

In preparing to establish 9-1-1 service in your area, the Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network, in conjunction with local emergency service providers, is asking all residents and business operators to complete and return this form.

The information you provide will aid emergency service personnel in locating your residence or business operation and cut precious seconds or minutes off their response time. The information will be very beneficial in finding rural locations since many homes are generally not numbered and many rural roads are unnamed. The information should be periodically updated by the resident and/or business operator when changes occur. any circumstances or situations that would be helpful in responding to an

DPS New Year's Safety Report FACT: Drunk driving continues to be one of the nations most serious

health and safety problems. However, Major V. J. Cawthon, Regional Com-mander of the Texas Department of Public Safety says that Federal. State, Local and private efforts to reduce the incidents of drinking and driving are having an impact.

Major Cawthon says with the approach of New Year's Eve that this trend can continue if each of us will do our part in pre-planning our New Year's

It is recommended that if your going to host a party, that soft drinks be available for your guests so they will have a choice. Introduce people to one another, a good host is not just a bartender. Don't rush refills, don't double up because it's not generous, it's rude. Attempt to have a meal or snacks available throughout the evening and, above all, if someone drinks too much at your house, you are responsible. Provide lodging or get them a safe ride home.

If your plans include traveling this New Year's Eve, then make plans that only allow a totally sober driver to be behind the wheel. It's a good idea to check with your local media outlets to see if any organizations will be providing ride home programs. For those who think that it will never happen to them, the Department of Public Safety, along with other local law enforcement agencies, will have stepped up patrols and DWI enforcement over the New Year's Eve holiday.

Major Cawthon went on to say that one of the best defenses against a drunk driver is to fasten your safety belt, but it's only effective if the driver and all occupants take time to do so. Let's all work toward making this the safest New Year's Holiday ever.
