The Clarendon Broncos claimed the High School Boys Championship followed by Wheeler. The Gruver girls captured the H.S. girls division, followed by Wellington. The Wheeler 8th grade boys and girls claimed the championship trophies in their divisions. Wellington won the 7th grade girls title, and Memphis won the 7th grade boys division by 2 points over the

Wheeler team.

Placing for the Mustangs were: 1st place, Ike Finsterwald, shot put, 48'7"; Ike Finsterwald, discus, (new meet record of 146'0"; Mark Marshall, 200 m dash, 23.45).

2nd place: Mark Marshall, long jump, 21'11 3/4"; 400 meter relay (Winter, Dunnam, Chick, Marshall), 45.35; 1600 m relay (Chick, Dunnam, Marshall, Baize) 3:36.6; Todd Baize, high jump, 6'6"; Marcus Hardcastle, pole vault, 11'.

3rd place: Brandon Chick, 400 m dash, 53.1; Chad Dunnam, 300 m J.H., 42.2.

4th place: Todd Baize, 800 m dash, 2:11.8; Jimmie Winter, 110 m H.H., 16.5; Jason Helton, 300 m IH, 42.8; Mark Marshall, triple jump, 41' 6 3/4".

5th place: Chad Harrison, shot put, 43' 7 1/2"; Chad Harrison, discus, 134'3".

The Mustangs will be competing in the Irish Relays in Shamrock this Fri. and Sat., April 10 and 11th.

Wheeler 8th Grade Girls Track Sets Records

Four records were set by the Wheeler 8th grade girls track team as they overcame a huge deficit in field event points to edge QuanaH 107.25 to 96 for the team title. The 1600 meter relay team of Angie Thomas, Ember Bradstreet, Vanessa Shepard and Dena Compton established a new meet record in 4:36.60. The new time shaved over 3.5 seconds off the old mark. Vanessa Shepard posted a new individual mark of 64.82 in the open 400 meter dash. Ember Bradstreet placed third in that event in 69.45. Dena Compton raced to a new standard in the 800 meter run to lead a 1-2 Wheeler sweep. Miss Compton eclipsed the old mark of 2:44.8 with a time of 2:41.93 as Angie Thomas placed second in 2:46.14. Miss Compton also set a new record in the 1200 meter run by covering the distance in 4:16.29. In perhaps the outstanding performance of the Mustang Relays, she was able to shave over 15 seconds off the old record. In other running events, Vanessa Shepard placed third in the 200 meter dash. Jeseka Wallace placed second in the 100 meter hurdles in 18.06 and fourth in the 200 meter hurdles one of the toughest races of the day as the top four finishers all beating the old record. Cindy Alley was fourth in the 100 meter hurdles. Kasey McCasland leaped 13 feet 8 3/4 inches to claim fourth in the long jump. Julie Hampton tied for sixth in the high jump. Kalli Bradstreet earned a pair of sixth place finishes in the shot put and 100 meter dash, despite a swollen ankle. Kalli was also on the sixth place 400 meter relay and third place 800 meter relay teams. She was joined by Ember Bradstreet, Angie Thomas and Penny Dollar on the sprint relay and by Julie Hampton, Cindy Alley and Miss Dollar on the Z lap relay. A pleased Coach Read said after the meet, "These girls gave an outstanding effort. We look forward to doing the same thing in two weeks."

She placed fourth in the 400 meter dash. Gayla Maddux placed fifth in the 100 meter dash. Melissa, Jessica, Lori and Nissa placed fifth in the 1600 meter relay. SCOTTS TO CELEBRATE 60th WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

Glenn and Lucille Scott are celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary with a family reunion April 11th in Wheeler.

Glenn and Lucille, the former Lucille Beene, were married on Sunday, April 10, 1932 in Shamrock, Texas. Glenn's sister, Eddie Mae Scott, was teaching in Shamrock and came home on weekends. They planned their wedding for Sunday afternoon so they could take Eddie Mae to Shamrock and she could serve as a witness.

The Rev. Ed Wallace, a retired Methodist minister, performed the ceremony at his home with his wife and Eddie Mae serving as witnesses.

After the wedding, they left Eddie Mae at the place where she was boarding and drove up Highway 66 to Amarillo and stayed in the Herring Hotel. In Amarillo, they visited Glenn's brother and sister-in-law, Emmet and Zula Scott, and his sister Ima Scott in Canyon. Following their honeymoon trip, the Scotts set up housekeeping at the Bentley House in Mobeetie.

Lucille was the daughter of D.O. and Ollie W. Beene of Mobeetie. D. O. was practicing law there and in Wheeler. He was also a candidate for State Legislature, 122nd District that year. Ollie owned and operated Guaranty Abstract and Title Company.

