

Speeding, Stop Signs, Teen Center Are Topics

July 15, 1991

The regular meeting of the City Council of Wheeler, Texas was called to order by Mayor Wanda Herd.

Barbra Koelzer made motion, seconded by Bob McCain, to approve the minutes as written. The Motion car-

Walter Simmons made motion, seconded by Mark Frankenbery, to pay bills as presented. Motion carried.

Frank Clymer reported on the activities of the City employees.

Charles Kuntz presented receipts and disbursements and discussed

Chris Osborne met with the Council to discuss the speeding on Mobeetie Street, and the problem of drivers failing to stop at the stop signs on 10th and Mobeetie. It was decided that ci-

tations would be given to any driver caught speeding or failing to stop at stop signs in the City. Sheriff Adams stated that it was not necessarily the teenagers not abiding by the law, it is the adults as well. If the citations do not stop the problem, then the city will place speed barriers at various locations on Mobeetie Street. (There are approximately twenty children living in this area.)

Danny Flanagan met with the Council to discuss a teen center. After a lengthy discussion, it was decided that it was an excellent idea, but the City could not afford to build or purchase a teen center. The Council stated they would support one anyway possible if someone wanted to open a

teen center personally. From The Minister's Desk:

On July 29th, 1969, Neil Armstrong became the first man to walk on the surface of the moon. As millions of people watched this historic event on television, a television commentator excitedly proclaimed: "This is the greatest thing that has happened in the

history of the world." While this statement is understandable, it is not correct. The "greatest thing that has happened in the history of the world-" is not the ascent of man to the moon, but it is the descent of deity to the earth. This is a visited planet! It is a planet that has been visited by God in the person of Jesus Christ.

But what was the purpose of this visit? There are at least three words that can explain the purpose of this visit. These three words are:

Revelation

this reconciliation was provided by the death of Jesus. The Apostle Paul wrote: "-If while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son-." (Romans 5:10)

The teachings of the New Testament are that the benefits of Jesus' death are appropriated when penitent man is baptized into Jesus' death. (Romans 6: 3-4) Through this act of faith, the demands of God's justice are met and the sins of man are graciously pardoned which allows man and God to be reconciled.




