911 Activated

9-1-1 Emergency Service was activated in north Wheeler county Monday afternoon. Residents of Wheeler, Allison, Briscoe, Mobeetie and Kelton now just have to dial one number, 9-1-1, for the sheriff, fire department or ambulance.

Local residents are urged once more to "fill out" the information cards and return them to Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network, P.O. Box 9257, Amarillo, Texas 79105. These forms provide the ambulance crew with information vital to reaching and treating you or a loved one. Information included on the card is known medical problems, location and the quickest way to reach your residence and any other existing problems, such as dogs—guard, harmless or unknown, locked doors or gates, etc. (It will be considerable easier to make this information available on the card than when

the ambulance is needed.) If you do not have a phone, the information is still needed; this does not make you immune to needing an ambulance.

Individuals with unlisted numbers certainly need to provide the information on the form, as their numbers are not on the computer, because the phone companies will not provide them to PRPC.

Individuals new to the community, not listed in the phone directory may not be in the 9-1-1 computer if they got phone service after the numbers were entered into the system.

The forms have been printed in the Times and mailed in your bank statement. The forms are also available at Hyland's Pharmacy, Wheeler Times and Wheeler Thriftway. Urge your friends and family members to send in their information.

1991 Ambulance Report

From June 1, 1976 to December 31, 1991 the Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service has answered 3,398 calls. 1,154 transfers were made during this period.

In 1991, 307 calls were received. This is a record for most calls in one year. 104 transfers were made, 90% of these transfers were to Amarillo hospitals.

This past December was also a record setter, with 41 calls made. This was our busiest month since our service began. 13 transfers were made in this month.

The following is analyst of the past year. As reported in the past, cardiac remains the number one problem. We had 60 cardiac calls, followed with 48 suspected fractures, 35 sick calls and 16 cerebrovascular accidents. There were 30 patients or individuals in auto accidents and two motorcycles accidents. Four calls were suspected aneurysms, two gunshots, two seizures, five dead on arrival and three dead on scene. Eleven calls were cancer patients. There were two calls traumatic injuries, one due to car falling on head

and one hand injury due to power saw accident one fall from a 30 ft. pole, one from a horse and one from a ladder. One pedestrian hit by a car, 2 attempted suicides, three mental patients and three smoke inhalations. Also one nasal hemorrhage and one suspected head injury from a basketball game.

We also spent a lot of time on stand by at the following scenes; 29 fire calls, two storm watches, twelve football games, four rodeos, and one butane tank leak at the scout camp.

Our response time in town was 2.8 and 4.8 for rural calls.

EMS personnel on these calls were: Louis Stas EMT, M. K. Christner EMT, Mac Christner EMT, Mark Frankenbery EMT, Yreva Shirey EMT, Lee Hibler EMT, Jim Calderon EMT, Nicki Calderon EMT, Jimmy Selby EMT, Deputy Joel Finsterwald EMT and Lyndon Loyd ECA.

We hope 1992 finds the numbers down. Remember our number is 9-1-1 for emergency calls! Buckle up and drive carefully. Have a safe New Year.

VOTER NEED TO CHECK REGISTRATION CARDS

It is time again to check your Voter Registration Card and see if it is in need of correction of some kind. If you have moved, married, or someone has passed away, or there has been a change of some kind, then, you do need to get in touch with the voter registrar at the Wheeler County Courthouse. The change must be done no later than February 1, 1992. The office must have the information to correct your card by this time, in order, to get it reported to the Secretary of State in Austin, Texas by the 30 day cut-off for the March Primary Election.

Please get in touch with this office by telephone Ac. 806-826-3131, mail at P.O. Box 1060, Wheeler, Texas 79096, or just come by the Wheeler County Courthouse—Main floor.

We have numerous cards returned to us by the Post Office that we do not know what to do about. If we hear from you, it may insure your vote not being lost, due to not having a correct card. You will need to have and show your card at the Polling Place for the Primary Election.

When you contact us, please give us your Driver's License Number, too.

This is a new requirement in order to be eligible to vote. Each Voter must have this number on file with the Secretary of State's Office by Primary time if at all possible.

Harold L. Comer announced this week that he intends to seek re-election to the office of District Attorney for the 31st and 223rd Judicial District.

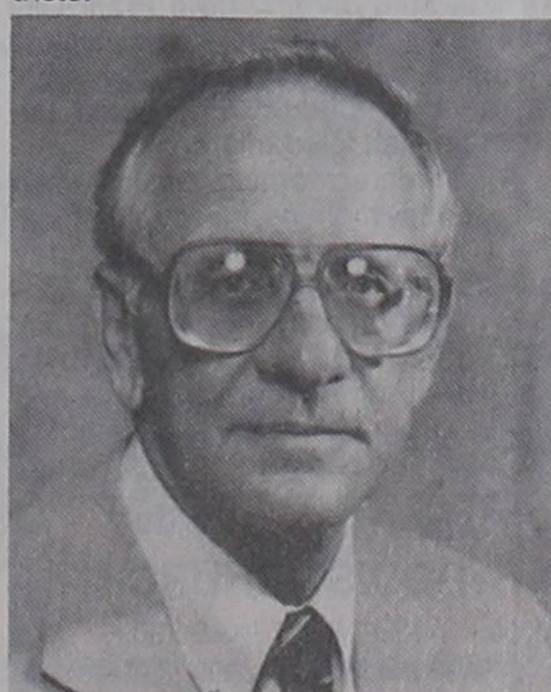

From The Minister's Desk:
Since the assassination of President Kennedy in Dallas on November 22, 1963, several books have been written about his assassination. Some of these books have suggested that his assassination was the result of a conspiracy. The FBI, the CIA, the Mafia have been suggested as perpetrators of this conspiracy.

Then Mrs. Holloway's daughter could be elected cheerleader.

Why would any mother be willing to have someone murdered so her daughter could be cheerleader? According to the testimony at Mrs. Holloway's trial, she desperately wanted her daughter to be cheerleader because Mrs. Holloway was not a cheerleader when she was in high school. While there are probably not many parents as dangerous as Mrs. Holloway there are many who are as foolish. This foolishness can clearly be seen by their self-serving involvement in the activities of their children. And these parents are causing their children to lose their childhood, producing tragic results in their children's future. Such parents have a conspiracy against their children.

A conspiracy may have caused the assassination of President Kennedy. I do not know! I do believe that there is a conspiracy against the children of this nation. And this conspiracy is more serious than the assassination of a President.