Lucille's brother, Pat Beene, was married to the former Dorothy Bradstreet and they were living in Mobeetie. Pat was working for Nathan Hunt Hardware. Her sister, Bessie Beene (Penick), was in school in Wheeler.

Glenn's parents were C. M. and Minnie Lou Scott who also lived in Mobeetie. C. M. and Glenn were operating a Phillips 66 Petroleum wholesale trucking business. Glenn's brother, Emmet Scott was married to the former Zula Talliferro. She taught school in Wheeler prior to their marriage. They were living in Amarillo where he was practicing law with Sanders and Scott Law Firm.

His other brother, Hillyer "Shorty" Scott was married to the former Alice Powell and living in Mobeetie. He had a trucking business.

Glenn has two sisters, Eddie Mae Scott and Ima Scott (Redden). Eddie Mae was teaching school in Sham-

rock and Ima was attending school in Canyon at West Texas College.

Glenn was born in Old Mobeetie in 1910 and graduated from Shamrock High School in 1931. Lucille was born in Wichita Falls in 1913 and graduated from both the Wheeler and Mobeetie high schools in 1931.

The Scotts had two children, Glenna Lucille and Bryan Wheeler. Glenna was born at home in Mobeetie on November 18, 1934. Bryan was born May 12, 1938, in the Wheeler hospital.

The Scotts moved to Amarillo in 1937 when Glenn went to work for the River Road Independent School District as a bus driver and maintenance superintendent. He later worked as the schools tax collector until 1944. In 1944, he was drafted by the Navy. He had already passed the physical and was making plans to go when the government decided to exempt him because he was 34, married and had two children. Glenn worked for Phillips 66 Petroleum from 1944 until 1957 when he became owner/operator of Glenn Scott Transport.

Lucille took over as tax assessor/collector for River Road in 1944 and worked there until 1964.

The Scotts sold their business in 1977, purchased other family members' interests in a piece of land south of Wheeler. They built a house there and presently raise cattle.

Family members who will be attending the reunion are their daughter and son-in-law from Amarillo, Glenna and Preston Cook and their son, Bryan Scott from Houston.

My life and my health turned around when I stopped basing my belief on somebody's experience. However godly they were and however holier they are than I, nobody's experience supersedes the Work of God. When I chose to believe the Word regardless of whose experience didn't line up, I got well.

Faith comes by hearing the Word of God. (Romans 10:17) Often faith leaves by hearing the words of unbelieving theologians or by listening to the words of Christians who disbelieve the promises of God. I want to relate to you 5 Bible reasons why I am absolutely convinced that God wants to heal you. Read my article next week for the first reason. 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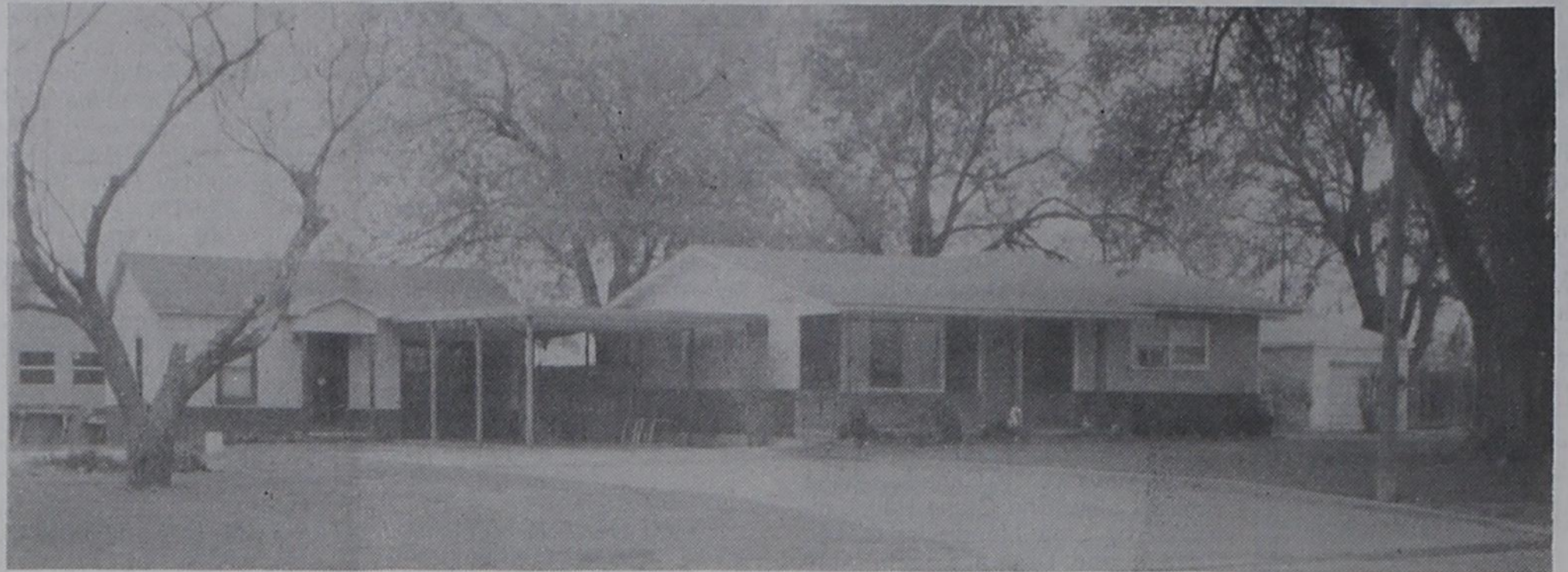

