Disciples of Jesus should always oppose unrighteousness and ungodliness. But their opposition should always be based upon facts not unsubstantiated rumors.

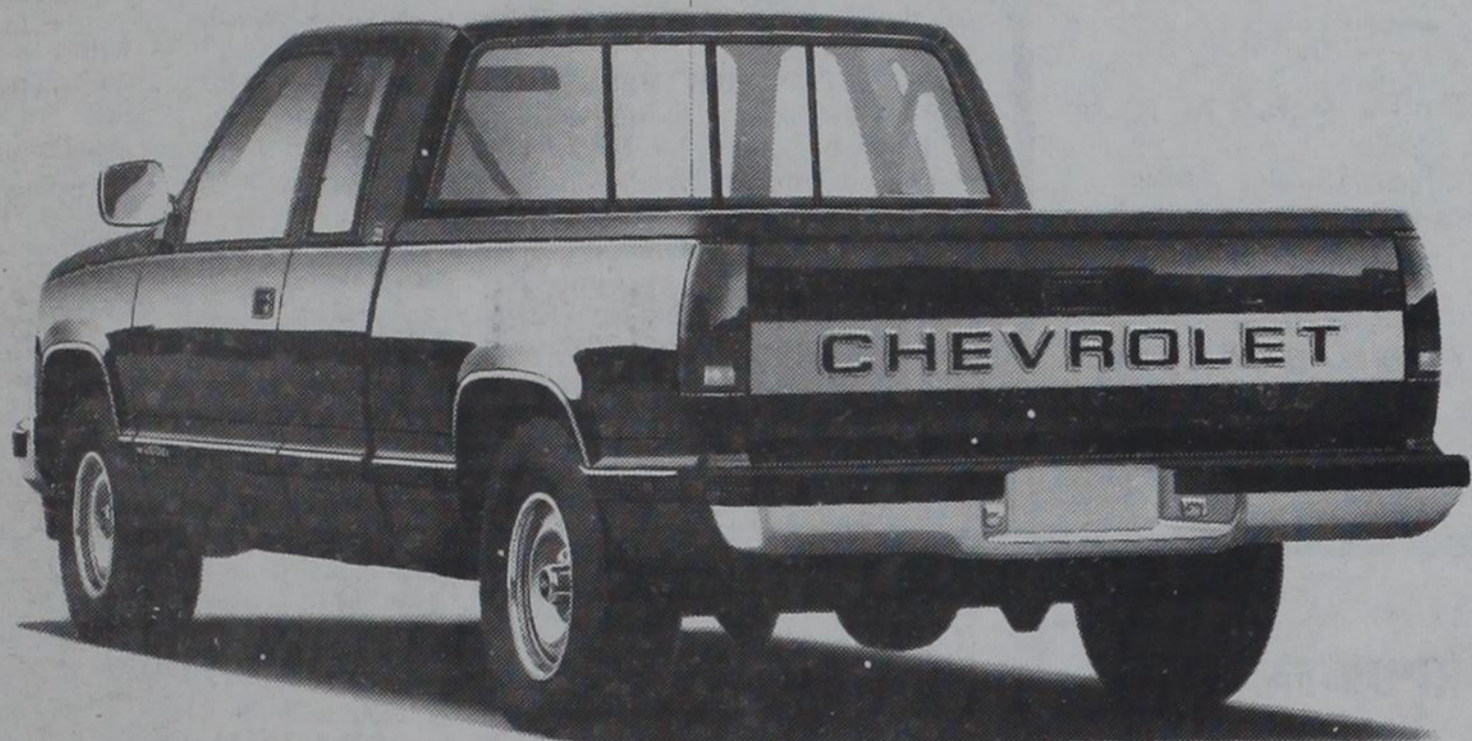

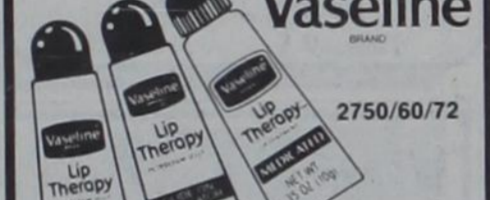
