Emergency Loans Are Available To Farmers

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers and aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Mr. Wolf, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Mr. Wolf asked that those who need farm credit as a result of losses caused by freeze & heavy rains, which occured between Sept. 1, 1991 and Dec. 31, 1991 make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration Office at 112 W. Oklahoma in Wheeler, TX.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until 11-28-

92 for physical and production losses. FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy fee, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," John D. Wolf, III Said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5 percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasibly consistent with the applicant's ability to pay.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

Bradley placed first in the pole vault and finished fourth in the long jump and 100 meter dash along with a 5th in the 200 meter dash. Kenney discovered gold in the 200 meter low hurdles and also placed 5th in the pole vault. Other ribbon winners were Rocky Mendiola, 6th in the discus, and Ty Ferguson, member of the sprint relay.

Next action for the Colts will be March 27 & 28 in Miami.
