Services Held For Joe Wheeler Puryear

Joe Wheeler Puryear died on May 7, 1992, at the Kingfisher Regional Hospital. He was 74. The memorial services were at 2 p.m. Monday, May 11, 1992 at the First Baptist Church in Hennessey, Ok. with Dr. Don Rogers officiating. Burial was in the Hennessey Cemetery under the direction of Cordry and Son Funeral Home.

Joe Puryear was born at home on June 4, 1917, in what was then known as the Zybach Community, Hemphill County, Texas. He graduated from Briscoe High School in 1934 and then attended Amarillo Business College, Amarillo, Texas. He was a veteran of World War II serving with the United States Air Force from 1942 until 1946. He lived in Shamrock, Texas, until about 1958 then moved to Oklahoma City. On December 18, 1965, he and Ada Mae Bass were married.

He worked in a variety of accounting jobs over the years, and at one time he was employed by the State of Oklahoma in the Accounting Department. In June of 1973 he and Ada Mae moved to Hennessey. He found an accounting job in El Reno and commuted for several years before retir-

Surviving him in death were his wife, Ada Mae Puryear; one stepson, Moery L. Bass of Oklahoma City; one step-daughter, Mrs. Wallace (Mary) Curry of Hennessey; one brother, Bob Puryear of Allison, Texas; two sisters, Jane Carter of Hemphill, Texas, and Ruth Willoughby of Milam, Texas; six grandchildren and five great grand-

48 area All-Stars have been selected by the Nominating Committee from a list of some 200 nominees submitted by 100 area coaches.


Numerous All State and Honorable Mention All State high school stars dot the roster of the 1992 North and South squads that will assemble in Childress Tuesday, June 2nd to go into two-aday conditioning and training for the 43rd annual Childress D.S.A. Greenbelt Bowl All Star game to be played Saturday, June 6th starting at 6:30 p.m.

Old timers still talk about high school stars like Frank Ryan from Houston who played in one of the earliest games and went on to Rice and later played quarterback in the pros at Cleveland. Local people might remember Ray McKown, the "Dumas Dandy" who came to Childress without a scholarship but Abe Martin took him to TCU where he made All American. The best story is that Ray was just an ordinary player until he was backed up in his own end zone facing a 30 mile per hour wind.....whistled a 60 yard low driving punt that got the Horned Frogs out of danger. Coach Martin said, "Ray can't pass....he can't punt....he's slow....all that kid can do

is beat you!" Others will remember Mike Hargrove from Perryton....the most valuable player in the game who threw the winning touchdown pass to Craig Smith of the Jacksboro Tigers. Mike now manages the major league Cleveland Indian baseball team. Five or six years ago, Mike sent \$100 check to Childress with the note "playing in the Greenbelt Bowl was a highlight of my young life and I will never forget meeting the other young men who have remained friends in my memories. Thanks for giving all of us the chance to play."

Craig's father, Don Smith is now with D.S.A., the sponsor of the Greenbelt Bowl, who fondly remembers that proud moment. And, in fact, Ray Williams, Cliff Holden and Don, when asked whey they would sponsor the "smallest bowl game in the world" simply said in unison, "the game might be small compared to the pros and college bowl games....but it's the biggest thing that ever happened to those eighteen year old youngsters."

God's Talking Mercy

Luke 4:18 tells us that God anointed Jesus to preach the gospel to the poor, that God sent Jesus to heal the brokenhearted, that God sent Jesus to preach deliverance to the captives, that God sent Jesus to preach recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, and to preach the acceptable year of the Lord. HE'S TALKING MERCY.

This is the day that God will accept you. This is the day of salvation. I am glad that I can be a "good news" preacher too. God has not anointed me to preach different than Jesus. You can be forgiven today. You can be saved today. No matter how bad or sinful you have been, your life can be changed today. You can become a new person and find the fulfillment in life that you have wanted. You don't have to be bound by bad habits that may take your life eventually. God doesn't want to send judgement on you. If that ends up being your end, it will be because you chose to reject salvation.

If you don't make a definite, conscious decision to accept Jesus Christ, you will exist in the region of the damned forever. However, that is not God's will, and it doesn't have to be. Mildew Prevention "Extension Update" Joan Gray, CEA-HE

Mildew flourishes in warm, humid weather. Mildew grows best wherever it is damp, warm, poorly aired and poorly lighted, such as in closets, bathrooms and laundry rooms.

Several things help prevent mildew growth. Provide adequate ventilation throughout the house, especially in enclosed spaces. For example, run an electric fan in places that cannot be exposed to outside air easily such as linen and storage closets.

