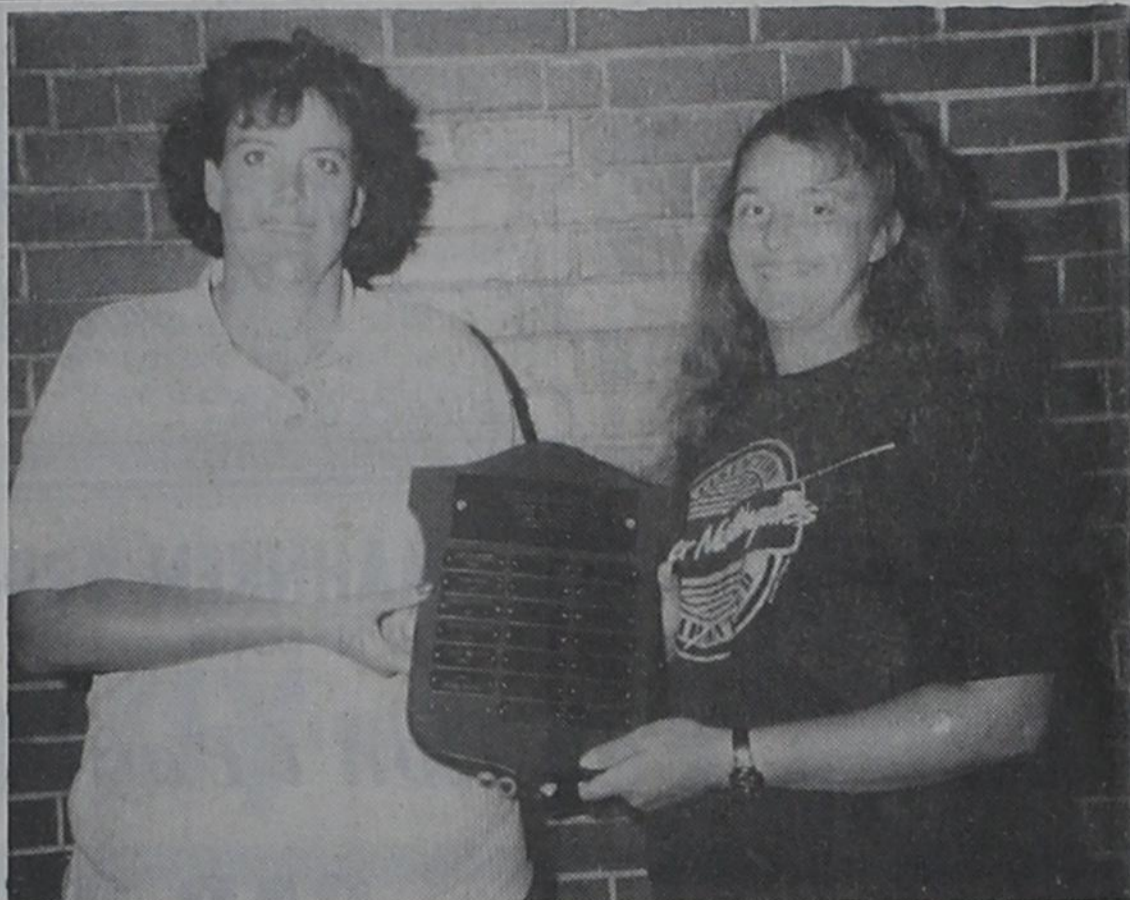

Six Piano Students To Be In Guild Auditions

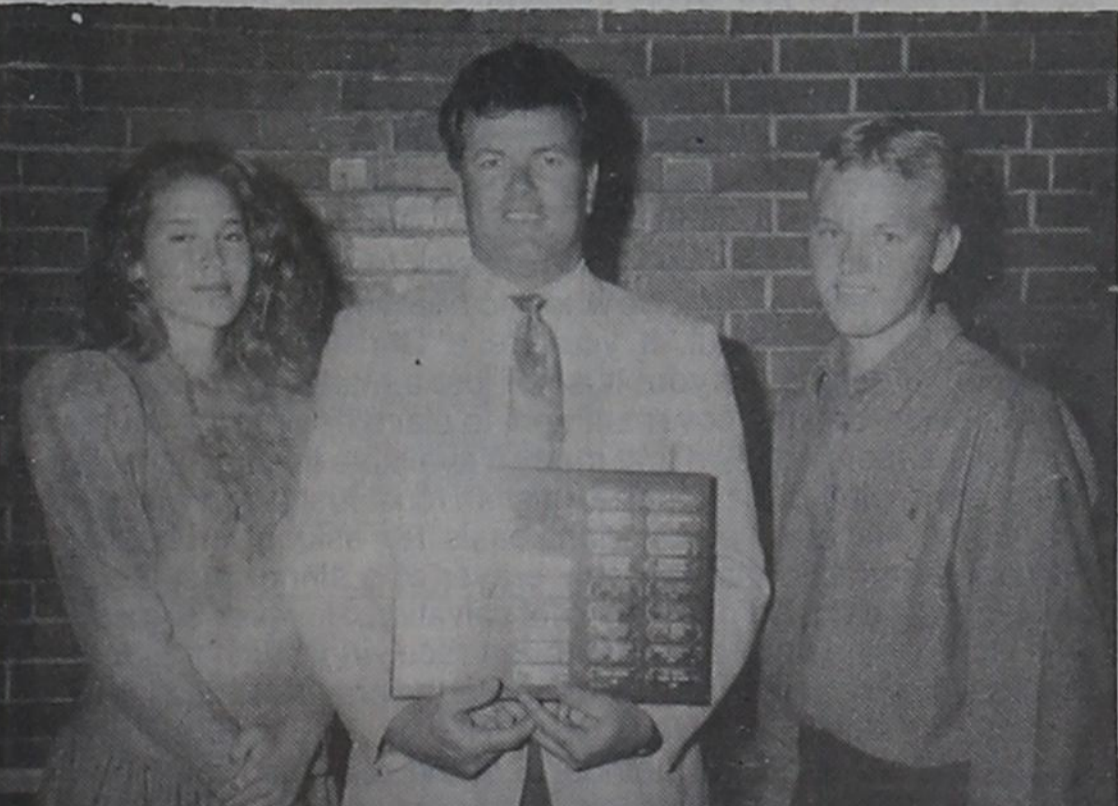

Accident Results In Broken Neck

Alvin Arganbright, 51, was seriously injured Thursday morning in a two vehicle accident southeast of Wheeler. Alvin was brought to Parkview Hospital, stabilized and transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo with a possible broken neck.

Arganbright was traveling east on a farm-to-market road south of Wheeler when his 1972 International Pickup collided with a vehicle driven by Ismael Reyes, 22, of Shamrock. Reyes was southbound and apparently failed to yield the right of way. Arganbright's vehicle rolled two or more times and landed on its top.

The accident occurred around 8:30 A.M., six miles south and four miles east of Wheeler on FM1906 and Co. Road 21.

Neither driver was wearing a seat

belt. Reyes is reported to have hit the clutch instead of the brake when he approached the intersection.

Arganbright underwent surgery in Amarillo and presently is reported to have limited use of his arms and is paralyzed from the waste down.

Fund Established

A fund has been set up at the First National Bank in Wheeler for Alvin Arganbright to help with medical expenses incurred from his recent accident.

Alvin is in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where he underwent surgery following a traffic accident Thursday.

