There are other older students that have said "I wish that we had had something like this when we graduated". The party burns off the excitement and stored up energy the kids have built up in them for four years of school. We are the parents of these young people and should be examples for them. If we as parents don't do this we cannot expect anyone else to do the job for us. We cannot wait until something tragic happens and then start pointing fingers.

The kids of Project Graduation did have fun, they were tired, and at the end really ready to go home. They all



Property Tax Protest & Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you; cancellation of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: Contact Larry Schoenhals, Chief Appraiser, 806/826-5900

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 101 E. Texas (Courthouse Square) Wheeler, Texas

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the

ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests (If you miss Before the day the appraisal the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.)

James A. Kendall, MD, is the new anesthesiologist at Coronado Hospital in Pampa, according to an announcement made this week by Bruce W. Reinhart, administrator. Dr. Kendall comes to Pampa from Lewisville where he was in practice meet with every patient before surgery for 10 years.

same time as some new anesthesia equipment, according to Reinhardt. "The Ohmeda Modulus II is an anesthesia machine which is much safer than the older machines," he said. This machine can deliver the gases, and provides continuous monitoring of ventilation and oxygen saturation. It can also use air as an anesthesia ajunct, which is necessary for some types of delicate ear surgery.'

Dr. Kendall will administer or supervise all anesthesia, he said. He has a CRNA (Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist) who also administers nesthesia under his direction.

Dr. Kendall said that the practice of anesthesia has improved dramatically in the last few years. "We use epidurals for most childbirth, and for some complicated vascular and general surgeries." He explained that the epidural is the insertion of a tiny catheter into the bony spinal canal, outside the spinal cord. This method takes less narcotic, and can be used as a line to administer drugs in small quantities, for post-surgery pain relief for several days. "We also have safer, more comfortable techniques for spinal anesthesia," he said, "with new drugs that are more acceptable and of much less risk to the patient."

The new types of anesthesia are a vast improvement over the types used just a few years ago," he said. "We now have pumps that can administer as little as .9 cc per hour, so that the




