a mining outfit and we had a Jack by the name of Rastus that would carry about as much load as he was in weight. He would carry it all day long without a whimper but in the evenings he would let you know it by his braying. He had lots of girlfriends among the Quarter horse fillies so if you ever see a Quarter horse that looks sort of like a mule it could be one of Rastus's offsprings. One time our Rodeo bunch was going to lead the Grand Entry at the Big show at Elk City, Okla and Sam Watson wanted me to ride his white mule but he said "Ab be sure he comes in the arena just behind that Filly of mine, now member that Ab, otherwise he will throw a walleyed fit". Well I had had a sasperelli er two and figured that durn mule wouldn't know one filly from another cause the Grand Entry had lots uv horses in it from everywhere. Well we were chosen to take in the flags and such and here we went right out in the big arena with thousands of spectators watchin. I happened to think what Sam had told me but I wuz a bit late. That durn white mule started puttin on a show uv his own and we sort of broke up the Grand Entry and as me and the mule headed across the arena the Rodeo Clown figured he better get into the act and jumped rite on behind me and we showed em a show believe me we did. I wuz disqualified to ride any more Entries and Sam never offered me the mule again. Se you folks, Ab and Mama.

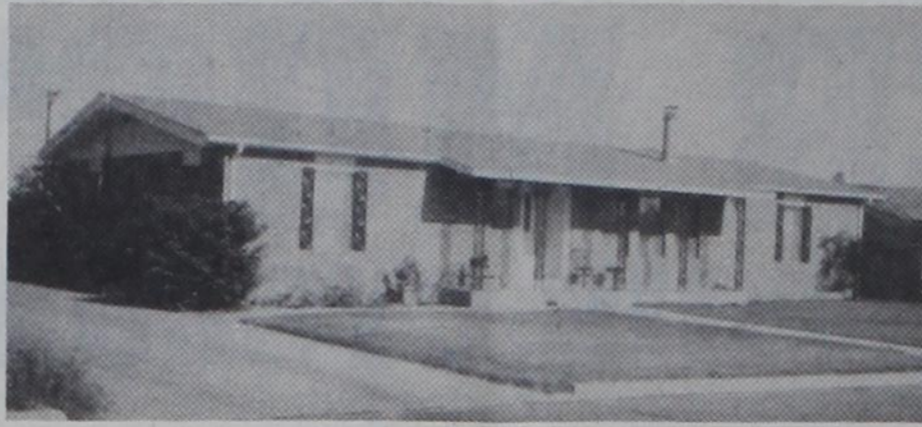

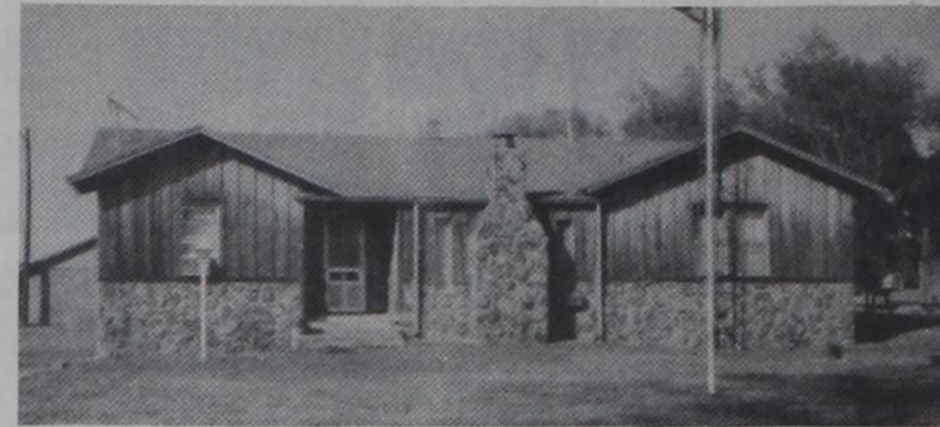

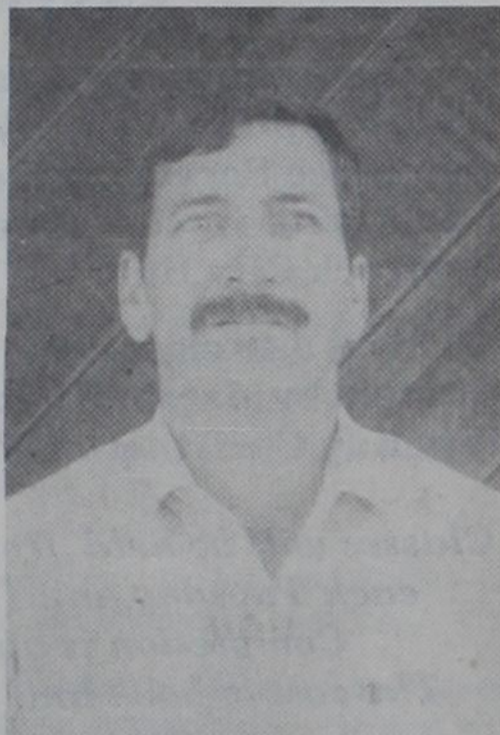