EASTER EGGS—SAFE HANDLING

Eggs have long been a part of Easter feasts and spring festivals—a good reason to ensure egg hunts remain fun and safe for children as well as adults.

Questions often arise concerning safety of Easter eggs and their consumption after the egg hunt. These guidelines can help consumers in selecting, storing, preparing and handling of eggs before and after the hunt.

* When purchasing eggs, choose cartons that have no cracked eggs. Use eggs within four or five weeks after purchase.

* Keep fresh eggs stored in the original carton and in the coldest section of the refrigerator, never on the door where drafts can create fluctuation in temperature.

* Hard-cooked eggs have a recommended maximum storage time of five to seven days. Plan to hard-cook, and color eggs only a day or two before the event. To hard-cook eggs safely, place eggs in a single layer in a pan. Add water to cover eggs at least one inch. Cover pan and bring to a rapid boil. Turn off heat or reduce heat to maintain a gentle simmer. Let eggs remain in the pan for 15 to 20 minutes to assure doneness. When done, run cold water over eggs to cool quickly.

* Once eggs are hard-cooked, store in the refrigerator. Don't leave at room temperature.

* If you plan to eat eggs that have been decorated, use only food coloring or specially made food-grade egg dyes.

* Don't color or hide cracked eggs. The cracks allow contamination of eggs from an outside source such as dye or dirt.

* Consider hiding places carefully. Avoid places that may come into contact with pets or other animals, lawn chemicals or insect.

* Refrigerate eggs after hidden and found, if you plan to eat them. Follow the two hour rule. Eggs to be eaten should not remain out of the refrigerator for more than two hours.

* A good practice is to wash Easter eggs that have been in the hunt before eating them.

* Avoid handling eggs as much as possible. Each step in handling provides an opportunity for contamination.

From The Minister's Desk:
In the eighteenth century an important religious leader was John Wesley. According to Biblical historians, Mr. Wesley was brilliant a preacher who constantly emphasized the practicality of Christianity.

This practicality can clearly be seen in a reply that Mr. Wesley made to a man who boasted: "I never forgive people who offend me." Mr. Wesley's reply was: "Then I hope, sir, that you never sin."

With this reply, Mr. Wesley acknowledged a great New Testament truth. The New Testament clearly teaches that disciples of Jesus must extend forgiveness to people who offend them if they expect God to forgive them. For example, the eighteenth chapter of Matthew records a parable that Jesus told about a man who refused to forgive another man even though he himself had recently been forgiven. Because of his refusal to forgive, Jesus says that this man was handed "—over to the torturers—" (verse 34). And then Jesus concludes this parable by warning: "So shall My Heavenly

Father also do to you, if each of you does not forgive his brother from your heart." (verse 35)

It is imperative that disciples of Jesus forgive people who offend them. But how do disciples of Jesus learn to be forgiving? It is so easy to bear resentment and to hold grudges. To forgive people who have offended them, disciples of Jesus must constantly remember the forgiveness that they have received from God.

Disciples of Jesus do not earn or merit the forgiveness of their sins. God freely forgives them because of their obedient faith in Jesus Christ. (Romans 3:21-26) And God completely forgives their sins, promising "—their sins and their lawless deeds I will remember no more." (Hebrews 10: 17)

Realizing that their sins have been freely and completely forgiven by God, disciples of Jesus will freely and completely forgive those people who offend them. If they refuse to forgive these people, their only hope for the forgiveness of God is that they never sin.

During her inspection, she visited patients and checked charts, in addition to noting how physicians' orders were followed. She checked materials at all Shepard's Nursing Agency offices, including Pampa, Wheeler, Borger, Amarillo and Clarendon. Wilkinson said that the certification is for a period of 12 to 15 months. This certification must be obtained to qualify the agency for Medicare funding, she explained.