Leave closets and dresser drawers open occasionally to allow moisture to escape. Burning a small electric light bulb in a closed closet will help dry it out. So will heating it with a small, electric heater placed on the floor of the closet. When heating the closet, be sure to follow the directions for safe operation of the heater.

Hang clothes loosely so air can circulate around them. Keep shoes and other articles on shelves, preferably perforated ones, to maintain better air circulation. Be sure things are clean and dry before putting them

Dry shower curtains and walls after each shower to reduce moisture in bathrooms. Leave shower curtains open to allow air to circulate in the shower or tub area. Hang wet towels to dry immediately after use or place them in the dryer on air dry to speed drying time and to vent moisture out of the house through the dryer vent.

Commercial products are available that remove moisture from the air in enclosed spaces. Silica gel, activated alumina and calcium chloride absorb moisture from the air. Silica gel and alumina can be dried and reused once they have absorbed as much as they can hold. Calcium chloride is converted to a liquid as it absorbs moisture and must be discarded when it is completely liquified. These products may be available from building supply centers, variety stores, or through catalog stores.

Keeping all surfaces clean and dry will help prevent mildew, too. Washing walls, floors, tile, and other hard surfaces with a chlorine bleach solution will get rid of musty odors and prevent mold spores from growing. Use one-half cup to one cup of liquid chlorine bleach to a gallon of water. Use only on surfaces that are safe to bleach. Rinse with clear water and wipe as dry as possible. Fungicidal products also control mildew effec-







Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

* the value placed on your property

* any exemptions that may apply to you

* the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal

* the taxable status of you property * the local governments which should be

taxing you property

* any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB)

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 101 E. Texas (Courthouse square) Wheeler, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at Wheeler County Central Appraisal District, P.O. Box 1200, Wheeler, TX; PH 806/826-5900. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746-6565.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protest are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact you appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

From The Minister's Desk:

In the sixteenth century, a religious revival that swept across Europe became known as the Reformation Movement. this religious revival was a reaction to some of the religious practices that characterized the sixteenth century.

While there were several people who were leaders of this revival, one of the most influential was Martin Luther. On October 31, 1517, he nailed a list of ninety-five statements on the door of the Castle Church, challenging some of the practices of the sixteenth century church. For example, one of the practices that he challenged was the selling of indulgences. According to this practice, people who made a financial donation to the church were given an indulgence which was a written guarantee that their sins had been forgiven.

Martin Luther believed that this heresy because it was a clear-cut violation of the New Testament texts which taught that the forgiveness of sin was by faith. Since the forgiveness of sin was by faith, Martin Luther believed that it could not be earned by good works or purchased with financial payments. But there were other sixteenth century preachers who did not share Martin Luther's opposition to the selling of indulgences.

One of these sixteenth century preachers was John Tetzel. According to church historians, Mr. Tetzel preached in villages throughout northern Europe, traveling in an ornate carriage. When he arrived in these villages, he would emerge from his carriage in flowing clerical robes. He then would display a small red cross and say: "This cross I now hold before you has all the forgiving power of the cross on which Jesus died. Think about your sins. The cross even has the power to secure pardon for sins which you will commit in the future. Think about it, my friends. You can receive letters which are properly certified to assure you of the deliverance of your father, your

mother and all those dear departed loved ones who now writhe in the pain of purgatory. All that stands between them and deliverance from their agony is alms—a few trifling alms. Oh, if you could only here your good mother as she pleads with you, Have pity, oh my child. Will you let your own mother, your departed brother, your child agonize in their tormenting flames. Remember my friends, As soon as the coin in the coffer rings, the soul from purgatory springs."

In my opinion, John Tetzel has his twentieth century counterparts. For example, I recently heard one of the prominent televangelists urge people to sow a "financial seed" into his ministry. He emphasized that this "financial seed" would then allow them to decreed the salvation of the members of their family who were not saved. While I am not Martin Luther, I have the same reaction to this teaching that he had to the selling of indulgences. I believe that it is blatant heresy

The Bible describes the forgiveness of sin as a "-gift-". As a "gift-" it cannot be earned of purchased. Rather it can only be received through an obedient faith in Jesus Christ. Romans 3:23-26 says: "-All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, being justified as a gift by His grace through the redemption which is in Christ Jesus; whom God displayed publicly as a propitiation in His blood through faith. This was to demonstrate His righteousness, because in the forbearance of God He passed over the sins previously committed; for the demonstration I say, of His righteousness at the present time, that He might he just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus. "When this -gift-" is turned into a commercial transaction, the results will be blatant heresy and often rank dis-