River Valley Pioneer Museum has planned a Red River War Battlefield Tour for Saturday, May 23. This will be a day-long tour of some of the most famous battle field sites in the northern Panhandle associated with the Red River War of 1874. The tour will be led by Bob Izzard, author of "Texas Trails of the Red River War."

Leaving the River Valley Museum at 10:00 a.m., the first stop will be at the site of the Lyman Wagon Train Battle. Other stops will be at the site of the Buffalo Wallow Battle, Fort Elliott at Old Mobeetie, and at the Indian Battlefield at Lake McClellan. We plan to return to River Valley Museum around 4:00 p.m.

A bus has been arranged so that Bob Izzard can point out sights and provide historical background along the route. There will be a \$10.00 fee for each person wishing to ride the bus, to cover the expenses for the day. Participants are welcome to drive their own cars, and we would ask a \$5.00 donation to the museum for each car. Maps and itineraries will be provided. The participants should plan to bring their own lunch, so that we can eat while traveling. Short rest stops



5 REASONS I KNOW GOD WANTS TO HEAL (Part V)

If you are sick, God wants to heal you. God loves you if you are not a Christian. If you haven't accepted Jesus as your Lord and Saviour, He calls you a sinner. That is not my idea. That is not what I decided to call you. All of us used to be sinners, but for those who have received Jesus Christ as Lord of their lives, the Bible does not continue to refer to them as sinners. Rather, they are called children of God.

So, there are two groups of people, sinners and children of God. God wants to heal you if you are sick regardless of whether you are a sinner or a saint. He wants to heal you if you are a sinner because He is merciful. If you are a Christian, healing is a provision. It belongs to you. It is not just a matter of mercy. You have a blood-bought, covenant right to claim healing. Of course, it is still the mercy of God that made it available to Christians, but what I am saying is that a non-Christian must just plead with God for mercy. He has no covenant basis for asking for healing. Someone has said that the only prayer of a sinner that God is obligated to hear is the one asking for salvation. However, someone who is already a child of God through receiving Christ has more than just the sheer mercy of God to base the prayer for healing on.

Let me say it this way. HEALING IS THE CHILDREN'S BREAD. (That is reason number 5 of the reasons I have been listing for you the last few weeks in this column why I know God wants to heal.) A woman came to Jesus to ask for deliverance for her daughter who had something wrong with her. This woman was not one of God's people. She was, therefore, an outsider to God's Covenant blessings. When she asked for relief for her daughter, Jesus told her that it wasn't right to take the "children's bread" and give it to dogs. That plainly indicates that healing and deliverance from things the devil brings against us is considered by God to be the "children's bread".

In the Bible story, the woman received what she wanted. Her daughter was made whole. Jesus did that for her and she was an outsider. She really didn't have a basis by which to approach Him with her request. What she wanted was "The children's bread". If she got it anyway because of her faith and the mercy of God, don't you know that the real children of God can expect to have "the children's bread"? Certainly! In fact, Jesus taught us to pray that we be given our bread daily. I know that God wants to heal you if you are a Christian because (1) He plainly stated it was His will, (2) He revealed His name as Jehovah-Rapha, (3) It is the blessing of Abraham which He gave us, (4) healing is included in the redemption that was bought and paid for by Jesus as our Substitute at the cross, and (5) it is the children's bread.

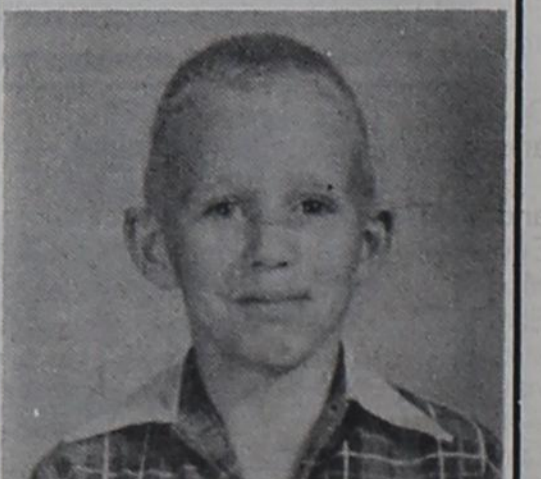

From The Minister's Desk:

Did you read about the recent trial in a small West Texas community of a volunteer fireman who was charged with arson? At his trial this volunteer fireman pled guilty to setting three vacant houses ablaze. His explanation for setting these fires was that fire had become an obsession with him since he had seen the movie, "Backdraft".

After the presiding judge ordered him to serve a six-year sentence, to pay a thousand dollar fine, and to make restitution to the property owners, he said: "Sir, responsible firemen prevent fires. They do not start them."

In my opinion, this rebuke could also be directed at the parents of some young people. For the last several years, it has been apparent that alcohol abuse has increased among young people. One of the reasons for this increase has been that some of their parents have permitted or encouraged the abuse of alcohol. These parents must not be aware that medical and health authorities are not warning that the abuse of alcohol poses a heightened danger to young people. For example, Dr. Larry D'Angelo, the chairman of the Department of Adolescent and Young Adult Medicine at Children's Hospital in Washington, D.C., has said: "Metabolic and neurologic immaturity makes young people more vulnerable than adults to toxicity and dependency—The younger the young person, the

greater the risk." When this warning is coupled with the fact that alcohol is the third leading cause of death in this nation, it is inconceivable to me that parents encourage alcohol abuse by their children. And it is totally inconceivable to me that parents would encourage alcohol abuse by the children of other parents.

I hope that these parents never have an experience like the parents whose eighteen year old daughter was killed in a car accident last spring. On the night of their daughter's graduation from high school, she and her boyfriend were killed in a car accident. When these parents were informed by the police of the accident and the death of their daughter, they were told that several bottles of beer had been found in the car. These parents were outraged, vowing to file charges against those people who supplied their daughter and her boyfriend with the beer. But their outrage soon turned into guilt when they found a note on the door of the refrigerator which said: "Mom and Dad, I took some of your beer so Tom and I could celebrate. I knew that you would not care. Love Betty."

I wonder if these parents still did not care. And I wonder what they said to the parents of the boyfriend who was killed with their daughter. Such parents should be told that responsible parents discourage alcohol abuse. They do not encourage it."
